#### Southern Record for Stan Vickers

BRIGHT, but nippy, day and a track in A really good condition, materially assisted in fast times being recorded in the Southern AAA 7 miles at Battersea Park. Stan Vickers knocked off no less than 45.8 seconds from the previous best time for the event, put up by

Bryan Hawkins last year.

Hawkins was a non-starter as was also Bob Goodall, second on two or three occasions, so Vickers had no strong challenger for chief honours. He was in the lead from the gun and after a rather faster first mile in 7m.0.2s., settled down into very even laps with miles averaging In the last three miles he cut well into Hawkins' time and actually gained 29.8 seconds on the record in the last two miles to In the course of this he clock 52m.23.6s. lapped all but three of the 41 starters.

Colin Williams (Ilford) held second place throughout to finish in 53m.50.6s.—as good as some winning times, and George Meadows (Highgate) just got the better in a close finish of Tom Misson (Met.) to clinch third, they clocking 54m.16.4s. and 54m.17s. respectively.

Mike Shannon, of Newport, failed to arrive and this robbed the Junior 6 miles of much of its interest. John Edington, the National Junior Champion, soon went in front after a brisk start by Wally Parr (Trowbridge) and Terry Gough (Met.), and by half distance was right out on his own. The Godiva lad romped home in 47m.53s. with 1m.18s. advantage over Gough, Parr losing ground but finishing third.

Bob Bygrave (Highgate) also had a comfortable win in the Youth 3 miles in 24m. 5s., over S. F. O'Connor (Cambridge) 24.36; and S. J.

Cameron (Q.P.H.) 24.50. Lancashire W.C. have found a useful recruit in G. Miller, of the U.S.A. Air Force. finished joint sixth in their 15 miles on Satur-

day last and second in the Handicap.

Times were below average in the Stock Exchange A.C. 25 Miles Championship, at Hayes, Kent, but holder R. E. Green had no one to push him this time. His keen rival, Ted Hipkins, has not been in form and was content to hold third place until the last few miles where he overtook young Dave Stevens to finish over 4 minutes behind Green.

Big event this Saturday is the Metropolitan Open 15 Miles at Regents Park. 3 p.m. Junior race 2.30. First six London clubmen home in the 15 miles will represent London Clubs v. Paris on May 18th from the same venue.

ARTHUR KEILY, the Derby marathon runner, has written to point out an anomaly in connection with the A.A.A. marathon standard, reduced this year to 2hr. 35min.

A runner can only gain A.A.A. standard in either the A.A.A. Championship or his own area race. Now, for Northerners this means the Doncaster-Sheffield race and for Southerners the Poly Marathon. Two entirely different races with, I should imagine, an average difference in time of something like 6-7 minutes. Yet the same standard applies to both events! The Poly race is obviously the easiest in which to gain A.A.A. standard, yet no Midlander or Northerner can do so because it doesn't happen to be his area championship.

This is all wrong and I would suggest that a certain standard be set for each area race, if over a well known course, perhaps in line with the R.R.C. standard. This would give runners in all areas a fair chance of

gaining A.A.A. standard.

Furthermore, the A.A.A. Marathon date is often announced late and it is usually an embarrassment to marathon men anyway. Why not adopt a measure which I believe originated from Billy McMinnis—to hold it in conjunction with one of the well-known marathons in a different area each year—with a certain standard for that particular course?

Owing to a couple of queries in connection with the Brighton Aquarium Relays, the report of this event will be included next week, and we have so far been unable to obtain an adequate report of the Wolverhampton Relay. It is hoped that this, too, can be given in our next issue.

#### ROAD RACE CLASHES

Dear Sir,

In view of the fact that the A.A.A. Marathon has just been fixed for 10th August, the Coventry Godiva Harriers have decided to cancel their 20 miles race which was to have been held a week later.

I feel that the A.A.A. should fix the date of their Marathon—and also that of the reinstated 10 miles—at least nine months in advance, thereby giving promoters of other distance races a chance to arrange their events without undue clashing. After all, the date of the A.A.A. Senior Track Championships is fixed at least a year ahead.

The Coventry Committee are a very enthusiastic crowd and it seems a pity that all their efforts are to be wasted. I was looking forward to seeing this fairly new venture becoming well established on the fixture list calendar. Perhaps they will follow a suggestion of mine and hold it on 27th July, which is the date one would have expected to find the A.A.A. Marathon taking place, if their usual practice of holding it in conjunction with the Junior Track Championships had been followed.

