SNOW STOPS NORTHERN "JUNIOR"

THE 1961 Championships programme made a bad start in the North for the Northern Area "Junior" 10 Miles, to have been held at Bradford on Saturday, was postponed owing to snow. Rain in other districts turned into a blizzard in the Bradford area and the roads were soon covered inches deep in slush. With the course following mainly by-roads there was not enough traffic about to clear it. New date is February 11th.

Milder weather in the South accounted for slower times generally than of late. Stan Vickers, who is avoiding a hard programme this winter, scored a sixth consecutive success in the Stock Exchange 7 miles at Regents Park but made no attempt to set a fast time. Vickers gained a quick 100 yards on the first of the five laps then eased off to win in 53.32 and by less than a minute from Ray Pearce who had a hard fight with Ray Hall before getting away by a few yards in the last mile. The former Stock Exchange champion and Olympic Walker, Don Tunbridge, made a reappearance and he finished 9th just outside the 60 minutes. There was a record finish in the team race with four clubs covered by two points.

Eric Hall held the Belgrave "Ten" without any difficulty in 80.13, John Knifton second three minutes behind. At Parliament Hill George Meadows, without a race for several months, retained the Highgate title scoring his fifth win in six years. Meadows had 1m. 29s. to spare over John Northcott.

Don Thompson had four minutes advantage over brother Nigel in the Met's Inter-Club "10" at Alperton and won in 79.03. "Dynamo" Don is still hammering away without a let-up week in and week out and he supports, as he has always done, any and every Club fixture and Open race, big or little.

A COMPARISON

No doubt inspired by the rumbles of shamateurism in Germany and Scandinavia, and the article by Mike Agostini in the U.S.A. which has been given plenty of publicity in the national press, we are getting numerous comments from some athletes about the cost of participation in athletics and of expenditure being too heavy.

I know that in some cases throwing implements can be expensive, but for runners in particular our sport is still one of the cheapest. It bears no comparison to cricket or tennis, for example, where clothing, bats, rackets and club fees are very much more expensive for the ordinary club player than outgoings incurred in athletics. are some who always expect something for nothing and want their sport and recreation served up to them on a plate at little or no cost to themselves. I suppose the growth of the Welfare State has encouraged this kind of thinking, but I believe, as I know many others believe, that we should expect to pay for our sport, just as we have to pay for other pleasures such as T.V., drinking, smoking or having a good time and enjoying ourselves in our respective ways.

Odds & Ends. Pat Brian, N.U.T.S. Hon Secretary, asks me to draw attention to the list of "standards" printed on another page and his request for performances to be sent to him for inclusion in the Best Performer lists which have now become a regular feature in track and field athletics. Incidentally, all results sent to us are automatically passed on to the N.U.T.S.

Longwood H. Secretary, Mr. J. G. Beckett, mentions that his recent letter about the Hog's Back Road Race entry contained a misprint. He was claiming the Waterloo Road Race entry of 348 as a record and compared it to that of the Hog's Back Race, which was 306, not 360 as printed.

In the scramble to get the Inter-County results in last week I inadvertently allowed the unamended version of Melvyn Watman's mile survey to be printed. Melvyn hastens to include the amendments at the end of this week's Overseas News, and the number of them shows how rapidly the middle distance standards are rising and how quickly marks are outdated.

The Eastern Counties Championship results arrived as we were going to press, and these, with a number of other results we were unable to include in this week's issue, will be published next week.

INDOOR MEETING ON LARGER COSFORD TRACK

A LTHOUGH performances at the Cosford indoor meeting (17th January) were not as good as previous meetings, the most important factor was that the Midlands have now got the use of what must certainly be one of the largest indoor tracks in the world, if not the largest.

Incidentally the ceiling height would permit the finest pole vaulters in the world the opportunity of adding to the world record, without the risk of being decapitated—so there must surely be the prospect of an international indoor athletics meeting in the Midlands before long.

Coming back to the latest athletics performances at Cosford, we again saw some fine sprinting over 60 and 100 yards by Daphne Arden (Birchfield H.), a notable sprint double by D. England (Small Heath H.), a steady quarter by Olympic runner Barry Jackson (Lozells H.), and a cleverly run half mile by R. Hughes (Wolverhampton H.).

But the race to capture the imagination of the spectators was race "B" of the men's mile. Bilson runner B. Butler, made a great effort to get with the leaders approaching the start of the final lap, gained the lead, only to be chased stride for stride by T. O'Reilly (Small Heath H.). Cheered on by the crowd the Bilston runner forced the pace, but wilted right on the finishing line to concede victory to his Small Heath rival—although both were credited with the same time.

