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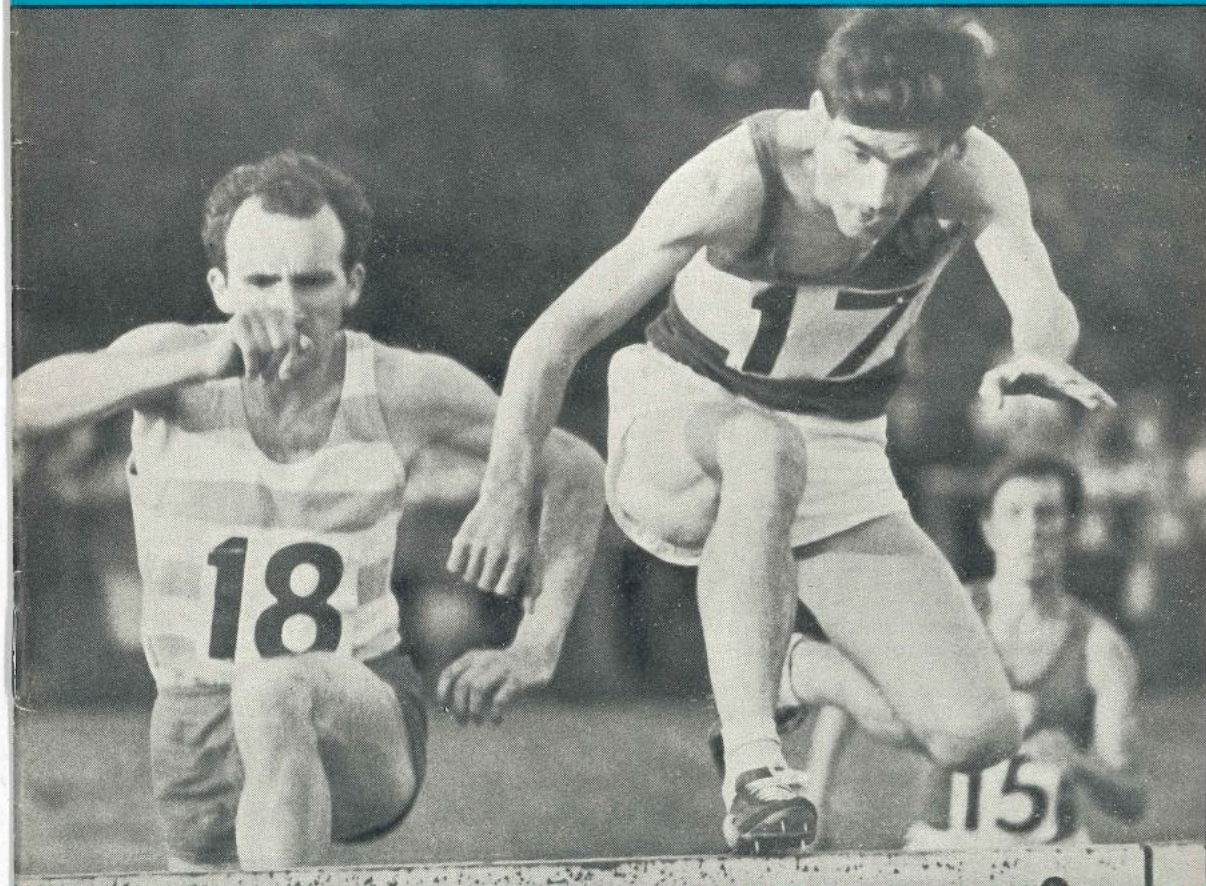

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Roger Gynn reports on Sunday's Maxol Marathon in Manchester

THIS WAS RON HILL'S FINEST VICTORY

TAKING THE LEAD at 15 miles, 30-year-old Ron Hill gradually increased the margin over his rivals until at the finish he was 2 minutes ahead of the world's fastest ever performer, Derek Clayton (Australia), crossing the line in a superb 2:13:42—the second fastest time ever recorded by a UK runner. Clayton, doubled up with stomach cramp and almost overcome by the strength sapping humid atmosphere which necessitated his immediate removal to a nearby ambulance, finished a gallant second in 2:15:40, with the ever consistent Jim Alder 3rd in 2:18:18. Japan's fourth fastest performer, Yoshiaki Unetani (24), who recorded 2:12:40.6 last December, was 4th half a minute ahead of Bill Adcocks who had been overtaken first by Alder and then by Unetani in the last 5 miles. But probably the finest performance of the whole race next to that of the winner came from young John Fewery of Blackpool and Fylde, who, running in his very first marathon, recorded the excellent time of 2:21:43. Never out of the first ten from the start, Fewery ran confidently, overtaking Kenji Kimihara of Japan (last year's Windsor-Chiswick winner) and the East German, Jurgen Busch, in the closing stages to finish 6th.

Sir Matt Busby started this first International Maxol Marathon, which incorporated both the AAA and RRC championships, from Manchester Town Hall. The course, which negotiated the south west suburbs of the city, consisted of two 5 mile laps after the initial 6 miles before swinging north to the finish at Old Trafford. It was a reasonably flat one, with few gradients of any consequence.

Right from the start it was Derek Clayton who pushed his way to the front of the 167-strong field, in company with Hill, Adcocks, Jim Hogan and the two Japanese. At 5 miles a large group consisting of Clayton, Adcocks, Hill, Ron Grove, Alder, Kimihara, Unetani, Hogan, Dave Holt (in only his second outing over the distance), Don McGregor, Fewery and Busch went through in 25:16, some 10y clear of this year's Poly winner, Phil Hampton.

