

# BASIL HEATLEY ONCE MORE "MIDLAND" WINNER

COVENTRY GODIVA made it a "grand slam" of victories in the Midland Championships at Derby. They collected all six team and individual awards, the first clean sweep in the history of the event.

Basil Heatley led the way with a superb fifth success in the senior race, striking top form to beat the favourite, Eddie Strong (Bristol), by some 200 yards. Heatley broke clear of Strong and Dom Keily on the last lap and forged

further ahead to win easily.

Godiva, with 6 in 14, retained the team award, although Derby, with 9 in 43, look a better prospect for the National. Coventry will be without Eire-born internationals Neville, 8th at Derby, and McDermott 14th, on the day, although they overcame a similar handicap to win last year.

The four most likely contenders for the individual senior race appear to be Basil Heatley, Ron Hill, Mel Batty and Gerry North, though there are others, Mike Turner and Eddie Strong in particular, who could be up with these four. A great race seems in prospect.

The team race could be just as exciting, with Derby coming back and having great strength in depth, and Portsmouth on the up-grade again. Well though they ran last Saturday, I cannot see Northern champions Manchester & Dist. Lads Club H. upsetting these two or Coventry Godiva.

Details of the course and local arrangements will be found on another page. Remembering the Inter-County race at the same venue in 1962, I feel sure everything should go like clockwork.

With the National next week, there is a rather quiet week-end this week. The Welsh Senior Championship goes on at Penlan, the Berks, Bucks & Oxon race at High Wycombe, the Midland Counties hold their Indoor Meeting, which incorporates the Midland Women's Indoor Championships, at R.A.F. Cosford, and other events include the Imperial College Hyde Park Road Relay, Hove Senior Relay and Youths Road Race, Beds. & Hunts. Youths & Boys events, Notts. Junior, Youths & Boys, Kent League race at Chislehurst, and Chichester A.A.C. Women's Senior and Junior C.C. Races at Goodwood.

The resignation of Norman Cobb as Hon. Secretary of the A.A.A. Club will not come as a surprise to those who knew that he was the B.A.U. nominee for the post of Hon. Secretary of the A.A.A., now held by Ernest Clynes. Well liked and respected by his colleagues, Norman Cobb has been doing much excellent work, particularly in the development field.

With the reports and results of the Area Championships all in this issue, a number of readers' letters and other items have had to be held over until next week. I regret that the number of places given in the Northern Championships, team and individual, are not as many as we had intended, but Secretary Fred Ireland was indisposed and it was only thanks to the helpful co-operation of President Stan Thompson (North Shields Poly) that we were able to give as many as we have.

# TIMSBURY EVERY TIME, SAY ATHLETES

Dear Sir,

It would be a pity if Martell's anti-Timsbury diatribe were allowed to go unchallenged, since the false impression he has trued to create might discourage athletes from enjoying the benefits of Timsbury. Would you therefore be kind enough to allow me space to present

a few facts?

Firstly, however, let me say that I agree that a week's get-together at Timsbury, followed by an acclimatisation period in Tokyo before the Games, will involve competitors in a long time off work, and I personally regret this, though I do not understand Mr. Martell's relativity that makes a week at Crystal Palace take less time than one at Timsbury. In any case it is better to take too long off than to repeat the fiasco of Rome. Then, despite protests, many of us were shipped out well after the opening ceremony and not allowed to stay till the close. The idea of team spirit and Olympic spirit was a non-starter.

The International Athletes' Club was determined that this should not happen again and there was strong feeling that, since our opponents enjoyed the advantages of teambuilding training camps, then so should we. But the athletic authorities were unwilling, or unable, to organise such a camp prior to the European Games in Belgrade. Accordingly, at very short notice, the I.A.C. arranged a gettogether at Timsbury for the week before the

team left for Belgrade. Thanks to the

generosity of Oliver Cutts this was a success

and most of the 35 who managed to attend performed very well.

We therefore decided that we should repeat the venture before the Olympic Games and that we should do it in style and with plenty of advanced notice. Since then, however, officers of the B.A.A.B. and the A.A.A. have visited Timsbury, and it is indicative both of the advance of Timsbury and of a new progressive spirit which is now sweeping officialdom, that they should have decided to

run the pre-Olympic week officially.