GRIM CONDITIONS

As will be seen from the accompanying photographs, conditions at Bingley for the Inter-County Cross-Country Championship were rather grim, both for the runners and the officials.

BOB SMITH REPLIES TO CRITICISM OF INTER-COUNTY ORGANISATION

Dear Sir.

Peter Palmer's criticism of the washing facilities at Bingley was, I regret to say, justified to some degree, but his remarks "that the organisers had not taken the trouble to cater for the correct number" was, to say the least, an insult; his objection to the inclusion of a Boys' Race is beyond my comprehension.

Regarding washing facilities:—The Boys had the use of 3 washrooms, there was no shortage of water or complaint from them.

The Seniors used 4 washrooms and the early users had an ample supply of hot water, this was obvious by the amount of steam issuing from the rooms, then for some unknown reason the supply failed in 2 washrooms and was not restored until after all competitors had left. I regret any inconvenience caused by this shortage.

No amount of planning or pre-arranging could cope with such a situation, although Mr. Palmer, in his wisdom, would have been able to deal with a simple situation like this.

With reference to catering:—I would say that any Official or Competitor who did not obtain a meal could only blame himself; 551 teas were served in the Main Hall, official admission was by a pink tea ticket, and after everyone had been served there was enough food left for a further 60/70 meals. A number of competitors were, however, admitted to the Hall on the production of a cream coloured ticket, as either their team managers had not collected the official tea tickets or not distributed them to the team. Before the presentation of the awards the doors to the Hall were opened to everyone.

It was noticeable that a number of unauthorised people, including ladies, received teas in the Hall, this excess number caused a slight delay and hold up at the door. From where and whom these people obtained their tickets is a mystery, the abuse of this privilege is not fair to the Daily Telegraph who sponsor the event, or to the organisers.

It must have been a tragic sight to see

Mr. Palmer and his retinue "trudging through the sleet and slush" (10 minutes walk) into Bingley for a meal.

As to the Boys' Race, I cannot see any connection in Mr. Palmer informing us that he is a schoolmaster, and Boys competing in conjunction with the main event.

The inclusion of a Boys' Race was approved by the *Daily Telegraph* and the C.A.U. as being a good idea and may well become an Annual Event, I hope it does, as there is room for a National Race for Boys.

Overseas News

FANTASTIC HIGH JUMP BY BRUMEL

ALERIY BRUMEL (USSR), the 18year-old co-holder of the Olympic record, jumped higher than any man ever when he cleared a remarkable 7'42" in Leningrad on January 28th. The previous highest on record was last year's clearance of 7'33" by John Thomas (USA). Brumel's own previous best was his European record

of 7'23" made last October.

Brumel, who was born on April 14th, 1942, has progressed at an astonishing rate. In his first year of competition, 1956, he jumped only 4'7''. He improved to $5'8_8'''$ in 1957, $6'4\frac{3}{4}$ " in 1958, and $6'7\frac{1}{8}$ " in 1959. By last May he had upped his best to $6'9\frac{7}{8}$ " but his first European record of 7'13" in August came as a major surprise. He had placed only sixth in the Soviet championships the previous month.

Not only does Brumel now hold the "absolute" altitude record, but he is also by far the greatest "differential" jumper in history. With a personal height of 6'03" (weight: 171 lb.) he has thus jumped 155" above his own head, compared with the next best of 133" by fellow Russian Vyades-

lav Tryaszin (5'5" & 6'63").

Exciting news for New York track fans in particular is that Brumel, together with Olympic champions Robert Shavlakadze and Pyotr Bolotnikov, is to complete in three indoor meets there on February 17th, 25th and March 3rd. With John Thomas determined to avenge his Olympic conquerors the high jump contests should be quite interesting.

A capacity crowd of 13,566 in Los Angeles Sports Arena was treated to three world indoor records at the second annual invitational meet on January 21st. The records came from Parry O'Brien, Ralph Boston

and Wilma Rudolph.

O'Brien, eager to re-establish himself as the world's number one now that Bill Nieder has quit, put the shot 63'12" on his third attempt to add 8½" to his own best mark. For the second week running, O'Brien had more than two feet to spare over massive Dallas Long.

Olympic champion Ralph Boston long jumped 25'10" to better by 1" the mark held by his arch-rival Irv Roberson. Darrell Horn, who jumped 25'64" the previous week, was a distant second.

