ZATOPEK : 10,000 Mtrs. in 29:02.6 !

(By ROBERTO L. QUERCETANI)

Emil Zatopek, the phenomenal Czech runner, made a competitive tour of Finland early in August.

In his debut at Helsinki's famous "Elaintarha" (Zoological Garden) Grounds, on August 2nd, Zatopek ran 5,000 mtrs. in 14:06.2—second best ever after Hagg's 13:58.2. Emil's intermediate times were as follows: 1000m 2:48; 2000m 5:37; 3000m 8:27; 4000m 11:20. As a result, his last kilometer (run in 2:46.2) was also his fastest. As usual, Zatopek ran a front race from start to finish. Pentti Salonén of Finland was second in 14:43.0.

Only two days later at Turku, Zatopek astonished the track world with an almost incredible 29:02.6 for 10,000 mtrs.—thus clipping 18.6 off his previous world mark. What is more astounding, Zatopek was again in front from start to finish, thus accomplishing his marvellous exploit with no aid what-

soever. His intermediate times were as follows:

Paavo Ukkonen of Finland was second at 31:56.2. After the race Zatopek declared that he didn't expect such a phenomenal time. In his opinion the Turku track is the fastest he has ever known. It is namely to be noted that on July 20 on the same track no less than 8 runners were clocked in 8:16.2 or better in a 3,000 mtrs. race, with the winner, Vaino Koskela, setting a new Finnish record of 8:10.4.

By the time this appears in print we shall know the results of some of the European Championships in Brussels. The loss of John Wilkinson is a great blow, for we felt sure he could bring home at least one sprint title. Our team has been described as the strongest ever to have been sent to the Championships. It may be, but on looking over the list of Best European Performances we find very few British performances in the first ten places.

Athletes from the U.S.S.R. are very prominent and no doubt much interest will centre round their representatives, providing they do compete. German athletes are also well to the fore and it will be a good thing in many ways when they are brought back to the fold.

Holden in the marathon and Pugh in the 440 are, perhaps, our most likely winners in the men's events, with Pater-son another probable if he can reproduce home form in Brussels. I should like to think that Roger Bannister could "bring home the bacon" but he has taken on far more by going for the 800 metres than if he had concentrated on the longer 1500 metres. He will gain valuable experience, whatever the result.

Another who will do well is John Dis-ley, coached by Geoff Dyson, who can do with more experience in inter-national competition. This will be invaluable to him; if he fails to win he will at least put up a very fine performance.

How the girls will fare depends very much on how the U.S.S.R. women perform. On paper they seem to outclass the other nations, but just how good they are remains to be seen.

Letter to the Editor

OPPOSITION FOR MAC?

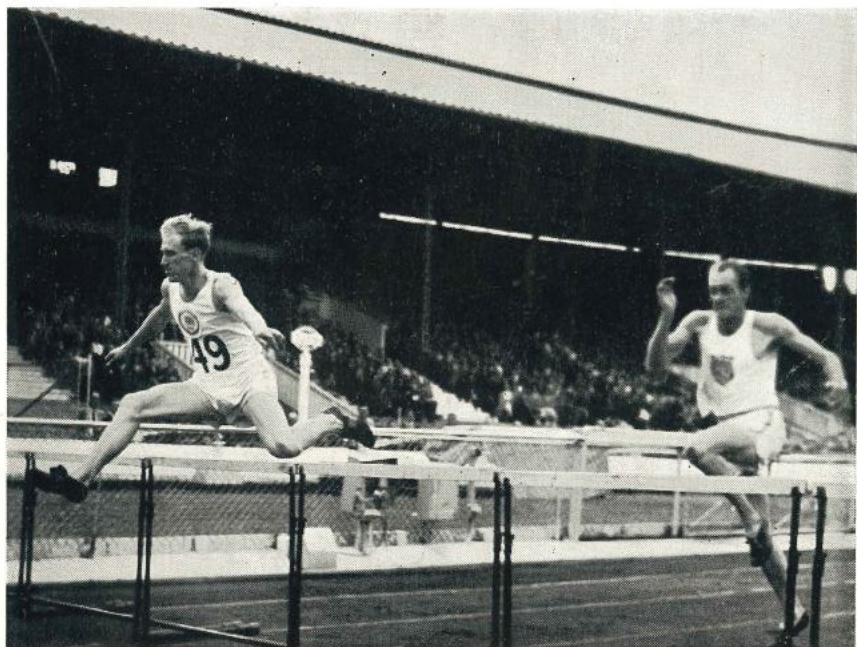
Dear Sir,

It is not often that Britain has a sprinter in the world class, and on the rare occasions when we do one would think that every opportunity would be given to him to compete with other first-class sprinters. Such does not seem to have been the case with McDonald Bailey. With but few exceptions he has run most of his races this season virtually with little opposition (no disrespect intended to other British athletes) and yet has consistently put up times for the 220 Yards that have been right in or near world class, and his British record of 21.1 sec. made in May this year has only been beaten once and equalled twice so far this year in the world. His times of 9.6 and 10.5 secs. for the 100 Yards and 100 Metres he made without being unduly pushed.