And now to Mr. Martell's chief bleat—the "dubious athletic facilities" as compared with those at the Crystal Palace which would "enable our team to work at proper schedules and sprint relay training under the national and other senior coaches". Let me say at once that I am delighted about the Crystal Palace facilities. We need them all, but who is Mr. Martell to tell us what are "proper schedules"? Does he imagine that top athletes

need to recline in style in chromium-plated bedrooms, fanned by slaves to the strains of soft music, and that they must only train "almost in the centre of London", preferably under cover?

No, Mr. Martell, we're not that soft! What an athlete needs just before supreme competition is to get away from it all to training facilities with an informal atmosphere, and

grass and trees and fresh air.

At Belgrade some wise planners had laid out a training circuit winding through trees. When our middle and long distance men discovered it, we forsook the normal track for it. When we returned home, we planned one for Timsbury. Twelve months later trees had been cleared, swamps drained, and bridges built. The circuit has already been enjoyed by hundreds of athletes including many top internationals. Similarly, first class throwing areas have been constructed and the best jumping facilities in the country have been, and are being built. A sprint strip is nearly completed and Mr. Martell will be interested to know that the Chief National Coach was very impressed with the general facilities when he recently came down to help with the first of a series of courses being organised by the I.A.C. to encourage promising athletes. Indeed, he specifically asked that we should invite the G.B. sprint relay squads to attend the course for sprinters this week-end and they are at Timsbury now, under his guidance and that of the other National relay coach.

Meanwhile, Mr. Martell announces that Timsbury is not only unfit for international athletes, but also for "grade one plus senior athletes" and he would have it closed (when, by the way, was he last at the Manor, if at all)?

I should like to add that any athlete, of whatever standard, can enjoy the facilities of the Manor for a charge of only 15/- for 24 hours of board and lodging. The I.A.C. is, in fact, using money raised by its members to pay the fares of those invited to the present series of courses, and in any case there are more who would like to attend than the Manor has room for. Quite apart from these courses, athletes slept 1.643 nights at Timsbury during the second half of last year and many more come down for the day. We hope that Mr. Martell can be persuaded to allow them to come again.

I would like to answer Mr Martell's objections to Timsbury Manor, both as one who is connected with the work at Timsbury and also as one of the athletes who hopes to

be at Tokyo in October.

I am sure that all of us in the sport applaud the opening of the Crystal Palace centre; it is something that has been awaited for years. However, it is not necessarily the answer to all our problems. Mr. Martell seems to think that nothing could be better for the Olympic team than to be in the heart of London before leaving for the Games, and that to go as far as 70 miles from London is in itself a grave mistake.

In my experience the pressure on athletes before the Games is one of the team's biggest problems; down at Timsbury Manor we have a far better chance of being able to relax. The facilities there are by no means dubious and by September we shall be able to cater adequately for every event. The only thing lacking is a 440 yard track, for which one has to go to Southampton—about 20 minutes by car. The success of the training week-ends down there is sufficient evidence for the facilities.

The days of wood-chopping are now in the past. However, athletes are expected to help in things like washing-up. This is unlikely to injure anyone's Olympic chances and the self-help outlook plays a positive part in creating the cheerful atmosphere which is such a

feature of the Manor.

Mr. Martell compares our plans unfavourably with other countries. From what I know of other countries' plans, such as the Germans, who are going to the U.S.A. to compete en route to Tokyo, the idea of a week in the country seems much more likely to give our athletes the calmness and confidence they will

need.

With regard to the question "Is Timsbury needed?", the answer is "Yes, Yes, Yes." The Crystal Palace cannot cope with all the training courses, tournaments and rallies for all the different parts. Athletics needs a centre where officials, coaches and athletes can work together to build a national team, both for this year and the future. Timsbury Manor provides this. The money and example of Oliver Cutts, Des Pond, and their many helpers could not be devoted to a better cause. Mr. Martell's suggestion that it is a "rest-home" for "retired" or "non-genuine" athletes is laughable.

#### THOSE COSFORD TIMES

Dear Sir,

In reply to the letter of Mr. Huxtable on the question of the validity of the times that Peter Radford and Maureen Tranter ran at Cosford on December 11th, I feel that the

matter wants clearing up.

