

WOMEN'S "NATIONAL" PROSPECTS

The National Cross-Country Championships at Richmond Park today (3.00) incorporates an inter-territorial match, and also the postponed Southern Inter-County Championships. This means that there will be three distinct team races, so the judges will certainly need to be wide awake when adding up the points at the end of the day. In the National itself Southern champions Highgate, Mitcham, Birchfield and holders London Olympiades would seem to have good chances in the team race which also includes entries from Ilford, Hampstead, Spartan, Surrey A.C., Selsonia, Kent A.C., Essex L.A.C., Harborne, Coventry Godiva, Westbury, Bury and Sale. The three-aside territorial match to my mind seems a good thing for the South, represented by Cat-ling, Jarville and Anne Smith, although Scotland bear watching. The Southern Inter-County would appear to be a battle between Surrey, Middlesex and possibly Essex.

The individual race seems a duel between Longwood's Madeline Ibbotson and Southern champion Joy Catling, who may follow in the footsteps of former London University teammate, four times winner and present holder, Dr. Roma Ashby (now retired). Whilst there may be a surprise, possibly from junior winner Webb of Bilston, it certainly seems a race between these two. Peter Pozzoli tells me that he thinks the Highgate girl has the ability and temperament to win, but Ibbotson has been showing such terrific form in the North this year that she is my confident choice.

- An appeal to Civil Service athletes. The Civil Service will be having several representative matches during the coming track season, and they are anxious that any athlete, from anywhere in Britain, of county standard or above, who is a member of the Service, should not be overlooked when the time comes for team selection. Any ladies of the above standard who wish to compete should write to Mr. J. Braben, Air Ministry, C.19, High Holborn, W.C.1., who will be pleased to hear from you.
- Jim Braben, who is also the dedicated Secretary of Surrey W.A.A.A., has had the bright idea of Surrey holding a Junior Pentathlon competition comprised of the following events—100m, 70y hurdles, high jump, long jump and shot. The method of points scoring is still to be decided. The Midlands W.A.A.A. have held an Intermediate Pentathlon, with the girls running 100m instead of the normal 200m, and several schools have run pentathlons for different age groups, but I believe this is the first time a junior pentathlon has been organised at county level. It should prove an interesting experiment.

- Jacqueline Barnett, the Welsh Empire Games half-miler is taking up a teaching position in London in April and intends running for Surrey A.C., her present second claim club. Jackie should improve her best times with the top class competition available in and around the metropolis.
- Jennifer Smart, who celebrated her twentieth birthday a few weeks ago, hopes to come storming back to international form this season, concentrating on the furlong, I understand. Dorothy Hyman made a similar comeback (and how!) last year, and a Smart/Hyman rivalry once again is indeed an exciting prospect when one recalls their duels in the National Championships of 1960, when Dorothy twice pipped Jenny, both recording times of 11.7 (100m) and 24.0 (220y).

VERY WELL DONE!

THE English National Cross-Country Championships last Saturday were very well organised and, despite the recent severe weather, the course was muddy but otherwise in fairly good shape. Thanks are due to Messrs. Geo. Smith, Geo. Phipps, Les Edwards and Harry Payne in particular, for all the work they put in throughout the previous week to get the course fit for the Championships, and to the local Committee led by Ald. K. C. Kerridge, who did such a fine job.

As usual a great deal of property was left behind and inquiries should be made to George Smith, 203 Gilbert Road, Cambridge (Tel. 59368). If writing please enclose S.A.E. for reply.

Willie Diverty asks me to correct two errors in his last week's report of the Scottish Championships, in which he stated that Wood had been disqualified—this applied to the team race only—and that Aberdeen were thereby deprived of the team title. In actual fact they were relegated from 3rd to 4th. He also points out that as the rule about vests is in the Handbook and the announcer mentioned it before each race, there was no excuse. Even so, I think a warning to Wood that he could have been disqualified and thereby deprived his team-mates of their rightful medals would have met the case. Scotland are taking only the first seven—including Wood—to San Sebastian because of the expense involved.

The British Board draws the attention of athletes competing in the Indoor Championship next week-end to the fact that the team to represent Great Britain against West Germany the following week will be chosen during the Championships and the athletes advised either during the meeting or at the latest by first post Monday, March 18th. The team leaves London on the evening of March 21st and returns early afternoon of Sunday, March 24th.

The Wimbledon A.C. coach was unfortunate in being involved in a crash on the way to Cambridge. Though badly shaken, no-one was seriously hurt; but though all ran, their performances suffered and their outstanding youth, Kortenray, was well down the field in 183rd position.

Members or prospective members of the A.W. Travel Club will be interested to know that it seems likely that a trip to Tokyo can be arranged, using an aircraft from one of the well known airlines, and with Western style accommodation, for approximately £300. Is this Reader right—or is he just one who didn't have "what it takes?"

Dear Sir.

So Brian Kilby thinks you couldn't find a better crowd of people than one meets in athletics. Now this and similar statements are repeatedly cropping up in various athletics publications without ever being countered or balanced by alternative viewpoints. May I, therefore, as an ex-athlete of infinitesimal repute, be allowed to air my views of athletics and its participants, through the medium of your columns.

To me, the sport of athletics is a basic and enjoyable method of bettering one's health and a help in the desire to live one's life more fully. But this modern craze of dedicated training every day for years on end, for the narrow-minded pursuit of the ego, is selfish

and childish in the extreme.