I don't wish to suggest that he is a phenomenal runner, but what might he not achieve with regular stiff opposition?

First class sprinters do not last long usually and McDonald Bailey already has had an innings of several years. Before this season ends, and whilst he is still in the peak of condition, could not some of Europe's best sprinters be invited here (or alternatively McDonald Bailey be sent on a tour of Europe?) I feel sure that given the opposition and ideal conditions he could better his 100 Yard record and improve on his figure of 10.5 for the 100 Metres. Also it is just possible that the European record for the 200 Metres is within his capability. There may not be another sprinter of his calibre in Britain for many a season to come. What a pity if the opportunity be allowed to slip now.

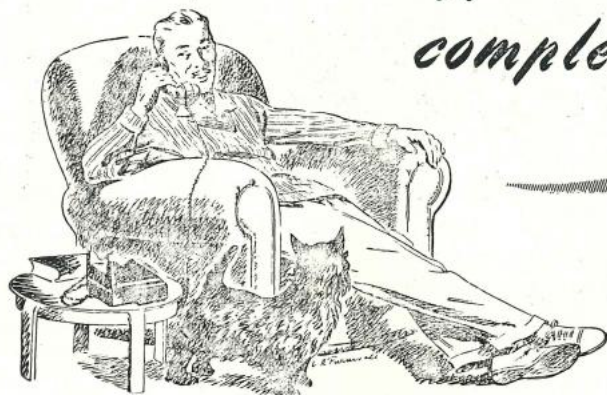

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ATHLETIC CLUBS OF BRITAIN

By JAMES AUDSLEY



WATFORD HARRIERS

AS winners of the Herts cross-country championship and organisers of the Herts track championships, Watford Harriers are taking a prominent part in their county's athletic activities this year: which is appropriate enough, for 1950 is the Harriers' Silver Jubilee year, the club having been formed on February 4th, 1925.

Fourteen runners turned out for the opening run from the George Hotel: but, eight months later, the membership had risen to 70, and that figure has since been multiplied several times. The club started at "The George," but headquarters were soon changed to "The Dog," which was more suitably situated on the outskirts of the town. Here they remained for several years; and, when the next move was made, it was a matter of only a few yards to the present winter HQ at the Municipal Baths. Summer facilities are now available at Cassiobury Park, several times the scene of the county championships and of other meetings promoted by the club, and also at Merchant Taylors School.

The leading spirit amongst the club's founders was L. A. Wilson, of Herne Hill Harriers; and the present membership still includes several of his fellow founder-members, amongst them F. Barber, C. Neal and J. Harris, who still competes in distance events.

The club had to wait only two years for a major success, A. Furze winning the North of the Thames Junior Cham-

ptionship in 1927. Furze went on to further honours, representing Herts and the British Railways and running third in the Empire Games 6 miles at the White City in 1934. Furze was quickly followed into the honours list by W. A. Jordan, who distinguished himself in 1928, when the Harriers first entered the North of the Thames Senior, by finishing first. Team triumphs have included the Herts Cross-Country Championship in 1930, 1937, 1938, 1948 and 1950. Leading the 1950 team home as individual champion was A. Noonan, who is a Welsh international; and the team also included the still active A. J. Collyer, A.A.A. 880 yards champion in 1937 and 1938. Collyer is not the only Harrier to have won high track honours, for the club had a 1936 Olympic gold medallist in F. F. Wolff, who ran in Britain's successful 4 x 400 metres relay team.

In addition to track meetings, the Harriers also promote a popular annual road relay. The club is keen to encourage juniors, and also to play its part in the growing interest in field events. A panel of athletes qualified either officially under the A.A.A. or by experience to coach and assist newcomers to the sport or to particular events has been formed; and the Harriers are fortunate in having such experienced second-claim members as hammer-thrower D. N. J. Cullum and hurdler R. C. Barkway to help in this work.