Up to then the weather had been pleasant enough for the runners but just prior to the 10 mile post the sun broke through, the mercury started to soar and conditions deteriorated. This plus the ever-present convoy of traffic which built up to immense proportions as the afternoon progressed added to the discomfort of the contestants. The tall, powerfully built Clayton had opened up a 10y lead at 10 miles (50:07) over Adcocks and Hill who passed together in 50:10, with Kimihara in close contact (50:13). Then came Hogan (50:24) closely pursued by Alder (50:28) who appeared full of running at this stage, with Unetani and Busch right behind (50:30). Fewery and Holt

(50:37 and 50:39) were well ahead of McGregor (50:57), Grove (51:09), Juan Taylor (51:35), Ian McIntosh (51:42) and George Brockbank (51:51). At this stage Martin Craven (22nd) and Alan Grant (23rd), the latest member of Coventry Godiva's road racing powerhouse, were running easily and conserving their energy in the trying conditions.

By 14 miles Hill was at Clayton's shoulder, looking superbly fit and moving in an economic well contained style. Adcocks was still in striking distance 10y behind and seemed comfortable enough, whilst Kimihara was now about 100y in arrears, barely ahead of Alder and Busch. Unetani had lost contact with Busch and had Fewery at his shoulder. Hogan pulled out here and dropped to the grass verge. "My left leg has been on fire since about 4 miles and I just couldn't go any further. I'm really disappointed" said Jim.

Hill made a decisive break at 15 when Clayton stopped to take a drink (1:14:57—1:14:58) and from then on was never headed. Adcocks (1:15:10) was still well placed some 14 seconds in front of Kimihara with Alder (1:16:07) 30y adrift. Busch passed in 1:16:15 and was losing ground, although still some distance ahead of Unetani and Fewery (both 1:17:04). The field was now spread-eagled by the combination of a fast pace by the leaders and the increasingly hot, sticky weather, with the result that nearly 200y separated each of the next four lads, Juan Taylor (1:17:39), McGregor (1:18:00), McIntosh (1:18:30), and Dave Holt (1:18:54), who was soon to call it a day. Eric Austin, always a reliable performer, passed in 1:18:59, ahead of Brockbank (1:19:06), Hampton (1:19:27), Edwards (1:19:28) and the New Zealander John Comber (1:20:11). Grove, who had been well up the field, abandoned the race at this point.

By 17 miles, Ron had a margin of 25 seconds over Clayton, with Adcocks still holding third

Women's AAA Championships**At Crystal Palace, July 18th/19th**

Pat Lowe and Dorothy Hyman Brilliant But Cause for Concern In Some Events

PAT LOWE'S scintillating 800m victory and Dorothy Hyman's wonderful return to top class sprinting were the most heart warming aspects of last week-end's Bovril-sponsored WAAA Championships at Crystal Palace but many of the results, making due allowance for some notable absentees, give cause for concern so far as prospects for Athens are concerned. Dorothy Hyman dominates British sprinting to a greater degree than ever before, which does not say too much for our chances in those events if Dorothy is denied her chance of competing internationally again. Top overseas competition in the 1500m and 100m hurdles showed up the difference between world and British standards, and there was nothing to be particularly cheerful over in the throwing department. Adding to the gloom is that so far as the pentathlon is concerned Sue Scott's glandular fever could at worst keep her out for the rest of the season, Ann Wilson is struggling to regain fitness after several setbacks and Mary Peters is unlikely to compete. That leaves Lillian Board, Janet Simpson, Pat Lowe, the 4x400m squad and Sheila Sherwood as the only serious medal contenders at this stage, though there may be an improvement in the situation with seven weeks yet to go.

100 METRES

"These past five years have flashed by. It seems as if I have missed out only one season." That was Dorothy Hyman speaking and indeed it is difficult to believe that it was way back in 1964 when we last saw Dorothy in the "big time". Watching that dark, trim figure driving purposefully for the tape just like the old days played havoc with one's sense of time, not to mention feelings. I cannot recall a more emotional occasion since Derek Johnson's one-race comeback in 1963.

It was too much to hope that Dorothy could defeat such an opponent as Chi Cheng, who last year clocked 11.2 for 100m and this season has been credited with a 10.3 100y, but she came close. They started about even (Sheila Cooper was off best) but the California-based Chinese girl had the superior pick-up and was well clear by the halfway mark. It was at 60m that Dorothy started to close the gap and she drew steadily nearer until the tape intervened in Miss Chi's favour. The margin was about 18 inches, with both clocking 11.9 into the 2.6m/sec wind. The times (electrically recorded at 11.87 for Chi Cheng

and 11.92 for Dorothy) would probably have been four or five tenths faster had the race been run the other way round. Anita Neil finished a clear 3rd and behind her three of the next four places were filled by Dorothy's protégées—a striking testimony to her coaching ability and capacity to inspire as well as her own exceptional sprinting talent. Della James, suffering from the sciatic trouble that hampered her in Brno, trailed home last. Bad luck.

200 METRES

"I hate running 200's", she admitted before the race but Dorothy Hyman's distaste for the distance was hardly apparent as she sped to a five yard victory, the widest winning margin since Jenny Smart finished nine-tenths ahead of Jenny Taylor (now Mrs. Pawsey) in the 1961 final. Again the headwind spoiled the times and one wonders, in view of Dorothy's unpressed 23.7, whether even Irena Szewinska—who did not come owing to illness—could have beaten her. Whether Dorothy will become eligible for Athens by being reinstated by the IAAF remains to be seen, although the prospects are fairly bleak, but it is clear that she is fully back to the form which won her Olympic, European and Commonwealth medals in 1960 and 1962. One can only hope that the authorities will be charitable so that Britain's greatest ever female sprinter will be able to take on the world again. How frustrating if, as is the

situation at present, the rest of her season is to consist only of club relays (admittedly the motivation behind her comeback) and minor races on poor tracks.

