

Race Walking

A NOTHER fine win by Young Czech: Vilem Svajda (Spartak Praha Sokolovo), who recently set a new Czech Junior record for 10,000 metres, won the Czech National Junior Championship over the same distance in Prague in 44 mins. 36.6s. More is certainly going to be heard of this young man when

he reaches Senior status.

Re-arranged Coaching Course: The R.W.A. Southern Area Coaching Course for Youths and Juniors has been re-arranged. All young walkers are urged to avail themselves of this opportunity for instruction in style, technique and training for Race Walking.

Any Southern athlete, youth, junior or senior, with individual coaching or training problems is invited to contact Mr. Davies for advice and an effort will be made by the Coaches' Panel to help as much as possible.

Vaughan Thomas Hat-Trick: Vaughan Thomas (Belgrave H) recorded his third win in successive weeks. After winning the Birmingham Open 25 miles and the R.W.A. Southern "20" km, Thomas won the Dover to Canterbury and Return (28 miles) last Saturday, after leading throughout the event. After opening up a lead of something like seven minutes at the half-distance, he tired, and rapidly lost ground and at the finish his lead had been cut to 28 seconds. On the outward journey he was followed by a pack consisting of Bob Clark (Poly), Ray Hall, Ken Bailey and Farley (all Belgrave), Dennis Read (Steyning) and Ken Mason (Surrey). Each tried to break away and Clark and Read eventually did so, but towards the end Clark found the pace too hot and dropped back to finish sixth. This left Read to finish second and Ken Bailey third. This was probably Read's best performance over the longer distances. Belgrave were easy team winners from Surrey and Woodford Green. The Individual Handicap was won by L. Taylor (Cambridge H) off 70 mins.

Reply to Rod Hutchinson: I would like to acknowledge Rod Hutchinson's letter in last week's issue drawing my attention to an error which appeared in my report on the Belgrave Walks. It so happened that I mislaid my brief notes and my memory let me down on this occasion. I was present so I really have no

INCENTIVE TO MILERS

WITH the idea of stimulating our middle distance runners to faster times and, where possible, helping each other to running at a faster pace throughout, Athletics Weekly will present to the next United Kingdom runner recording inside 4 mins. for the mile at a recognised meeting under A.A.A. Rules, with at least one Grade I or II timekeeper officiating, a complete track outfit of track suit, running shoes, vest and shorts. Furthermore, the runner leading at the end of each lap (440, 880 and 1,320 yards) will also receive a suitable award, providing he finishes the race in 4 min. 10 sec. or less.

GUEST COMPETITORS

THOUGH the Referees' action last Saturday in barring guest competitors from competing at the Sward meeting, after they had been invited to do so, is, in my view, to be deplored, it may do some good in that the whole question of guest competitors may now be considered and some policy laid down.

Let me say, first of all, that I have the greatest respect for Bill Plumridge and Vic Sealy and I am sure they acted from the highest motives, not as a few officials do at times, to show their authority and how important they are, forgetting that they are there for the benefit of the athletes. There are no more conscientious officials than these two, but I think their decision was wrong and, in the case of Wilna Fraser in particular, a gross dis-

courtesy to an overseas visitor.

Much depends on the interpretation of a "guest competitor". As I see it, he or she is not in the actual competition. In the case of field events the referee and judges are courteously allowing them a throw or jump in sequence with the other competitors to give them the nearest approach to actual competition they can get. In my view, a referee should allow this providing none of the other competitors protests, and as in most cases they might well learn something from, and feel privileged to join in with a prominent competitor, this is most unlikely. The main point is "Is it in the best interests of athletics?" I think the answer is obvious.

In sprint races there is no question of the course of the race being affected and I was glad to see Marea Hartman getting her way at the W.A.A.A. meeting at Watford, despite one or two dissenting officials, so that Darlene Lombard was allowed to run with the other competitors in the heat and final of the Intermediate 100 yards, though not in the second round as there

were not enough lanes.

In races round the track it is slightly different and there are certain cases where guest competitors could affect a race, such as too many in a half-mile, a closed championship final, etc., and in such cases the referee would have to use his discretion as to whether any other competitors would or could be affected adversely.