Wilma Rudolph's record came in the 60 yards, in which she clocked 6.9 in both heat and final. The previous best was 7.2 by Dolores Dwyer in 1954. Wilma's warmup consisted of jiving along the track to the tempo of a Dixieland band!

Sensation of the Boston Knights of Columbus indoor meet on January 14th was Bruce Kidd, a 17-year-old schoolboy from Toronto. The tall, blond Canadian won the two miles in an astonishing 8:49.2 from Irishman Pete McArdle (8:50.0), with Britain's Fred Norris third. Kidd jumped into a 15 yard lead with about 1000 yards to go, led by five yards entering the last lap of 160 yards and held off McArdle to win by that same margin.

Kidd first came into prominence in June 1959 when, at the age of 15, he ran 3 miles in 14:34.4 for an under-17 world best. Last summer he narrowly missed Olympic selection and clocked 3:53.4 for 1500 metres and 14:29.9 (Canadian record) for 5000m. He plans to study at Harvard University.

Murray Halberg, back in New Zealand after his brief but glorious U.S. visit, tasted defeat at the hands of — an American. Olympic finalist Dyrol Burleson narrowly beat Halberg over 1500m in Auckland on January 21st, both men clocking 3:47.4. New Zealand's other Olympic champion, Peter Snell, fared better by beating his

fellow medallists over 880 yards. Snell won in 1:49.0, a native record, ahead of Jamaican George Kerr (1:49.2), junior champion Gary Philpott (1:52.0) and Belgium's travel-weary Roger Moens (1:54.4). Both races were run on a rain-sodden grass track.

It was Snell's turn to lose at Napier on January 25th. Kerr won in 1:48.9, with Snell equalling his native record of 1:49.0

and Moens improving to 1:49.2.

Armin Hary will be seen in action this year after all. As his suspension has been reduced from 12 to four months by the Hesse Athletics Association he can race again as from May 1st. Carl Kaufmann was cleared of allegations that his behaviour had been harmful to German athletics. West Germany's "big three"—Hary, Kaufmann and Martin Lauer — will thus continue to grace the tracks of Europe.

Bill Alley's 283'8" javelin throw at West Chester, Pa., last summer has been rejected by the A.A.U. and will not be forwarded to the I.A.A.F. for ratification as a world record. The throw was made over downhill-sloping ground. The world record remains in the name of Al Cantello at 282'3½".

Melvyn Watman supplies the following data to bring up to date his mile survey:—

Elliott's 1500m record of 3:35.6 represents 3:53.5 miling. The four minute mile has been beaten 66 times—on 26 tracks—in 11 countries — during 43 races — by 26 athletes—drawn from 14 nations—of four continents.

Elliott is the world's most prolific four minute miler with 17 marks, followed by Waern (7).

Greatest national contribution is by Australia: 31 marks by five runners, although Britain can boast six men under the barrier (but only 11 marks).

Most popular track is London's White

City with 14 marks.

Including also 1500m marks of 3:41.7 or better, the list extends to 143 by 43 athletes. Elliott top with 23, followed by Rozsavolgyi (17) and Waern (14).

Rozsavolgyi still going strong as oldest four minute miler: 3:39.2 1500m at 31 years

and 5 months.

And Elliott is still undefeated at 1500m/mile!

We miss the grim struggle for mastery in the 10,000 and 5000 metres, though, in the latter we see Halberg's fantastic break, and Grodowski's stern unavailing chase. Many of the track events are shown continuously right up to the tape with some wonderful close ups in slow motion of the winners en route, with superb shots of

Elliott, Berutti, and Otis Davis.

The field events inevitably receive less favourable treatment, and here again we miss the sense of stern competition. There are, however, some fine action shots of the world's greatest throwers and jumpers, though in the case of the high jumpers not at the winning or near winning heights. There are fine shots of Susan Platt's wonderful, but ill-fated javelin throw, of Mary Bignal and one of her more successful efforts in the long jump and of Dorothy Shirley in the high jump.

In all some 25 events are covered; the photography by Toni Nett is excellent. The connoisseurs and the uninitiated will find much of real interest and the Coach much

that will be useful from his angle.

It is a silent 16mm. film, with a schedule of titles in sequence on application to Guy Butler, "Harbledown," Little Hadam, Hertfordshire. Guy Butler is available for lecturing and commentary which will add to the enjoyment of the film.