While Dorothy was lifting her first WAAA title since 1963 a frantic battle was being waged for second place. Maureen Tranter was well placed entering the straight but as she tied up (to finish outside the medals for the first time since 1964) so title-holder Val Peat and 17-year-old Marilyn Neufville fought for the honour with the powerful London schoolgirl snatching the decision.

400 METRES

With Lillian Board out of the championships with injury the path was clear for Janet Simpson, the 200m champion in 1965 and 1966, to win her first 400m title Unhappily, as she was easing off during the last 20 yards of her heat she hurt her knee—causing her withdrawal, although with luck she should be fit for the big Stuttgart match. Jenny Pawsey thus became the new favourite and, for the first time in this her first season of serious quarter miling, she ran with real authority and judgment. Instead of her stride chopping up in the last 50 yards she was able to maintain her form excellently as she pulled a good half dozen yards clear of Pauline Attwood over the final 70. Her personal best time of 54.3 was inside the European qualifying standard. Pauline (17) held second place ahead of fast closing Barbara Lyall—a measure of her progress since last year when at this meeting she was 2nd in the invitation intermediates 100m race in 12.5. Gloria Dourass, badly left in a ragged start, took 4th in a blanket finish with 1961 champion Maeve Kyle and Deirdre Watkinson. Maeve, of course, never fails to astonish. Aged 40? I don't believe a word of it! A curious occurrence was the 53.9 heat time by West Germany's Christa Czekay . . . who had no intention of proceeding towards the final as she had to hurry home straight after the



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heat. Since when have the WAAA Championships been used for private time trials?

800 METRES

That unforgettable relay leg of hers against the Czechs may prove to have been the turning point of Pat Lowe's career. Long noted as a tenacious 100% effort runner she now seems to have found that little extra inspiration that separates the champion athlete from the merely good. Pat did not think before the race that she could beat Vera Nikolic but her splendid victory ought now to give her the confidence to tackle anyone with a chance of winning . . . even Olympic champion Madeline Manning in the forthcoming Britain v. USA match.

It was a marvellous race—once it got under way. For some reason or other there was great confusion over which line signified the "break" from lanes and for several minutes the girls, stripped, were kept waiting at the start while the situation was resolved. The pace was thrillingly fast: Vera clipped off the first 200m in 28.0 and passed the bell in 59.2, with Ilja Keizer, Pat Lowe and Joan Page also inside the minute. Sheila Carey was nearly 15y down. As usual, Vera accelerated sharply midway along the back straight but Pat was ready for her and at 600m (1:31.4) was only a stride behind. Pat was under orders to strike at the start of the finishing straight but instead she challenged wide all round the bend. "It's one of my failings," she admitted. "I'm a bit impatient and try to get past on the bend but I think you can wait just that too long". It was all right: to the great excitement of the crowd Pat burst ahead 60y from the tape and the world record holder gave up the fight, losing second place to the Dutch girl who drew to within two yards of Pat by the tape.

Pat's time of 2:03.3, just a tenth outside Ileana

Silai's 1969 world best, was 0.4 slower than her personal best in last year's race but it was easily her fastest winning time. It also marked the first occasion on which Pat has finished higher than 4th in a WAAA final. Joan Page, the second British finisher, missed the European qualifying standard by half a second, while Mary Speedman clocked the fastest ever by a Scottish born runner.

1500 METRES

The new world record holder (at 4:12.4), Paola Pigni, did not show up and Maria Gommers was left to her own devices. Rita Ridley, after her experience in the Leicester mile, let the Dutch girl go. At 400m (64.7) Gommers was 15y ahead; by 800m (2:15.4) she was nearly 25y clear of Rita (2:19.0) with Ann O'Brien and Marie Herron another 10y back. The position at the bell was Gommers (3:09.0) 40y in front of Ridley (3:15.4); O'Brien, Herron and Margaret Beacham were bunched 15y behind Rita, then came another 15y gap to Thelwyn Bateman. Gommers strode unfalteringly past 1200m in 3:26 (Ridley 3:34) and continued to widen the gap all the way to the tape in 4:16.0—wonderful running in such a non-competitive race. Rita Ridley held on to second but she did not have much to spare over Thelwyn Bateman, who came to life much too late and overtook three girls during a last lap of around 66. She set a personal best, as did Herron and Beacham. Jane Perry, Barbara Banks and surprising finalist Sheila Carnegie ran their fastest ever times in the heats.

100 METRES HURDLES

"A thing of beauty is a joy for ever," Keats could have been alluding to Chi Cheng's hurdling, one of the supreme aesthetic pleasures in athletics. Not just pretty to watch, but simply devastating—as witness her crushing defeat of Poland's Tereza Nowak (13.4 this year) and Tereza Sukniewicz (co-world record holder at 13.3). Her electric time was 13.52, great running into the wind. The British girls were quite outclassed, even Chris Perera who had her work cut out to stay ahead of Sue Hayward's lunging finish. Sue had a good meeting as she also set a personal best in the long jump. Sheila Garnett had the misfortune to injure herself slightly before the final.