In the main, however, the occasional prominent "guest competitor" is, I am sure, welcomed by his or her fellow competitors and their inclusion in the meeting is to the benefit of athletics. The sooner some official statement or policy is made the better for all concerned. Above all, it will prevent such incidents as on Saturday last at Chiswick, where competitors were involved in considerable expense which proved a sheer waste of money, time and travelling, and the decision was certainly against the best interests of athletics and the athletes. I am sure the I.A.C. can be relied upon to take this one up with the powers that bel See page 16 for details of the "A.W." Party trip to

Records Fall at Civil Service Championships

I T was another record breaking day for Civil Service athletes at the 89th Annual Championships held at Hurlingham on Saturday, 20th July. Five records were set and one equalled in the men's events, and two beaten in the ladies.

But the day's best performance came from Geof. North. Always handily placed in the mile he came through strongly in the last lap to win in 4 mins. 18.3 secs. Just over an hour later he completely dictated the pace in the

three miles to beat former holder Peter Mellor

in 13 mins. 59.8 secs.

John Knowles won the 100 yards as he expected in "evens", but although he did get a double it was not the one he expected. Mike Stowe decided to drop from the quarter to sprints this season and it proved to be a wise move. For in the furlong he swept past Mick Marston and then Knowles in the straight for a record 22.0 secs. Knowles completed his double with a 22'7" long jump.

There was disappointment when Terry Keen decided not to defend his title in the 880 yds. When representing London in Milan recently, he picked up a germ and his training suffered. However he ran in the quarter and despite drawing the outside lane made all the running

to win in 49.3 secs.

Pity Keen was unable to run in the "half". Former holder Peter Standen was out for a fast time and only Dave Huser could keep with him for the first quarter. This was passed in 54 secs. and Standen went on to set up a new time of 1 min. 52.5 secs.

Scottish champion Ian McPherson broke his old record in the Shot with a put of $47'2\frac{1}{2}''$ while John Webster was well placed in the field events with wins in the Javelin and Pole

Vault and second in the Hammer.

Outstanding for the ladies was Margaret Tranter. She streaked away in her 220 yds. heat to set a new best time of 25.0 secs. Then completed a fine double with a record 18'6½" in the Long Jump.

DAVID GOCKS 1:50.7 behind FLEET 1:50.1 & SETTI 1:50.7

Andrew Huxtable reports on Brockman Trophy Meeting, Wimbledon Park, July 20th

MIKE FLEET was the most outstanding performer in a meet which conformed to the usual British pattern: a generally high level of performance on the track but a disturbingly low level in the field. Fleet towed the field through the first half in 54.3 and finished strongly to record his best this year. Behind him were seven others inside 1:55.0; the greatest improvement was shown by David Cocks, who as a junior last year ran 1:56.4 and previously this season 1:54.5!

Fleet contributed a 47.4 anchor leg in the 4x440y relay. Other excellent marks came from Laurie Taitt (14.6 in heat and final), Rayfel Roseman (3:47.1—his best ever by a second) and Bill Kerr (29:42.4). The latter's victory was somewhat unexpected for John Card stole what looked to be a winning lead (passing 5 miles in 24:49.6) but inexplicably mistook the 23rd lap for the 24th. He just managed to

salvage second place from Roy Profitt.

Records Fall as A.A.A. 156 pts. beat British Univ. 119 & Comb. Services 102

O NE United Kingdom National record, one Royal Navy record, 4 R.A.F. records, 31 personal bests and ground records shattered in all events bar one (and that one was equalled)—that was the tally at the end of a most exciting match at Alexandra Park, Portsmouth, on July 20th. This delightful ground, overlooking the dockyard, is certainly worthy of more meetings of this calibre. The 21 members of the ground staff had prepared the track to near perfection, resulting in an array of records. Incidentally it was the first time that the 440y hurdles, triple jump, pole vault and hammer throw had ever been held there. Weather humid but good, and no wind.

The 3 miles provided the large crowd with a race which would have done credit to any major championship. Turner led off with a 68.4 first lap with Hyman taking over at ½ mile. The first mile was covered in 4:31.8, Hyman leading after Hill had had a brief spell at the front. Portsmouth runners, Hyman and Dave Cooke, led for most of the second mile, but Turner put in a fast eighth lap with 66.8 and two miles was reached in 9:07.6. He steadied the pace with two 68.2 laps with Hill in close attendance. Hill took the lead at 700y from home and scampered through the bell at 12:30.8.