I will deal with the points in Mr. Huxtable's letter first, 1. The 100yds is clearly marked (checked by Bill Marlow last week). It is true that there is a common finish line; 6yds 1 foot beyond is the 100yd finish line. If, as Mr. Douglas says, the post was in the wrong place, and Radford ran 'short', then his time had he ran the whole distance would have been approximately 10.2. This I cannot agree with, I have seen Radford run many times since a youth and Peter was certainly not running as slow as that, furthermore Bill Marlow states he had not seen Peter run as well for 4 years. The next point I would like to take up is this-when Mr Douglas spoke to Frank Davies I don't know, but Frank has not been at either meeting, so how he was in a position to say it was the wrong finish I don't know. I have spoken to him and he does recall speaking to someone about the instance 18 months ago, when we know the wrong finish was used, AND, in point of fact, he was responsible for the post being put in the wrong hole, but he most certainly would not have passed an opinion on something he knew nothing about.

I have spoken to the referce for the meeting, Mr. C. C. Harris. He had not read the correspondence and took exception to the fact that his refereeing was in doubt, and emphatically insisted that the post was in the correct position—he made a point of checking it. The chief timekeeper for the meeting was

A. Tomkins, a grade 1 timekeeper.

A point was also made about the slow times over 60yds. I stated in my report, if Mr. Huxtable read it, that Radford had shocking starts in his 60yd., and Maureen-this is one of her bad points at the moment-an even slower start. We have also found over the past 7 years of running indoor meets that temperature can affect sprint times quite a lot. December 11th was a comparatively warm night, 8th January was distinctly colder. Peter had put in a hard week's training over 330yds. previous to the 8th January meet, and was not in the same form as a month earlier. Perhaps Mr. Huxtable would like to come up to our next meeting on 22nd February at 2.15 p.m. I can always find him a job, Referee's steward if he likes.

THE English Cross-Country Championships will be held on Western Park, Leicester, on February 29—the same venue used for the


1962 Inter County race.

to the finish.

Competitors travelling by special train from the South will be met on arrival at St. Pancras by programme sellers who will also be pushing them on the train. Bells will be sounded in the schools 20 minutes before the start of each race. A maroon will be fired five minutes before the start of each race. All races will be started by maroon.

The Course. Each lap is 2 miles 1,640 yards, plus 700 yards from the start to the beginning of the lap. The distance are: Youths-3 miles 580 yards; juniors—6 miles 460 yards; senior— 9 miles 340 yards. One, two and three laps

respectively, plus the start.

It is suitable for spikes and most of the course is on good running surfaces within the park. The South-West corner of about half-amile is over stubble and rough land. There are a number of sharp rises, one steep descent which crosses the width of a tarmac road at the bottom, but this will be covered with sand. The races will be run in the opposite direction to the inter-county of 1962 and is considered to be a little harder.

THE Australian sporting world, reports Bernie Cecins, is buzzing with rumours of a possible comeback by Herb Elliott. It all started a few weeks ago when Herb took his wife and children for a visit to Percy Cerutty at Portsea. The social call soon turned into a hectic training session with Herb taking a 15 minute workout on the trampoline and a few dashes up the famous sandhill. At the end of it all Cerutty pronounced Elliott fit enough to get back into serious training and lick Snell over 1,500m in Tokyo.

### off-beat track notes

Just before he left Perth for Melbourne to settle down in his new job as a chemical products officer Elliott said that wild horses wouldn't drag him back on the track. Now, with Cerutty using his techniques of persuasion, Elliott might change his mind.

If he does (and he has been running 15-20 miles a week for some time just to keep fit) he is young enough—26 on February 25th—to have many years of top class running ahead of him. In similar conditions Ron Clarke has proved it could be done. And perhaps this has been one of Cerutty's arguments: "If Clarke has done it with no-one behind him, what couldn't we do!"

### Merry marathon runner

Dateline: Culver City (California), December 14th, 1963. Sixty seven runners line up for the start of the annual Western Hemisphere Marathon. The gun cracks and off they set on their 26 mile journey.

Simultaneously, two young women clad in running gear emerge from behind some bushes across the street and start off in pursuit of the men. No, it isn't Sadie Hawkins Day nor is it yet leap year; these girls are planning to become the first female marathoners in history! Some of the officials have other ideas but, as the quotation goes, man has his will—but woman has her way.