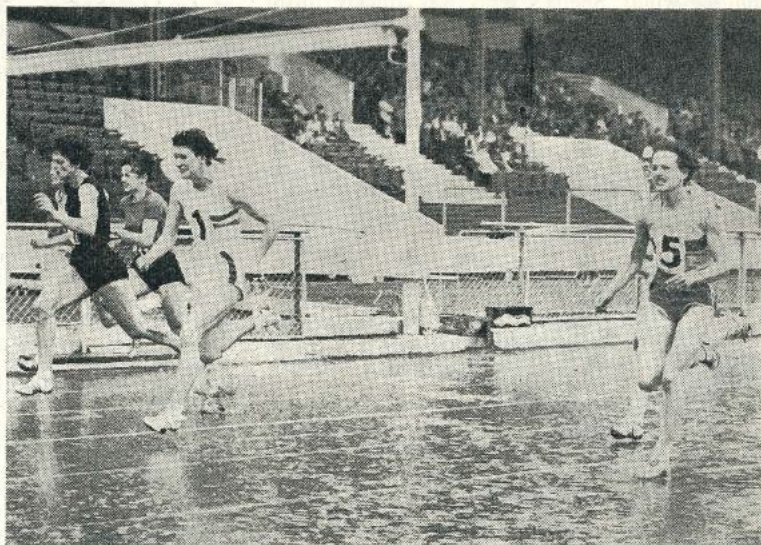

HIGH JUMP

What a competitor Dorothy Shirley is! That may be stating the obvious but it needs to be re-stated from time to time in case we fall into the trap of taking this remarkable jumper for granted. To be sure, it was Barbara Inkpen who won the competition but it was Dorothy who could claim the moral victory by jumping the same height as a rival who had previously cleared five inches higher than herself this season. The background to Dorothy's exploit emphasises her unsurpassed competitive qualities. A total lack

of facilities in her part of Lancashire prevented her from practising jumping at all during the winter though she did maintain a high standard of general physical fitness; while prior to the Championships—still with only a handful of jumping sessions to her name—her four competitions had resulted in heights of 1.55/5'1" (May 31st), 1.58/5'2" (June 7th), 1.60/5'3" (June 21st) and 1.65/5'5" (June 28th).

A failure at her opening height of 1.60/5'3" could have cost Barbara dearly but she retrieved the situation when she cleared 1.70/5'7" first time while Dorothy had one very narrow miss. At 1.72/5'7" Barbara again straddled over at the first try and Dorothy rolled over at the second, but at 1.74/5'8" it was Dorothy who came by far the nearer. Indeed her final attempt was agonisingly close and shows that at 30 years of age and in her 17th season of competition she is ready to raise her personal best of 1.725/5'8". As it was that 1.72 represented her highest in over a decade of championship jumping during which she has earned Olympic, European and Commonwealth medals. Now she seems almost assured of a place in the team for Athens—to become the only Briton ever to compete in four European Championships. As she says, "there's life in the old girl yet!"

BEHIND THE SCENES — With CLIFF TEMPLE

IT was Dorothy Hyman's day, and it was Pat Lowe's day. Such emotion-raisers as Dorothy's storybook comeback and Pat's eventual victory over Vera Nikolic obviously warmed the hearts of those for whom an athletics meeting is more than just a fresh batch of statistics recorded by robots to be shuffled into ranking lists. This is just a random selection of things seen and heard during the most important weekend of the year for British women's athletics...

To fall headlong down the stairs on the morning of a National championship race is not exactly the best preparation, and it could have been that when Janet Simpson did precisely that at home on Friday, her hopes of winning the 400m title also took a tumble. Although shaken by the fall, she had felt no physical injury, but it is not outside the realms of possibility that she might have sustained a strain in her left leg which only became apparent during her 400 heat on Friday evening. "I was qualifying safely, so I put the brakes on in the home straight and then my knee suddenly went," she tells me as she stands dejectedly by the side of the track, after withdrawing from the second round. "I tried the knee out just now, but it's not worth the risk of damaging it more seriously by running hard on it again tonight."

Over at the high jump, Barbara Inkpen is speaking to the sun. "Go down, go down!" she calls, as it sinks slowly in the evening sky and appears to rest on the bar she is trying to clear. Unlike most high jumpers, Barbara loves to talk during a competition: to officials, to photographers, to anyone within earshot. Her opponents are saying nothing. Even that extrovert competitor *par excellence* Dorothy Shirley is in a world of her own. But although distracting, the sun's position does not affect the result: the leading three competitors were all jumping 'into' it. "This is the first time I've jumped for a fortnight," says Barbara, the title safely hers on a countback. "I've been on holiday, and I hadn't

seen a paper so I didn't know that Linda (Hedmark) had withdrawn."

With the Friday evening programme, consisting mainly of heats and qualifying rounds, complete the crowd shuffles away from the darkening stadium, and the competitors head back to the dressing rooms. The inseparable Dorothy Hyman Track Club sprinters, unable to relax until the last of their number is safely through her 200m heat, gather up their belongings. Four of them—Dorothy, Sheila Cooper, Val Peat and Denise Ramsden—are through to the 100m final and 200m semi-finals. The park in Cudworth may not look a likely training ground for international sprinters, but there is no arguing with its beneficial effects, "Roll on Sunday!" says Val Peat. "We used to have to run all the races, heats and finals, on the same day," recalls Dorothy Hyman. "Well, thank goodness we don't now!" replies Val.

In the gloom on the grass infield just one solitary figure remains. On the same track just six weeks previously Della James had shown a clean pair of heels in the Southern championships; now she is not so happy. "It's not going right is it?", she says sadly, removing her spikes. "I should be right up with them, but I've been having sciatic trouble since the end of June. I was going to withdraw from the Czech match, but it seemed to clear up until we got out there. I'm through to the 100m final tomorrow, but I don't know if I'll be able to run. If I do and I'm only seventh or eighth they'll discount me from Athens selection, but if I don't run people will say—well..."

Saturday dawns bright and sunny. The stage is being set for the afternoon's events, and television cameras are mounted on towers of scaffolding. By 11 o'clock officials and athletes are arriving with the latter swapping stories about how much (or little) sleep they had the previous night. The Crystal Palace hostel, where the

Reflecting On The English Schools . . .

WELL, there we had it—the 1969 edition of the English Schools' Championships. As I reported last week, the sheer weight of class performances was more than enough to send one reeling, and the welter of impressions gained from two boiling hot days took time to sort out and digest. Some fine efforts inevitably go unreported in a meeting of this sort—it's just impossible to take everything in at once.