Fergus Murray, the Scottish champion, made a determined effort to catch Hill on the back straight and, at one point, the result looked in doubt. However, Hill, running in bare feet, shot away to a 59.0 last lap to win by nearly six yards from the fast-finishing guest John Cooke and Mike Turner. Murray, who had taken a lot out of himself in an effort to catch Hill, finished in fourth place and had the satisfaction of clipping 29 seconds off his previous best. The first 5 runners all ran faster than ever before, as also did Evans and Bryant.

The mile found Tulloh leading for \$\frac{1}{4}\$ of the race with 60.8, 2:04.8 and 3:06.5 and Bennett, better known as a steeplechaser, close behind. McKim made his challenge with 300y to go and, with his Hewson-like frame, held off the efforts of Romo, the 20-year-old Texan, and Whetton. Again personal bests were the order of the day, from all but Romo and Tulloh.

John Boulter (22) and Peter Kilford (24) left no doubt who should represent G.B. against the Americans in the half-mile. Boulter led throughout (52.9 at the bell) and Kilford was never more than two yards behind. Great things were happening behind with four new bests. Strangely, after 100y of this race, the order did not once change.

Metcalfe, Steane and Young all had convincing wins on the flat and Parker and Warden both beat Mike Hogan in the hurdles races. In the highs, a total of 19 hurdles were flattened, with Parker contributing to 5 of them. This must surely be a British record!

Tim Johnston, another local man, gave notice of his steeplechasing powers by clipping 15 seconds from his previous best in a well-judged race. He is the 17th Briton to duck under 9 minutes, and is now the 9th fastest of all-time. Four more personal bests in the race.

In the pole vault, Burton cleared 14ft. only to find his pole had passed under the bar. With one jump to make, he had the bar raised to 14'3½" but was nowhere near it. Mackenzie won the high jump by clearing 6'5" with his second try, whilst Miller took three.

Morbey had three over 24ft. and Alsop one in the long jump. Alsop reversed the decision in the A.A.A. Champs. with Ralph in the triple. John Greasley has certainly benefited from his American trip. His series: 229'6", 214'6", 236'11", NT, NT, NT. Another personal best.

An exciting shot competition — Harrison achieving 50'3½" with his 2nd try, Carter 51'2" with his 4th and Lowe pulling out a fifth round 51'7" (an 8½" improvement on his best). Harrison improved to 50'4½" in the last round.

This excellent meeting was climaxed by Roy Hollingsworth's discus throwing. With his third try, he hurled the 2 kilo implement to a British record distance of 184'4", nearly three feet further than Mike Lindsay's effort in America in 1960. Hollingsworth was, of course, unplaced in the A.A.A. Champs. with 140'4".

Congratulations to the organisers of this meeting for a well-run athletics match and full marks to the man who suggested Alexandra Park. In the results that follow. p.b. signifies personal best.

MOSCOW RESULT AN UNPLEASANT SURPRISE — SAYS AMERICAN COACH

WORLD Athletics edited by Melvyn Watman

OMMENTING on the outcome of the U.S.S.R.-U.S.A. athletics match in Moscow, Payton Jordan, head coach of the American national team, said: "We knew the strength of the Soviet squad, and more than once have had occasion to experience it ourselves, but we did not expect anything like this. It has been a surprise, but not a very pleasant one for us, I must say. For we had come here hoping for complete victory.

Louis Fisher, president of the A.A.U., told a correspondent of the newspaper Sovetsky Sport that the match was marvellous from all points of view. "We saw the real goodwill of the spectators, the perfect know-how of the organisers and the incomparable mastery of

the competitors," he added. Congratulating Valeriy Brumel on his new world record and all the Soviet athletes on their victory in the match, he noted the increased skill of Soviet track and field athletes, particularly in the decathlon and hurdles. He singled out young sportsman Anatoliy Ovse-yenko, who after eight events in the decathlon succeeded in jumping 15'1"/4.60 in the pole vault and then made a successful showing in the last event of the programme—the 1,500m. This testified, Mr. Fisher said, not only to high skill but also to high moral strength.

The Soviet girls remain incomparable, he went on to say. The United States sportswomen still have to work hard to reach their level. He stressed that the match had given very much to the athletes of both countries and would help them to prepare better for the

Olympics.

"The main result of the match is the friendship and mutual understanding that were born at the marvellous Moscow Stadium," he de-

clared.