"An AAU official grabbed me while I was running," said petite Mrs. Lyn Carman (26), mother of three daughters, "so I punched him." Lyn passed several competitors before having to retire at 18 miles because of her leg muscles tightening up, but her friend, who revels in the name of Merry Lepper, did complete the distance.

Merry, a blonde student who turned 21 seventeen days later, was timed in 3 hours 37 minutes 7 seconds, which at an average of about 84 minutes per mile sounds pretty good.

Here is what Merry told reporter Jim McKone

after the race: "One day last March I saw the Carmans running, so I asked to join them. I had tried to work out on my own, but it's hard to keep up your interest. I've lost about 30 pounds since March, although I run only four miles a day usually.

"I didn't get near anybody until the last few laps. Then I passed eight men who were still running, all of them on the last mile. I think I really expected to finish, for the first time, about the 15 mile mark. I never had run over 17 miles before. But suddenly I began to feel better. The tenseness was gone.

"If you get past a certain point, you think you can go the rest of the way. When I finally passed Lyn it seemed to give me a boost—although I felt bad that she couldn't finish."

Next day Merry made light of her blistered feet by going out for a short jog. Her future plans? She may try for a place in the USA's Olympic team at 800m though she feels she has insufficient speed.

Ralph Boston's performances and sportsmanship have won him countless admirers the world over. Alastair Aitken asked him which athlete he admires most. Murray Halberg was the answer. "Because of the way he had been injured in an accident causing his arm to be deformed and he fought back to be the greatest in the world. To me this means something and for real determination I would like to pattern myself after Murray Halberg."

Boston believes his great long jumping is due to his ability at other events. "I found when I high jumped a lot and then came back to the long jump my jumps were always better, as I got more height in the leaps and the jump itself was much further. As far as steps are concerned, my hurdling each week in competition helps that and my approach becomes much better. My belief is that the more hurdling you do the better your approach to the board becomes."

After long jumping 25'8"/7.82 indoors last month Boston said: "At the beginning of the indoor season I had ideas about working on a number of events which would aid me in the decathlon. I have changed my mind since then. Now I'll concentrate primarily on the hurdles and broad jump."

# O'HARA RUNS 3:56.6

T OM O'HARA (21) smashed Jim Beatty's a full two seconds at Madison Square Garden, New York, on February 13th to become America's newest track idol. The early pace was only moderately fast (60.0, 2:01.3, 3:01.6) but then O'Hara unleashed a final quarter of 55.0 to win by some 50y from John Camien (4:06.9) with Francesco Bianchi (Italy) a distant 3rd.

It may or may not be significant to note that the average differential between indoor and outdoor personal bests of the nine men below O'Hara is 3.1 seconds. Can we expect an outdoor mark of 3:53.5 from him?

Bruce Kidd is back to top form. He pulled away over the last 700y to win the 3M in New York on January 30th in 13:32.4 after Ireland's Tom O'Riordan had set the pace with 4:27.1 at the mile and 9:07.5 at 2M. Two weeks later he won a thrilling 2M in 8:42.6 by inches from Bob Schul, with Australian Ron Clarke a close third.

Bill Crothers followed up his personal best 600y of 1:09.7 (ahead of Bill Cornell's U.K. record 1:11.1) in Winnipeg on January 25th with a world record equalling 800m of 1:49.5 five days later. Jorg Lawrenz (W. Germany) set the mark last year. Crothers carried on to 880y and was clocked in 1:50.0, a tenth shy of Peter Snell's record, but fast enough to defeat Ireland's Noel Carroll by a couple of yards. Next night, in Boston, Carroll contributed a sizzling leg of 1:48.7 to Villanova University's record breaking 4x880y team. At this meet, Wendell Mottley (Trinidad) broke Roy Cochran's 22-year-old world best for 440y on a board track with a 48.0 clocking.

Bill Baillie's intermediate times in his 8.31.9 2M, in which he led throughout, were 2:03 at 880y, 4:13.0 at 1 M and 6:23.0 at 1½M. Gaston Roelants was close for ½M but a leg injury caused him to drop out.

Crowds at this year's indoor meets seem to be bigger than ever. The Millrose Games (January 30th) were held on a Thursday night for the first time, but all the reserved seats were booked well ahead of the night and the gate totalled 16,004.