The 1969 ESAA Championships was for me meeting a sandy-haired girl called Rona Livingston for the first time ("I probably won't run the National 400m, but I might do a few more before the end of the year") . . . a girl who turned into a bundle of nitro-energy once her spikes hit the cinders; one that only the powerful Marilyn Neufville could handle. It was the sad sight of Andrew Barnett (14) flopped on the verge after dropping out of the Junior Boys 1500m final, his head in his hands, as if in disbelief; and his mother saying: "Just nerves, nothing else wrong with him, really . . . he's only a young lad, he'll be okay . . ." The expressionless look on Mary Sonner's face as she snapped the string in a sensational 2:12.4; and behind her the pure joy from Sandra Marquis at snatching second on the line from a dismayed Pat Bagley. Anthony Harper refusing to look, covering his head with his track-suit top, as Adrian Diffey took his final cast in the javelin. Barry Smith happily shaking hands

after slaughtering the intermediate 1500 field so casually. Talking to Trevor Rodwell: "I've never felt so bad, done everything so wrong and still won . . . got a stabbing pain in my backside, like a red-hot iron . . ." Steve White: "I just felt limp, lifeless. I came into the straight ahead, then they all just flashed past me again . . ." Peter Beaven: "Malcolm (Yardley) has got a great group in Derek (Price) and Des (Coneys) and myself. We all bring each other along . . ." Martin Mills: "Boy, it's hot. What a race! Watch this boy Ray Smedley; he's the most under-rated junior distance talent in the country . . ." Jon Wood: "The circle I have in my back garden for training is better than this one—been laid so hastily." The agonisingly polite Paul Dennis: "Sorry. Can't get my breath back; I'll speak to you in a second . . ." Guy Dirkin, a soft-spoken 16-year-old giant of 6'3" sitting quietly waiting to hear if he had been selected for the Schools' international. Ian Chipchase's hammer scything through the blue sky, out of the throwing arc . . .

Credit is due to the tremendous job done by all involved in setting out Motpur Park—an excellent venue, but perhaps a little small for this occasion. Chipchase's hammer throwing would tend to strengthen that argument! Marring point from my view was the indifferent announcing. I am of the probably unpopular opinion that this whole affair could do pretty well without the repeated self-congratulation, the pageantry, and the rather pointless speeches from various civic dignitaries who know nothing about the sport. More time could be given over to presenting the competitors as individuals.

SIMILARLY, there was much in the girls events that had to remain unmentioned upon last week: the absence of Sue Scott, out of action with glandular fever; the victory in the junior javelin of Ann Goodland from Yorkshire, so little known in athletics circles previously that a number of Northern officials had never heard of her; the curious seeding in the hurdles events which put UK Junior record breakers Nnenna Njoku and Jenny Richardson in the same heat, and three of the top seniors (four if Sue Scott had run) together in a heat, with two to qualify—Janice Byng was the unlucky one; and the dominance of Sonia Lannaman and Sharon Colyear in the junior sprints.

Uninhibited running in the 800m met with success and disaster: 17-year-old Margaret Newton, winner of the Hampshire senior title in a personal best 2:18.4, was actually challenging for the lead with 250m of the final left and was rewarded with another personal best of 2:14.5 for fourth place. Drama in the junior final came when Yorkshire's Jocelyn Hoyte (winner of the second

fastest of 7 heats in 2:21.8) made a late bid to catch Christine Tranter but ran herself right out and collapsed on the cinders with 50 metres left. Christine said afterwards: "I was waiting for Christine Helsby (her Lincs team-mate) to come through, but she had a bad head cold and couldn't stay with the pace. We were going to run as a team." Said the other Christine, the National junior cross country champion: "800m running is too fast for me. I'm looking forward to running 1500m!"

The high jump results were interesting. Few could have foreseen the sudden improvement by Kent's Diana Wickenden, another Ron Murray protégée, who took the senior title, while top-ranked junior high jumper Tina Greisen's fourth place in her event was equally unexpected. Tina's county (and club) mate, Sylvia Rampton, made no mistake in taking the Intermediate event, but note that neither of the Surrey pair, Noreen Morrison and Rachel Edwards, who were both ranked above her, statistically speaking, were competing. Noreen's inexplicable omission from the Surrey team after winning the county championship, has been commented on before. Rachel missed the Surrey championships altogether as a result of a broken ankle, but on the day after the English Schools, she cleared 1.57/5'2" at Crystal Palace in her first competition since Whitsun.

Also at Crystal Palace, long jumper Barbara Barrett—runner-up for an ESAA title for the second successive year—cleared 5.81/19'1" in a trophy meeting. Although that would not have been good enough to defeat Shirley Clelland's 5.90/19'4½", it was 5½" better than Barbara (6.06/19'10½") in the Surrey Schools this year) cleared in the Nationals "I had to come here to compete," she told me on the Sunday, "otherwise I'd have just stayed at home saying 'Eighteen-seven, eighteen-seven, only eighteen-seven!'"

BALANCE, RHYTHM AND CONTROL IN DISCUS THROWING—by John Le Masurier

I HAVE seen several weaknesses recently while observing young discus throwers in action, and I am hoping that this article may help to solve some of their problems and that some improved performances may result.

Like a Golf Drive

Discus throwing is not a brutal event. In fact it is very aesthetic when properly performed. To see a discus soaring into the distance is a wonderful sight. The skill has certain features which are very similar to the hitting of a drive at golf, the most obvious being the inter-play between hips and shoulders which produces range of movement and muscular torque, leading to acceleration of the club head on the one hand and to the acceleration of the discus on the other.

Great distance is obtained at golf when the timing of the swing is perfect; it is seldom achieved when an attempt is made to hit the cover off the ball. Similarly in throwing, success does not come when an attempt is made to throw the discus out of sight. In throwing parlance "you musn't 'bully' the discus."

