THAT HIGH JUMP SHOE

S INCE commenting on the built-up shoe in a recent issue, I have received letters from the Secretary of the A.A.A. Southern Committee and George Pallett on the subject.

The former, Mr. A. J. C. Kendall, states that the object of his Committee in raising the matter with the A.A.A. General Committee is to try to get some uniformity throughout the country, pending a decision by the I.A.A.F.

Mr. Pallett feels that there is plenty of wisdom outside the high jumpers' organisation and comments: "Any official can recognise when a shoe has been deliberately built up to assist — he wants to know

whether it can be allowed or not."

I'm not so sure that he is right here, for shoes are obtainable which are built-up inside and are supposed to be indistinguishable from the usual high-jump shoes—similar in principle, I presume, to the ordinary everyday shoes which are obtainable to increase the height of small men.

DETAILS from Peter May of the recent Interscholastic meets in the U.S.A. make interesting reading. They make our L.A.C. Schools Meeting results look poor by comparison. By the 12th April the Southland area alone had High School marks of 9.4 (100), 20.8 (220) 48.1 (440), 1:56.6 (880), 4.27.1 (mile), 14.2 (120H), 6'7\frac{1}{4}" (HJ), 23'9" (LJ) 14'0\frac{1}{4}" (PV) and 59'11\frac{1}{2}" (Shot). Except for the middle distances, our boys are outclassed in almost every department. There were 8 other high jumpers over 6'3" and 6 more long jumpers over 23'0", while 8 more pole vaulters cleared 13'1\frac{1}{2}" or better. Some going!

I AM given to understand that Mr. E. H. Knowles, the Spartan Ladies' Secretary, is having to leave the house in which he has resided for the past 30 years, due to the Rent Act. He is having great difficulty in obtaining a four room house or flat, preferably in London, and if any reader can help, perhaps they would write to Mr. Knowles at 42 Hatfield Road, London, W.4.

To-DAY'S events include the Finchley "20," Crompton "8," Nottingham "15," Tipton Road Relay, Smethwick Junior Relay and Open Hurdles events for Juniors and Youths, organised by the Hurdlers' Union, at the Torch A.C. inter-club match at Hurlingham. The latter includes a demonstration of hurdling under the direction of Peter Hildreth.

To-morow the annual Three Peaks Fell race will be held at Chapel-le-Dale.

To rank runners by Cross-country performances is a difficult thing to do. Nevertheless, it is very interesting to see the result after considerable thought on the part of the compiler.

"These rankings are Mr. Watman says: based on this season's championship and international races, with special emphasis laid on the National and International Championship results." This is satisfactory, but Mr. Watman has not followed up his statement, since he places George Knight in 4th place, and he did not compete in the two major races of the season-namely the National and the International. George Knight may have been worthy of this position if he had competed in these events. I feel that he ought to be placed with Fred Norris, who ran extremely well towards the end of the season, whilst the former ran well at the beginning.

In addition, I feel that Ken Caulder deserves 10th position in Mike Maynard's stead, for although Ken was beaten by him in the Southern and in the National, he beat Mike in the Surrey, Inter-County and International.

Here is my "Top Ten" for the 1957-8 season:

- STAN ELDON. Although he missed the National, I feel that his brilliant performance at Cardiff earned him the premiership for 1958.
- ALAN PERKINS. Has run well all season, and he secured a fine victory at Birkenhead as well as a 4th place in the International.
- FRANK SANDO. Merited performances in both National and International—2nd and 3rd respectively.
- ALAN COCKING. Brilliant consistent season. I feel he deserves this position instead of Basil Heatley, for he beat Basil handsomely in the Inter-County, whilst the two were close together at Cardiff at 9th and 10th.
- BASIL HEATLEY. Also a consistent season with excellent performances throughout.
- JOHN MERRIMAN. An extremely good run at Cardiff (7th). Although he was beaten by Mick Firth in the National, the reverse took place in the Inter-County and International.
- MICK FIRTH. Also a good season and he thoroughly deserves to be ranked 7th.
- GEORGE KNIGHT. Began season well and secured an excellent victory in the Inter-County before leaving the country to train for the track season.
- FRED NORRIS. A great "come-back" for Fred after a shaky start to the season.
- KEN CAULDER. Has regained his lost form and has had a fine season.