From Coventry to Peterborough-whilst I sympathise with Mr. Wright's remarks in "Athletics Weekly," about the clashing of the Inter-Counties "20" with the Peterborough Marathon, let me hasten to point out that the R.R.C. has been attempting to get the Counties' Athletic Union to stage this race for more than two years, in order that distance runners may obtain a County vest. The C.A.U. would only agree if they could find a sponsor and, finally, the "News of the World" agreed providing it was held in conjunction with the Whitsun Inter-County Track Championship. Whilst I would like to see the race going to Peterborough and other outlying areas in turn, I'm afraid it is a question of expense and beggars can't be choosers!

Unfortunately the Peterborough entries will be affected, but they should not forget that Counties are limited to three runners each in the "20." I say leave the date as Whit-Monday this year, but how about moving it forward to August Bank Holiday in future years?

No doubt many people will think that the fixture list is getting too congested, but I think it only illustrates the upward increase in popularity of road running.

Finally, may I ask as many road runners as possible to support the "Bernie Hames" Memorial Half-Marathon, which is being staged by Essex Beagles in conjunction with the Joe Louis Trophy Meeting at Barking on 31st August.

#### JOHNSON'S INDOOR 660

Dear Sir,

I think it is rather unfair to dismiss Derek Johnson's indoor 660 at Manchester merely as "fastish." His time of 1:17.9 represents a 1:10.8 pace for 600 yards, and it is reasonable to assume that had he run only 600 yards he would have broken 1:10. The 600 yards is a most popular event in U.S. indoor meets, and nearly every top-ranking American quarter and half-miler in history has run the distance. Yet the world's best, by Mal Whitfield and Tom Courtney—perhaps the two greatest 440/880 runners of all time—is only 1:9.5. So surely Johnson's performance, his first indoors, ranks as a superlative achievement.

less 128 yards, it means they ran only 8 yards, 1 foot, 4 inches—barely four strides—short of 1500 metres. Had Ken Wood sustained his pace for the extra distance he would have clocked 3:38.6 for the metric mile—two whole seconds inside world record figures—and the mile in 3:54.5! At level pace, Wood passed through 1000 yards in 2:13.2, 1000 metres in 2:25.8, and \(\frac{3}{4}\) mile in 2:56.9. Hypothetical 1500 metres times for Ibbotson and Berisford would be 3:39.8 and 3:43.9 respectively. Indoor miling is generally considered to be between one and two seconds faster than outdoors, but nevertheless the performances at Manchester seem too

# HEARTS AND ATHLETES

THE heart is a pump in the form of a hollow muscle, and like any other muscle it becomes more powerful with training.

Blood, which contains food and oxygen, is pushed by the heart through a system of vessels to all parts of the body. At rest the heart pumps roughly a gallon of blood a minute and in severe exercise it can pump 5-7 times this amount by beating faster and more strongly.

It is with some difficulty that the heart at a moment's notice, can undertake severe exertion from a state of rest. The oxygen requirements of the body rise beyond the rate of supply causing an oxygen debt, accompanied by the sensation of fatigue. It takes up to ten minutes to overcome this debt, depending on one's fitness, at which point "second wind" is reached. Hence the value of gradually "warming up" before a race to achieve second wind (and to reduce injuries).

A great physician once said that the burdens imposed by exercise upon the heart, however heavy those burdens may be, never exhaust the heart's reserves. In other words the greatest exertion cannot tire a healthy heart. Fatigue is in the mind as much as in the body.

Fit athletes have highly efficient hearts which beat slowly and strongly, and have a lowered blood pressure. The heart rate or pulse can thus be used as an index of fitness.

It was formerly held that an "Athlete's Heart" was a defective one. This term is now held to mean a heart of superior performance. There is thus no reason why heart disease should be a bar to training if heart function tests show adequate reserves of power.

Sir Adolphe Abrahams, in his new book, "The Human Machine" (Penguin Books 3/6) tells of a Rugby player whose athletic prowess earned for him the title "The Iron Man of South Africa." Yet when he died it was revealed that he had a badly diseased heart, blood vessels and kidneys. In 1940 a case of serious heart disease in a marathon runner was described, and in 1942 a German specialist recorded many such cases. This doctor wrote that the presence of heart disease did not prevent the individual from maintaining a very high standard of physical efficiency.

One must appreciate that heart disease is

not brought about by training, as was formerly thought, but was present in spite of training.

Recent evidence suggests that heavy smoking over many years, and diets rich in fat, may both in the end contribute towards heart disease.

There is already evidence that exercise, performed throughout life, can limit or delay the onset of heart and blood vessel disease.

At the end of a race, blood does not return to the heart but collects in the leg veins, so momentarily the heart has a reduced output with consequent diminished supply to the brain. This is responsible for the dizziness and occasional fainting at the end of a race. The athlete falls down, and now blood flows freely back to the heart. Thus fainting is a compensatory mechanism and not due to "heart

strain." The best treatment is to keep such people covered and resting quietly till they come round.