In coaching, I find the use of such terms as

Balance, Rhythm and Control often prove successful. It is these three aspects that I deal with here.

Balance

The thrower must start his swings at the back of the circle in such a manner that he is completely on balance during this phase. A great many youngsters do not appreciate the difference between the preliminary swings required for a standing throw and the preliminary swings required at the start of the turn. In the former it is usual to swing the discus at an angle to the ground, due to the bending of the trunk back over the flexed right leg, whereas in the latter the body is kept upright, with the weight transferred easily from one foot to the other without any real bending of the knees, while the discus arm is kept parallel to the ground.

The really crucial point of balance occurs on the last swing back of the throwing arm as the thrower 'sits' and moves into the turn. If he is to run across the circle and land with good balance on his right foot in the centre of the circle, he must transfer his weight across to the turning left foot. Furthermore, he must move *ahead* of his left leg so that the leg can thrust him in a straight line to land on balance in a strong throwing position. Balance in the front of the circle is determined very largely by all the preliminary movements and correct disposition of weight which take place at the back of the circle. An upright position of the head, a straight spine and flexed legs all help to improve balance.

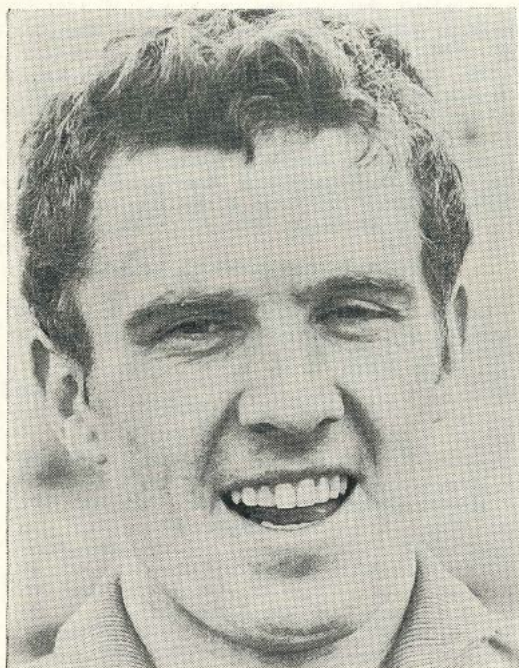
Rhythm

It is much easier to effect a good throw if the movements start slowly and gradually build up to a climax. The thrower should think of rangy movements during the swings, building up a big displacement between right arm and shoulder, and between shoulders and hips. The settling down over the left leg should be comparatively slowly performed, so that the drive across the circle can be executed correctly. Once the left leg drives and the right thigh is brought round close to the left, the legs must move fast, so that the hips run ahead of the shoulders to produce the all-important torque. T-u-r-n . . . Drive and THROW . . . in which the turn is drawn out, the 'Drive' is faster and the 'THROW' is unwinding, gives an idea of the rhythm required.

Control

Control is really part and parcel of Balance, but in this context I mean the control of the discus. Because of its size and shape it is essential for the delivery of the discus to be perfectly controlled. It is pointless to generate great discus speed in the throw if this is wasted through a bad

delivery. The discus must be spun out at the correct angle and with the right amount of tilt for the prevailing wind conditions. The angle of release for a strong head wind will be lower than for a tail wind. The difference may vary from 30 deg—40 deg. Also, by pressing down with the base of the thumb the tilt of the discus (leading edge) can be varied. Experiment under varying throwing conditions and take note of the flight of the discus in every throw. To flight the discus properly involves controlling its path throughout the complete throw—not just at the moment of delivery.

EAST GERMANY BEAT USSR

—CHIZHOVA PUTS 20.09/65'11"

FURTHER proof of the tremendously high standard of East German athletics was offered at Chorzow on July 12th/13th when the GDR defeated the USSR 109-102 in the men's match and lost 61-67 in the women's ... a 170-169 victory on aggregate. Poland, lacking the services of an ill Irena Szewinska, was outclassed by both the other teams. Two world records were bettered: Karin Balzer clocked 13.2 for 100mH but the wind was over the limit, and Nadyezhda Chizhova added over a foot to her shot mark with a staggering 20.09/65'11"—a landmark comparable to Matson's first 70-footer. 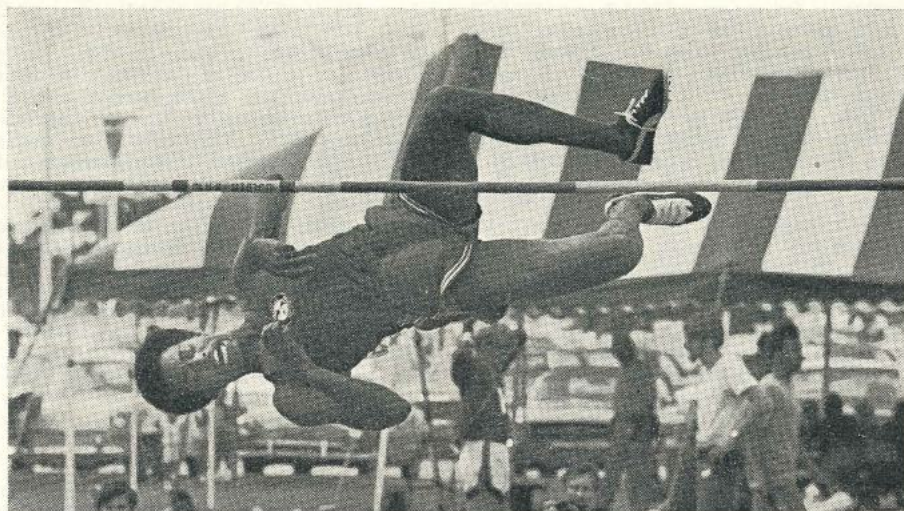

At Blackburn, July 12th/13th

The AAA Decathlon at Blackburn produced an exciting finish. With one event to go Peter de Villiers was way ahead and required a further 500 points to beat his previous best, but behind him there was a tense struggle for second place, with only one point between Jim Smith and Stewart McCallum, with Stuart Scott a further 30 points behind. All were drawn together in the 1500 metres. Scott led all the way at a moderate pace, pulling away at the end, but not sufficiently fast to gain a points advantage over McCallum. However, he did manage to haul himself into the medals with third place over Jim Smith. De Villiers, unfortunately, could not pull out that extra effort needed to beat his previous best (and pending South African record). He was 55 points short, but performed exceptionally well in the other track races with a 10.8 100m, 49.8 400m and 15.1 hurdles.