RECORD FOR SANDO IN UXBRIDGE RELAY

F OR the sixth annual 20 mile Uxbridge Road Relay on April 12th, it was expected that the circuit record held by F. Sando would be in danger of being beaten, and this proved to be the case. Twenty-two teams lined up for the start and at the change-over City of Rochester (Ellam) were in the lead, followed by Vale of Aylesbury, Ranelagh, Ealing, Redhill and Reigate and Aylesford. Sando ran on the second leg and soon showed that he was in great form. It was therefore no surprise to see Frank heading the field, giving his team mate a quarter mile to play with on the third leg. Frank clocked 26.43 for his leg (5 miles 1,000yds.) which beat the existing record by two seconds. At this stage Aylesford were followed by Ealing, Redhill and Reigate, Ranelagh, City of Rochester and Windsor and Eton in that order.

At the end of the third leg Aylesford had now increased their lead to 3mins., and seemed assured of repeating their performance of 1956. The next five in order were Ranelagh, City of Rochester, Ealing, Horsham and Oxford City.

With Stan Eldon taking the last leg for Windsor the question was, could he lower the record still further. The cold wind had now dropped a little and conditions were almost perfect, but it was not to be, for, though Stan took Windsor from sixth to third, he just failed by 4 secs, to equal the new record. Wycombe, who had done so well the previous week were expected to push the field hard, but with Redrup absent ill, and two others not arriving, they did well to finish the course with three reserves.

EVEN TIME AT L.A.C. SCHOOLS MEETING

And Mike Ellis's record eclipsed in the Hammer

7 ITH fine weather to assist, performances at the annual Schools Meeting, organised at the White City by the London Athletic Club, were excellent.

Despite the high overall standard, there were a few really outstanding performers, namely Peter Radford (100), Malcolm Yardley (440), "Sandy" Davies (high jump) and Peter Newton

(hammer).

The bearded Radford was in a class of his own in the short sprint and with normal development could be an outstanding senior in a couple of years time. Griffiths of City of London, pulled a muscle in his semi-final and was excused the final, while in the latter, Hahn of Dulwich, did likewise with a dozen yards

Yardley, with a low, economical yet powerful action, was always in command and won as he pleased. Like Radford in the 100, his time of 49.4 was a new best performance.

The standard of the half-milers and milers was really first-class and we should have little to worry about in continuing the flow of good middle distance runners with boys like these joining the senior ranks in a few years' time. In the "half," Givan-last year about the most promising runner of his age I had seen -might well have given the winner more to do if he had made his effort later instead of with some 330 yards to go. Hall gives one the impression of being the stronger runner at the moment, and would probably beat the London boy whichever way he ran, but a little more maturity and better tactics might see Givan turn the tables.

The milers, too, were a fine bunch and the race itself seemed a typical case of the folly of "front running" without the necessary superiority over one's opponents. Anderson, of Bradford, with an arm action which reminded one of Brasher, and with trunk and leg action reminiscent of Bannister, led throughout until "jumped" with 250 yards to go, when Parsons of Reigate, took command. Anderson, when he had extricated himself, came again and closed the gap to 6 or 7 yards, but could not get near enough to bother the winner.

In the mile walk C. J. Manning was a clear winner and a stylish one at that. In the throws the only outstanding performer was Newton in the hammer, who nearly "wrote-off" the starter with his first effort and laid on some more prodigious efforts in the same vicinity so that one starter started while the other kept a weather eye on the hammer in general

and Newton in particular.

"Sandy" Davies showed that he is continuing his progress over the bar and his 6ft. 2½in. is probably the best ever high jump performance by a home athlete, senior, junior or youth. To show that he is versatile, Davies also took the long jump and though the standard was none too good, he had nearly a foot to spare from the second man.