# **TOKYO MEDAL PROSPECTS**

#### MARGARET BURVILL

USTRALIAN girl sprinters always take a lot of beating, and the Games Tokyo should see a strong challenge. With Betty Cuthbert presumably concentrating on the 400m it is likely that Margaret Burvill (extreme left in the photo) will spearhead the Australian assault. She is a very fine all-round sprinter, with the following clockings to her credit: 7.2 for 60m (equal to world record but made in a time trial), 10.5 for 100y (and 10.4 in a time trial), 220y in 23.2 (equal to Betty Cuthbert's world record), 330y in 39.3 and 440y in 55.3. Her strongest event must be the 200m, her converted time of 23.1 being a tenth faster than Dorothy Hyman's European record. She was a disappointment at Perth, finishing some 6v down on Dorothy in 3rd place, but was badly left at the start. She has developed quite considerably since then and at this stage must be considered Dorothy's leading rival for the 200m gold medal. Born in Perth on October 2nd 1941, she stands 5'5"/1.65 and weighs 116lb/53kg.

#### DOROTHY HYMAN

THERE is not much one can say about Britain's sprint queen that has not been said a dozen times before. Her modest demeanour off the track and her zest on the cinder path have endeared her to the whole population. Liked and respected by everyone in athletics, Dorothy has been a marvellous ambassadress for the sport. There is not much scope for sentimentality in the realm of international athletics but if anyone deserves to win a gold medal it's Dorothy. In race after race, on every sort of track, in every type of weather, in countless countries, Dorothy has never given less than her best. Her prospects for Tokyo look, at this distance, equally rosy for both sprints. Such is her flair for the big occasion that in the right conditions she will more likely than not be ready for 11.3 and 23.0 on the day. The onus is on her rivals to trim their times to this level and then reproduce them when it counts. Our photo shows Dorothy winning a 220y semi-final from Burvill and Brenda Cox in Perth.

# NATION WIDE **CLUB CONTEST**

REAT BRITAIN is one of the few Countries in Europe which does not stage a National Athletic Championship for clubs. Although it is not likely that such a championship will be staged for a few years to come the NUTS, in co-operation with "Athletics Weekly", hope to go some way towards remedving this position in 1964.

It is proposed to find a champion club in each of three categories for both men and women. The three categories will be:-- Group 1: Clubs with over 150 members. Group 2: Clubs with over 50 members. Group 3: Clubs with under 50 members.

The best performance in each Olympic first-claim member in bona-fide competition during the year will be scored on the International Tables. This will produce a ranking list which will appear bi-monthly in "Athletics Weekly". Clubs are eligible to compete in a higher category than their own and in this ways the falt bety clubs of ellipses will be scored. in this way it is felt that clubs of all sizes will be encouraged to take part,

One important detail is that no club will be ranked unless it can provide a performer in each event. This should lead to clubs persuading athletes to try the "cinderella events" such as pole vault, hammer and 440 yards hurdles. Thus the club will receive a ranking and it is hoped that Britain's overall standard will rise in the events mentioned above.

It would be appreciated if views could be forwarded to me so that the scheme can receive a good send-off.

# BATTY HOLDS OFF NORTH TO WIN THE "SOUTHERN"

THE course for the Southern C.C. Championships, at Parliament Hill on February 15th, was much better and firmer than one could normally expect at this time of year and though the slight wind was cold, conditions were excellent and we saw some fine racing, even if the individual results were, in the main, "cut and dried" early on.

North was 50 yards ahead of Tulloh, who had John Cooke trying desperately to hold on a few yards behind; then a gap of 80 yards before Taylor came through, now 50 yards clear of Briault, who in turn had 50 yards to spare from Hyman and Dave Cooke. Portsmouth were out on their own in the team race, but there was a good race going on for second place.

No changes took place on the final lap amongst the leaders, but it was noticeable that Gerry North, not long back in proper training, cut down Batty's lead to less than 30 yards; obviously he will be one to watch in

the "National" next week.

Portsmouth "walked" the team race and S.L.H. surprised by taking a clear second place ahead of Belgrave and Surrey A.C.—who almost certainly lost second place through the loss of run-away South of Thames winner Dave Gibson, who was reserving himself for the Army Championships a few days ahead.