Another excellent performance came from young Stewart McCallum, in his first year of senior competition, who achieved personal bests in a majority of events to finish second with 6569. He is still weak in the throws, but with a winter of strength training he should be well over 7000 points. Scott, slightly below his best, took the Northern title, and the only Midland competitor, John Saunders, became Midland champion. This was well deserved as John has improved over the past three years by sheer determination from 3809 to 5261.

HARRY PAYNE

THE death has occurred, from a heart attack, of one of Britain's most celebrated marathon runners, Harry William Payne (76). Born in Bedfordshire in 1892, he did not take up athletics until after being demobbed from the army in 1919. At first he just raced for the Great Eastern Railways Works Team but soon joined Woodford Green AC and became the club's first International when gaining selection for England over the country after placing second in the National of that year.

Winner of many club and area cross-country championships his most outstanding record in this department was in becoming county champion over eight consecutive years from 1922 to 1929. He ran and scored for England in the International Cross-Country Championships in 1922, 1928 and 1929. His most satisfying run was in winning the 1922 Southern in a snow storm and probably his most athletically meritorious was when winning the AAA Marathon from Windsor to Stamford Bridge in 1928 and 1929. On both occasions he set a British record, with the 1929 performance of 2:30:57.6 standing until another great Essex athlete, in Jim Peters, improved upon it in 1951!

Harry would run any event from 100y upwards. He was self coached and tended to ignore the advice of his elders. It was just to prove them wrong that he ran his first marathon in 1928 at the age of 35. He won and gained Olympic selection with the team that went to Amsterdam that year. An old injury caused training problems and for his many admirers his 14th place was disappointing.

In 1930 he went to the Empire Games at Hamilton, Canada. There, whilst out training on the Niagara Highway, he was knocked down from behind by a car. Fortunately he only received bruises, but the accompanying stiffness ruined any chance he had of justifying his pre-race nomination as marathon favourite. On his return Harry eased from big time racing but continued for many years to race for the club. After the Second World War, when aged 46, he called it a day competitively but continued to run for pleasure well into his fifties.

He was a very popular club Cross-Country captain and secretary and even after his competitive days, pulled his weight in more ways than one in club, Essex and Area Committees. He was made a Life Member of Woodford Green and served as President in 1956-57. **D.B.**

Nihill Slams Olympic Champion in USA

Great Javelin Achievement By Travis: Sherwood Clocks 50.0

PAUL NIHILL, Dave Travis and John Sherwood were outstanding among the British contingent in the Commonwealth team that faced the USA and USSR in Los Angeles last Friday and Saturday. Nihill defeated a strong field that included Olympic champion Vladimir Golubnichiy in the 20km walk; Travis raised his personal best to 81.69/268'0"—just 9" shy of John FitzSimons' UK record—in placing a brilliant second to Janis Lusia (probably the greatest single performance in UK javelin history); and Sherwood drew attention to the folly of the European team selectors in omitting him from Stuttgart by clocking 50 sec. dead for second place. Jeff Teale bettered 60ft. for the first time this year and Alan Pascoe performed creditably in the high hurdles, in which Dave Hemery was a non-starter due to hamstring injury. Lynn Davies, with an injured knee, had previously withdrawn from the team. The USA defeated USSR in both matches (for the first time on the women's side) and the meet yielded numerous exceptional performances, as the results below show.

foreign competitors are staying, resembles the Tower of Babel with its many different tongues, but they are probably discussing the same topics.

Outside, on the track, the athletes for the first events are beginning to appear. "I didn't get to sleep until 4 a.m.," says Val Peat, who has been staying at a nearby hotel with the other Hyman girls. "The people above us kept talking and clomping round the room."

"I got up at 2.30 to be sick, but I went straight to sleep after that," adds Sheila Cooper, cheerfully.

"Better not ask Chris what her heat time was," jokes Kevin Bell, Christine Perera's fiancé. "I think she knocked five flights down, and she's none too pleased." Later, Chris says: "Just my luck to be in the same heat as Chi Cheng, and in the next lane. I just watched her all the way down. How do I feel? Petrified."

Della James runs the 100 final after all and, as she feared, finishes eighth. After consultation with WAAA secretary Marea Hartman and coach Denis Watts she withdraws from the second round of the 200. "What I've got to do now," she says, "is to find a good physiotherapist in the wilds of Portsmouth."

The foreign domination of the 100m hurdles was not entirely unexpected after the heats, but Chris Perera is still disappointed with her time. "I'm retiring," she says. Second Briton in the hurdles, Sue Hayward, has had to leave the long jump final for which she had qualified almost accidentally on Friday. She entered the long

jump just to get a chance to warm up on the Tartan before the hurdles heats, but jumped a personal best and qualified for the final.

Surprised to find herself in the hurdles final is Ann Wilson, whose recent training has been virtually non-existent as a result of illness and injury. After exhibiting a badly swollen sprained ankle, she says "I was delighted to get to the second round, let alone the final of the hurdles. I really don't know what's going to happen about the pentathlon, though. I haven't got the European Qualifying standard yet, and the only major pentathlon left before the Athens team is selected is the WAAA event on August 2nd. I didn't enter for that, so now my only hope is that one can be organised here at Crystal Palace some time in August. If not, I'll have to concentrate on getting the long jump standard but, again, there's a lack of suitable opportunities, and it depends how quickly I can get fit."