As usual, the standard in the junior events was good, but there were no really outstand-

ing boys to take the eye.



Overseas News

U.S.A.

A L OERTER's discus throw of 202'6" was not authentic after all. It had first been announced that everything was in order for the mark to be forwarded for recognition as a world record, but it was found subsequently that the throwing area sloped 2½ times as much is allowed under I.A.A.F. rules. Thus, no record. That official 200-footer may not be too far off, though, for Oerter and Babka are due to clash at Des Moines on April 25th.

A world record equalling performance that appears to comply with all the regulations is a 9.3 100 yards by 20-year-old Ray Norton at San Jose, Calif., on April 12th.

The watches read 9.3, 9.3, 9.4; the strength of the following wind was only 0.2 metres per second (up to 2m/sec. is allowed) and the track was up to requirements

Norton's previous best for 100 yards was 9.5, plus a wind aided 9.4. He has also run a straight 220 in 20.6 (and 20.3w) and clocked 21.1 around a turn. He stands 6'3" and weighs 12st.

The world record is shared by Americans Mel Patton, Jim Golliday, Leamon King, Dave Sime and Bobby Morrow, and by Australia's Hec Hogan.

Bob Gutowski, in only his second outdoor meet of the season, pole vaulted 15'3" at Los Angeles on April 12th Joe Rose and Ron Morris, both 15-footers, were far behind at 14 feet. Charles Dumas, who ran a 14.1 high hurdles the week before, once again cleared 6'10" in the high jump and failed narrowly at 7 feet. Rink Babka threw an official 182'6½" and Alex Henderson (Australia) ran a 4:07.2 mile.

Speaking of milers, Norman Lloyd who ran 4:06.0 recently (with a last lap of under 60 sec.) is a second year student at Stanford University, Calif. He is English-born and a former member of Mitcham A.C. He emigrated to Canada a couple of years ago but this was his first outstanding performance on the other side of the Atlantic. His best mark in England was a 1:52.6 half mile in July, 1955. Lloyd stands 6'3" and weighs 12st—the same as Ray Norton.

Other U.S. news from April 12th: Bobby Morrow lost again—to team mate Bill Woodhouse in a 9.5 century at Abilene. Dave Sime ran 9.6 and 21.6 on a heavy track at Durham, N.C. . and threw the javelin 196'11" for good measure. Greg Bell long jumped 25'6\frac{3}{4}" and then injured himself. At Quantica Glenn Davis put in a useful afternoon's work: he ran 440 yards hurdles in 51.8, beat Elias Gilbert by a yard in a 14.3 high hurdles, and won the long jump!

FAST FURLONG BY SEGAL AT CARSHALTON

Before a large and enthusiastic crowd, 176 athletes competed in the 6th Carshalton Trophies Meeting on Easter Monday. On a track which was heavy and soft from the 5in. of snow only two days before, ten track records were broken.

Croydon Harriers' 19 year old Nick Morgan won the shot putt with 51'2", beating his personal best by 8in., improving his own ground record by 2'6" and achieving the greatest distance ever by a Surrey athlete.

Also impressive was the new ground record by Dave Brigden, of Mitcham. From a soft run-up and with biting cross-wind, he won the long jump at 22ft. 4½in. to add 11in, to the record.

Dave Segal's time for the 220 yards was very encouraging, considering the condition of the track and the weather. He stormed round the outside lane in 22.1 and clipped 6/10th sec. off the record with something in hand.

A new ground record for the women's high jump was set up by Olympic jumper, Audrey Bennett, of Essex L.A.C., when she won this event with 5ft. 3in. Dorothy Tyler took third place, then went to the long jump pit and won that event with 16ft. 2in.

In the women's 110 yards Deborah Turner turned a slight deficit into the narrowest of victories in the last 10 yards, both being credited with 12.8 sec.