Analysing the results of the match in an article in Sovetsky Sport, the senior coach of the Soviet team, Gavriil Korobkov, agrees with the American sportsmen that the U.S. team this time was the strongest in the history of such matches. The Americans, he says, were trained as well as the Soviet athletes. The Americans competed at the culmination of their competitive period whereas the Soviet sportsmen were only approaching this point.

"As regards their natural gifts, the United States athletes are superior to many Soviet sportsmen," Korobkov admits. He is of the opinion that two factors determined the vic-

tory of the Soviet team. The first of them was their greater sense of purpose and composure. Many of the Americans seemed to be exceptionally nervous and excited. They had a certain over-estimation of their own abilities, which also played a considerable part.

In Korobkov's opinion the second factor that ensured the Soviet team's victory was the Soviet scientific system of training based on knowledge of the objective laws of develop-

ment of athletes.

Referring to the results achieved by the Soviet athletes Korobkov points out that most of them were up to the mark. Of course, Anatoliy Mikhailov "exceeded the plan" in the hurdles and the girls did the same in the 100 and 200m and in the 4x100m relay. The results of the javelin and hammer throwers and those in the 1,500m were somewhat below expectations.



SWEDEN: A SUCCESSOR TO HAGG AND WAERN

A great new middle distance star has arisen in the person of 25-year-old Sven-Olof Larsson, who on June 30th broke Dan Waern's Swedish 3,000m record of 7:59.6 by 0.4 and nine days later scored a brilliant 5,000m victory over Siegfried Herrmann in 13:49.2 to smash Gunder Hagg's 21-year-old national and former world record by 9 sec. "Esso", as he is nicknamed, moved up to 5,000m only last August—clocking 14:06.8 way behind Jim Beatty's 13:45.0 in Turku. Last year he was 3rd in the Swedish 1,500m championship and had a best time of 3:45.8. Larsson possesses excellent speed, clocking 1:50.9 for 800m on July 2nd and a 3:43.2 1,500m. on July 16th.



Welsh Notes

KILBY DID RUN FULL MARATHON

PRESS coverage of Brian Kilby's feat in the Welsh Open Marathon on 6th July was defeatist to say the least, especially in view of the tremendous acclaim given to similar record-breaking runs in recent years in other parts of the country. Was it perhaps because there were so few Press men there to see it?

I have now verified that the Referee, Mr. Charles Wright, a Grade One Track Judge, has been around the course with the Assistant Surveyor to Port Talbot Borough Council, Mr. John Williams, A.R.I.C.S., and their carefully-checked wheel confirms that the distance was 31 feet over the marathon distance. It is fair to say too that Mr. Williams was never in any doubt that this would be so, for he checked the course five times before the race. Brian Kilby's time of 2:14.43 must therefore now go forward for consideration as an all-time best.

I followed the race carefully and was never very far from Kilby. He was guided around roundabouts and main junctions by some very faithful stewards, who stuck manfully to their tasks in pouring rain, and there was never any possibility of any runner cutting corners anywhere

where.

The heavy rain in the early stages did not help the runners, but they all confirmed afterwards that the cool drizzle was a blessing after the first few miles. This course at Aberavon is a flat one almost throughout, and in the conditions that prevailed that day the times recorded did not surprise me. Lt. Col. Lennox, Mr. Jack Jones and Mr. Roy Price were three of the 6 timekeepers that I knew, and my own watch ran to theirs precisely.

Let us hope that Port Talbot Council will revive their Open Marathon shortly, and will

attract Bud Edelen and Brian Kilby.

The Pontardulais Sports will have open track and field events on the programme again this year. It is on Saturday, 17th August. Details from Tom Mogford, 55 Bolgoed Road,

B.P. Llandarcy A.C. will be hosts to the South Wales Track League for the final match on Wednesday, 31st July. The B.P. film of the Perth Games will be shown afterwards, followed by a buffet supper for competitors and officials.

DICK MILLER'S javelin victory in the Sward Trophy (Chiswick, July 27th) constituted a very special achievement. Not only did he beat Colin Smith, but his final winning throw of 243'9" was the best by a U.K. athlete this season and a personal best at the age of 34. Miller, a finalist in the 1952 Olympics and a 200-foot thrower for 13 seasons running, added over 5 feet to his previous peak. His series: $198'2\frac{1}{2}''$, foul, $218'2\frac{1}{2}''$, foul, 195'5", 243'9".