Like any other year, the 1969 WAAA Championships were the peak of the season for some, and will prove to be a springboard to greater things for others. The memories of Dorothy Hyman's sprinting, Chi Cheng's hurdling, the determined front running of Maria Gommers, the competitive spirit of Sheila Sherwood and Sue Platt, the discus throwing of Lia Manoliu, all contributed to making the championships their usual high standard. But perhaps I remember most vividly Marea Hartman jumping up and down beside me during the closing stages of the 800m final, screaming "Go on, Pat go on!"

Pat did.

ELEY STORMS TO VICTORY IN RWA 50km

PUTTING to very good use the experience he gained last year in Prague and Mexico, Bryan Eley really shattered the opposition when he blasted off with the "big one" with 15km to go, and thus won his first national title. It was a most interesting and close contest up to that point. Bob Turney led through 5km, while Colin Young had a clear lead at 10km (51.26) only to be passed by Eric Taylor who led up to the 20km mark and then quickly slowed and retired. Meanwhile "the bunch"—Lightman, Eley, Klopfer, Middleton, Warhurst and Fogg—were walking steadily and were reinforced by Chaplin at 15km and local favourite, Roy Lodge, a little later. Around half-way the latter fell away, Middleton was dropped and Eley, Lightman, Klopfer and Warhurst led from Fogg and then Chaplin. Winner on this course two years ago, Shaun Lightman, looked impressive but was unable to hold Eley's big surge. Ray Middleton came through fast while Fogg and Warhurst tired after very gallant efforts. The wonderful, versatile and consistent George Chaplin (38) fought his way through to fifth, and now must be "reserve" for the Athens 50km squad—a position he has previously held for the 1956, 1960 and 1964 Olympics! Nearing the finish it seemed possible that Ray Middleton could nail Lightman for second, only for the American Gertz Klopfer (10th in Mexico) to put in an amazing finish and pass Middleton and very nearly catch Lightman. On a humid, windy day far from ideal for race walking, times were good with Phil Thorn, Guy Goodair and Bob Dobson, in particular, coming through with well judged efforts. Out of 111 starters, 84 were timed in under 6 hours. The team race was an easy thing for Belgrave with Wakefield, minus a blistered George Barras, just holding off Bristol WC.

spot ahead of Alder who with Busch had now dropped Kimihara. The latter was now showing the effects of a hard race and was losing ground. At 20 Clayton was struggling to maintain any form of close contact with Hill (1:40:27) and was 28 seconds behind. Adcocks appeared to be having a bad patch (1:41:40) but in direct contrast Alder was still closing (1:41:59) and appeared to be the most composed of those still in contention. Busch was timed in 1:43:35, 25 seconds up on Uetani who had overtaken Kimihara and was a few yards up on him (1:44:00-1:44:01). Fewery still held 8th spot (1:44:28) ahead of a surprising Juan Taylor (1:45:02) who was in company with Austin (1:45:04) and McIntosh (1:45:05), whilst McGregor (1:45:21), Brockbank (1:47:31), Edwards (1:47:44), Craven (1:48:02) and Grant followed in that order.

Ron Hill, at about 21½, appeared to be losing form slightly ("I ran the last five in a dream" he said later) but was dropping Clayton. Alder had now overtaken Adcocks and was 38 seconds up on him whilst the stocky Uetani was coming through fast. In the last five miles or so there were many changes in the top placings as runners tailed off or came through with well timed efforts, whilst others (Juan Taylor and Mel Edwards among them) dropped out altogether when nearly in sight of the line. Kimihara came again to push Busch down a place and McIntosh and Craven deservedly took 9th and 10th places through spirited and determined running.

The roar given by a crowd estimated in excess of 5,000 at Old Trafford when the string vested Ron Hill came from the tunnel into the sunlit ground was a fitting climax to the Bolton runner's greatest achievement to date. "I got very dehydrated" he said after the race. "I took my chance at 15 miles when Derek stopped for a drink." And of the win? "It's about time, it's been a long time coming." Jimmy Alder, delighted at taking third place, said "I ran for a place. I wasn't too fit but I will be by the time the European comes round. To be in the team is good enough for me." Europe's fastest ever, Bill Adcocks, found the heat to be strength sapping, but was still pleased in making the team for Athens.

This, the first international race to be held in England since the 1948 Olympic Games, excited terrific public interest, many thousands of spectators thronging the roadside, but the organisation as a whole was not up to the standard one would expect for an event such as this—more so in a country where road runners are amongst the very best in the world. But at the same time it must be pointed out that there was no chance for a dummy run of any kind and with officials coming from all over the country in addition to, in my opinion, an over-large field, all credit must be given to the organisers for doing their very best in trying conditions. We all earnestly hope this will become an annual event, thus giving Britain an international race which is long overdue to runners and enthusiasts alike, and which in time may be mentioned in the same breath as such classics as Boston, Fukuoka, and Kosice.

JENNIFER WINS ATHENS TRIP

THE winner of our WAAA Championships forecast competition is the well known Selsonia LAC walker Jennifer Peck. Jennifer's entry could hardly have been bettered, since she correctly predicted the first UK finisher in every event except the 400m—where her choice Janet Simpson was forced to withdraw after her heat with an injury. What's more her prediction of the time of the first Briton home in the 1500m of 4:26 was uncannily close to Rita Ridley's actual 4:25.4.

Jennifer's prize is a trip with the "AW" party to the European Championships in Athens. Yes, quite a week for her—as it was her 20th birthday on Friday!