A.A.A. Team at Paignton

DESPITE heavy rain the day before—and also the day after—the Paignton Regatta meeting was favoured with reasonably good weather, though the track was rather 'dead.'

This only enhances the fine performances of 'Mac' Bailey, who equalled his British record of 9.6s. in winning the short limit 100 and decided to forego the 220 yards open handicap in favour of another 100 yards which was put on by the officials to see if Mac could improve on those figures. He gave three of the best West Country spinners, Ward, Gilpin and Kingwell, six yards. He again showed 9.6s. and was moving really well.

Arthur Wint again won the 600 scratch from Les Lewis and a very promising runner in J. Fennell, of Exmouth. Wint also took the open 'quarter' from scratch in 49.2 secs.

Les Lewis (1) was third to Mac and the local Torquay boy, Ward (5), in the short limit 100 and took second place in the open 220 to Moorhouse of Edinburgh University off 16.

Doug. Wilson, running off 15 yards, took third place in the 880 final, while Jack Ashby (Westbury H.) ran a fine

mile from the 40 yards mark to finish second to M. W. Walker (Devonport Y.M.C.A.), who came again after being passed by Ashby on the last bend.

Tommy Rowe (Herne Hill) looked a certainty for the 3 miles off his programme mark of 320 yds, but the A.A.A. London area handicapper decided this was too liberal and placed him on the 175 mark. But for another special effort by the local boy, Peter Holmes, who always runs above his usual form here, Tommy would still have won off his shortened mark.

M. Moncrieff (Herne Hill) won the high jump at 5ft. 10in., and Kingwell and Roberts retained their Devon county titles, though Gilpin, of Exeter, pushed Kingwell close in the sprint.

Outstanding amongst the girls was M. A. Collins, of the local club, who won both 75 and 150 yards Devon and Cornwall Junior Championships, setting a new record for the latter in her heat and equalling it in the final. Paignton cleared the board here and had the first three in both events, also taking the two open sprints through M. Wright, while Newton Abbot broke the Bristol girls' monopoly in the relay. Eileen Pretty, the fine young Bristol sprinter tells me she is giving up athletics, this being her last meeting.

At the start of the meeting a two minutes' silence was observed to honour the memory of the popular young Paignton half-miler, D. St. Clair Phillips, whose untimely death two days previously from infantile paralysis was a shock to all West Country enthusiasts. One of the best young athletes the West has produced, Phillips ran a 1m. 58s. halfmile when still at school. He had been in the Army a short time and had come down South from his unit near Birkenhead to compete, when he was taken ill.

RACE WALKING

THE R.W.A. Midland Area 50 kilometres championship to-day is the belated conclusion of the various 1949-50 road walking championship, and only just about comes within the road walkers calendar year of October to September. Already notices are to hand of the several Annual General Meetings—the Southern Area A.G.M. takes place at the Polytechnic, Regent Street, on Monday next—and by and large thoughts and plans are more for the 1950-51 season than for the one now rapidly running its course.

Dates for the 1950-51 Championships, and the Districts in which they will be held, are already available—

3rd February — The "Garnet" (10 miles) Championship, in the South.

17th March — 10 Miles National Championship, in the North.

12th May—20 Miles National Championship, in the Midlands.

21st June: 50 Kilometres National Championship, in the South.

Dates for the major open events are already decided, and there is a new one to add to the list, which perhaps fittingly enough, will herald in the new season as the first important promotion for 1950-51. Leicester W.C., long associated with the promotion of distance Open events, strike new ground on 7th October with their first 7 miles Open Walk. There has long been a need in the Midlands for some of the "needle" Open 7's which give a zest to the winter road walking season in the South; and although it means a still earlier start to the competitive season it is to be hoped that Southern walkers

will be reasonably well represented on 7th October, for Midland walkers—and Leicester notably—have in the past come South for the Opens.

However, the present season is not yet disposed of. In addition to the Midland Championship to-day, London Viarians are promoting their first Open 25 miles Walk from Mitcham—a long-established Club event turned into an Open fixture.

Next week, there is an Open walk over the unusual distance of 19 miles, 1,000 yards from Poole to Wareham and back. Then, on the following Saturday, the 9th, comes the distance classic, Surrey W.C.'s London to Brighton Walk. Finally, on 23rd September, walkers will leave the road for the track for Highgate Harriers' annual series of One Hour Walks at Parliament Hill, in aid of St. Dunstan's.

In general, it has been a good season, and I only hope I may be able to report on the European Walks in the next issue in a way that will reflect further credit on British walking.