The 2 miles team was dominated by T.V.H. Eddie Ellis, who set the early pace, then Peter Clark went up and held his position to the end, being followed home by Ken Norris, just

returned from his honeymoon, Ellis and Ken Caulder (Surrey A.C.) who looked dangerous just behind the T.V.H. trio throughout but on the run-in did not have the bite to split the group in front.

RECORDS FOR NORRIS IN A.A.A. "IO"

ITH the ever increasing popularity of distance running it is sometimes difficult to determine whether to enthuse more over the high standard of performance or the large volume of competitors, in my opinion they are both synonymous; yet in the resuscitated A.A.A. 10 Miles Track Championship at Hurlingham on Saturday, 19th April, we had one without the other. This particular event was never a popular championship in the "good (or bad) old days" and when, in 1947, Jim Peters —then just beginning to court our admiration -ran a handful of trackmen off the White City cinders, the Amateur Athletic Association wisely decided that their efforts were not justifiably rewarded and put the Challenge Cuppresented by the late Mr. W. Chinnery-into the A.A.A. treasure vaults until such time as warrantable enthusiasm for the event was created.

Came 1957 when the distinguishable power of the Road Runners' Club impressed the Amateur Athletic Association with representations for a revival of the "A.A.A. Ten." The A.A.A., in their efforts to oblige for the good of the sport, opened a new file, the minutes of which were addressed to Les Cohen, Championship Hon. Secretary, and there lay the foundations of the "A.A.A. Ten of 1958." Les never has a bad promotion and, if this was perhaps not up to the high standard he demands, he would be the last to condemn on one showing and no doubt will gamble again in 1959 when the efforts of the star athletes are less burdened with a responsible programme demanding specialisation for competition at the highest

lêvel.

Despondency can be allayed when one forgets that only 11 of the 17 entries faced the starter, that only 85 spectators thought the journey to Hurlingham and the admission fee worth while and that a further 21 thought the journey only worth while. Think only of the performance served up by the 11 superbly fit competitors who made short work of 40 laps of an L.C.C. track and never thought of quit-It looked a leisurely first 220 in 38 seconds when Hugh Foord stepped into the lead to call up an 80 second lap and settle down to take the field along at 5 minute mile pace. Hugh's time for the first mile was 4.59 with Fred Norris in 5th place in 5.01. The Brighton boy, being tailed by Harwood, North and Norris, strode through 2 miles in 9.58 and was still in perfect rhythm at 3 miles in 14.55, by which time he had dropped first Harwood and then Norris-the latter by only 2 seconds. Collins, Gebbett, Thornton and Wilson were bunched around the 15.20 mark and the remainder were all inside 15.55.

The lot were inside 21.20 at 4 miles but Foord was there in 19.49, after which he worked in a 72 seconds lap to shake off Gerry North and leave Fred Norris 6 seconds in There was no sign of wilting as Hugh Foord passed 5 miles in 24.44, with North 4 seconds away and Norris clocking 24.54. Harwood was in 4th place with 25.37. It was a different story a mile later when Norris displaced North in second place and was then 9 seconds behind Foord, whose time at 6 miles was 29.43. The gap between Foord and Norris was now being closed steadily by the relentless running of the wiry Lancashire miner who, with 34.47 for 7 miles, was only 2 seconds down on Foord. Both were inside the English Native Record of 34.56 by Jack Heywood, who had led at that distance when, in April, 1956, Fred Norris set up new figures of 12 miles 69 yards for one hour.

After passing Foord at 7½ miles, Norris went on to reach 8 miles in 39.42 against Ken Norris's Native Record of 39.55 (1956) and lowered his own 1956 figures at 9 miles from 44.57 to 44.42. This amazing 36 year-old family man was still full of running as he reeled off his last lap in 71 seconds to lap Gerry North in 3rd place and lower his own 10 miles record by 14 seconds. And this fellow is a marathon runner! A pleasant culmination to all this was the presentation of prizes by Stan Cox who, it will be remembered, was seriously injured by a javelin in this very enclosure

only last year.