The women's javelin event produced an equally pleasurable result in that Susan Platt ended her run of poor performances this year with a fine throw of 172'6". For the first time this season she got the better of Rosemary Morgan (by over 22ft.) and her winning throw ranks her 11th in the world. Her series: 157' 3", foul, 165'2", 172'6", 171'6", 150'0".

Considering the whole object of the Sward and Norrkoping Trophy competition is to encourage the field events the decision of field events referee Bill Plumridge in refusing to allow certain athletes from non-participating clubs to compete, despite their having been invited by the organisers, seemed a misguideed An unsatisfactory compromise reached in the case of Wendy Thomas and the South African Wilna Fraser (who at a cost of £100 had specially stayed on for this meeting); they were grudgingly allowed to throw the discus and put the shot respectively "solo" at the conclusion of the competitors. Mike Lindsay, whose name was even on the programme as a guest, declined with thanks and instead went through a vigorous workout (which included a putt of about 60ft.) after the meeting.

The invitation mile was nothing to write home about, Peter Keeling romping home in 4:04.9. John Boulter's 4th place can be discounted as he arrived only a few minutes before the event after hitch-hiking from Oxford where he sat an examination in the morning. The 2 miles was a much better race, with Geoff North pipping John Herring in a personal best

of 8:50.4.

THE LATE CHARLES ALLEN

Mr. Charles Allen, stalwart of Buckinghamshire athletics, died at his home in Chestnut Avenue, High Wycombe, on July 10th at the age of 82.

Born in London, Mr. Allen moved to High Wycombe in 1907. He was founder of Wycombe Phoenix Harriers and was Hon. Secretary for 35 years. In 1947 he got the club going again after the war and was largely responsible for the building of the Club's headquarters.

President of the Wycombe club for the past 15 years, Mr. Allen was a founder member of the Bucks A.A.A., Chairman for many years, and was the Association's President. He will be best remembered by many athletes for the great Wycombe meetings he organised before the last War which were famous throughout the country. He was also keenly interested in football and from 1925-27 was match secretary Wycombe Wanderers, serving on their club committee for 30 years.

ENGLAND BEAT NORWAY 133-81, Bergen, July 24/25

A STRONG England & Wales team (plus Scotsman Mike Lindsay) showed no mercy towards the Norwegian opposition, winning by no fewer than 52 points (133-81) in Bergen on July 24th and 25th. The British competitors placed first and second in every track event and took both relays but lost the field events

section of the match 43-45.

The sprinting was of a high order. Ron Jones missed the U.K. 100m record by a tenth yet was himself only a yard up on Derek Young, making his international debut an auspicious one. In the 200m Dave Jones put in a typical finishing burst to overhaul Peter Radford. Competing for Norway, Richard Simonsen, from Southsea, finished last in both sprints but his times of 10.7 and 21.9 were fine for a junior.

Adrian Metcalfe ran with authority to win the 400m, while John Boulter was similarly untroubled in the 800m. Graham Dean, in his first international, did well to grab second but the showing of that experienced pair, Alan Simpson and Peter Keeling, in the 1,500m was less satisfactory. They won all right from modest opposition but their times were pedes-

trian.

John Anderson turned in his best performance this season by outsprinting Don Taylor in a fast 5,000m. Ron Gomez was far from his inspired A.A.A. form in the 10,000m but held second place nearly 100 yards behind Gerry North. Maurice Herriott scored his customary victory, but for once Laurie Taitt was beaten to the tape—by his persistent rival, Mike Parker. John Cooper, well supported by Robin Woodland, in the longer hurdles event, ran brilliantly to clock 51.5 on a soggy track and he seems certain to descend to 51 or lower before very long.

The British team experienced mixed fortune in the jumps. John Morbey set a personal best in the long jump and Rex Porter came close to his U.K. pole vault record but the high jumpers were diasappointing and an injured Fred Alsop took only one half-effort trial in

the triple jump.

The position in the throws was brighter: Roy Hollingsworth threw the discus farther than any other U.K. athlete has ever reached; Mike Lindsay provided good support and won the shot; Howard Payne beat Norway's redoubtable hammer pair; and Colin Smith and John Greasley did well to split two 260-footers in the javelin.