Dizziness and nausea at the end of a race can usually be avoided by "warming down" and not stopping suddenly. A middle distance runner for example, would be well advised to continue jogging for another lap before finally coming to a standstill.

It may well be that those who have heart trouble should be encouraged to undergo physical training within suggested limits as an aid to confidence and enjoyment of life, and as a form of treatment.

# WORLD NEWS



March 16th, New York. The featured event of the New York Pioneer Club Games was the 600 yards. A surprise winner was John Tucker (23) who caught Reggie Pearman (32) on the tape (a most unusual occurence) in 1:12.8. Bob McMurray was a close-up third, and fourth place went to Dennis Gatto.

Harry Bright, a better runner indoors than out, won the 880 yards in 1:15.3—a time beaten only by Tom Courtney (1:52.2) on a flat board track. George King took the mile in 4:19, Bobby Gordon ran 60 yards in 6.3, and Charley Pratt beat Harrison Dillard's year-old meet record in the 60 yards hurdles, with 7.3.

March 16th, Fort Worth (Texas) Texas University upheld its reputation for producing great sprint relay teams when Wally Wilson, Eddie Southern, Hollis Gainey, and Bobby Whilden combined to clock 40.4 for the 4 x 110 yards relay at the South-Western Recreation meet. The performance was made around two turns. Whilden won the straight 220 in 20.8, a meet record, but was beaten by Bobby Morrow in a 9.5 century. Southern accounted for another meet record in the low hurdles—22.7.

March 22nd, Cleveland. Laszlo Tabori, fully recovered from injury, set about the world indoor two miles record at the Knights of Columbus Games, and came close to succeeding. After being inside schedule for 1½ miles he faded slightly to record 8:54.6 barely four seconds outside the best.

Following his slight exertion the previous week Ron Delany was content to float the mile in 4:10.4, beating Jim Beatty by ten yards. Three other stars who won comfortably in slow times were Ira Murchison (5.4 50 yards), Charlie Jenkins (1:12 600 yards), and Arnie Sowell (2:12.2 1000 yards). Lee Calhoun equalled the world's best of 6.1 in the 50 yards hurdles event.

March 26th, Abilene (Texas) Running for Abilene Christian College against North Texas State University, Bobby Morrow really got moving—clocking 9.3 for 100 yards and 20.0 for 220 yards (straight). Both times equalled the world record, but Morrow was aided by a strong wind. Team mate Bill Woodhouse was second in both races.

### SMALL HEATH WIN LIVINGSTONE RELAY

THE 1957 Livingstone 15 miles road relay will long be remembered for three remarkable record breaking achievements and the fact that eleven runners broke the 15-minute barrier for

the approximate three-mile circuit.

Small Heath Harriers added yet another fine chapter to their impressive Midland record by winning the race in 1hr. 14min, 21sec.—34sec., faster than the previous best figures held by Birchfield Harriers. And it is something else to their credit that all their five runners were inside 15 minutes.

Derby and County A.C., who won last year, were second and also beat the old record.

But perhaps the greatest of the three records set up was that of Derby's Arthur Keily. For an athlete more at home over much greater distances, the English native 30-mile record holder, ran an amazing first stage to beat former colleague Eddie Hardy's best ever time of 14min. 30sec. by just one second.

Imagine the scene as, anxious to give their teams a good start, Keily, Browning (Birchfield), Osborne (Small Heath) and Bateman (BTH Rugby) get away at an incredible pace. By half-way Bateman is dropped and Mills

(Sparkhill) moves up.

It's still Keily and Browning out in front as Osborne falls back. The Birchfield man tries to push away but Keily, by grim determination,

refuses to quit and hangs on.

Keily's persistence pays-off and 300 yards out goes ahead to win by seven seconds. Best times: Keily (14,29) record; Browning (14.36); Bateman (14.40); Mills (14.45) and Osborne (14.59).

Stage 2. Derby's hopes of staying in front vanish quickly as Small Heath's Bill Gray reduces the gap. With a mile to go, he passes Derby's Cartwright who has a bad run (15.34). Gray (14.57) hands on to Trevor Iliffe seven seconds ahead of Alan Taylor (Derby).

Stage 3. This is another good race. Taylor leads Iliffe but is unable to hold out. But it's still an open race with Small Heath only two seconds in front, Best times: Taylor (14.40)

and Iliffe (14.45).

Stage 4. Small Heath strike their winning blow. Skipper John Lake is too good for Hill and hands over to Colin Simpson 30 seconds in front of the Derby runner. Best times: Lake (14.43).

Stage 5. Bullivant tries desperately to put Derby back into the winning picture, but despite his smooth action running, the margin is too wide and Simpson runs in confidently.

Meanwhile, Birchfield, who had dropped behind Coventry, move back into third position. Best times: Bullivant (14.50) and Simpsom

(14.57).