That the health benefits is merely a byproduct of this spurious activity and cannot honestly be used as an excuse. In fact, the only excuse which presents itself to me as plausible is that life generally is unrewarding, non-stimulating, and tends to undermine the individual, thus the current spate of abnormally self-centred young men, all trying to outdo one another in their efforts spent in hours and mileage of running training.

Is it that important to run a race in a certain time or to defeat a fellow competitor, especially in view of the fact that ours is a sick society, which badly needs its young people to understand the reasons for this social malady in order to put matters right, which would enable their children to be born

into a better world?

Personally, it is this reasoning which has always acted as a brake on me, in my efforts to become a top class runner by training along similar lines. After several attempts I have given it up as an impossible task. There is enough regimentation and restriction in our lives already, without pushing ourselves in this inhuman and futile way. I cannot believe that athletes like the loneliness and privation of evening training runs, but they carry on despite these naturally felt hardships. And why? Because they want to feel the false sense of glory and acclaim that is heaped upon a class runner. It is all so silly. Of course a chap is going to beat another if he has done harder training. But what does it prove? All this talk of the desirability of "hating" your opponents is quite fantastic. I have often tried this in the past, but have always found it impossible

and, anyway, far too much strain on the

imagination.

In finalising this letter, I would like to sum up by pointing out that if the training an athlete of today undertakes is more character demanding than the work imposed on themselves by other sportsmen, this is more than offset by the "self only" attitude of runners. It doesn't indicate an expansive personality, but a restrictive one. It is all take and no give. To me, this sorry state of affairs is just another indication that society needs a complete overhaul.

National Cross-Country Championships

Midlands take most of the honours at Cambridge

LORIOUS sunshine, comparatively mild temperatures and little wind, plus some really excellent organisation, helped to make the 1963 National Cross-Country Champion-ships, sponsored by the "News of the World", a memorable occasion.

The Senior race provided all the interest and excitement which had been anticipated. From the team angle, it showed that Portsmouth, despite the presence of the season's discovery, Tim Johnston, their track stars Hyman and Tulloh, and the two Cooke brothers, still have not the solidarity and consistency of the holders, Derby, or the new champions, Coventry Godiva. There had been several "ifs and buts" about the Portsmouth team and before the race Secretary Andy Gibb said "from press reports I have a team of cripples but they are all O.K." Tim Johnston, despite a recent stomach upset, did all that one could really expect, for he was right up front until the last mile, but none of the other Portsmouth runners ran up to their best form. It is interesting to note that their last scorer was miler Dick Jones, formerly of Hampstead H., and not long back from the U.S.A.

The Derby runners, except for Bullivant and Dom Keily, were not as prominent as usual and Peter Wilkinson did not finish. But Coventry Godiva packed their six in the first 48, three in the first 17, and all ran extremely well, none more so than Dowall, Carey and Turney in backing up their stars, Heatley, Taylor and Kilby.

The pattern of the race was simple. Once the field had settled down with Craig and Batty leading, a group consisting of Heatley, Strong, Fowler and Johnston gradually opened up a slight gap, with Briault and Turner only a few yards behind, then Craig, followed by a steady stream.

The first four moved steadily away, with Briault trying desperately to maintain contact and being drawn away from the rest of the field. The order changed repeatedly, all four leaders taking it in turn to do the forcing in front. With two-thirds of the distance run Briault made a tremendous effort and joined the leaders. From then until the last mile it looked to be anyone's race, but then Heatley made his effort and started to draw away. Roy Fowler made a gallant attempt to hold him and chased him all the way to the finish, but the Godiva man was just too strong and went on to gain his third National success in four years. Fowler once again proved that he can be the man for the big occasion and ran a

great race; it was bad luck for him that he found Heatley at his best. One could almost say that Tim Briault was the man of the race, certainly it was an outstanding performance to join, with Johnston, the established elite of the cross-country world, only to be beaten in the very late stages of the race.

John Farrington, the Australian London University student, running for Cheltenham, was in a class of his own. With his long hair streaming behind him, he went away from the start and the further he went the greater was his lead. He won unchallenged and by such a margin that it was obvious he would have placed high up in the senior race, had he run in that event.

Evans (Hallamshire) and Gibson (Surrey A.C.) were hanging on to Farrington for the first mile but Gibson fell and retired and

Evans dropped to 35th.

Coventry Godiva made it a grand double when, despite having to wait until 81st position for their last scorer, they took the junior team race too. They look like taking over the mantle from Derby as Britain's premier cross-country club.

It was unfortunate that after so much good work by the local officials, the youths' race, the first of the afternoon, should be affected by runners going off course, due to a marksman leaving his post and just failing to get back in time to direct the leaders on their proper route. A lot of nonsense was talked about this incident, however, and it would be wrong to detract from the great run by Romaine of Spalding. Only some half a dozen of the leaders went off course and only for about 15 yards before they were turned back. So that the advantage gained by the Spalding boy, who was just behind the leaders, was only 30-40 yards at the very most. He ran away from the field so strongly in the later stages that he won by over half a minute, turning his advantage of thirty odd yards into something like 160 at the finish. The field behind the leaders bunched up with many changes of position when this incident occurred.

Luton confirmed their season's excellent form by taking the team race, though they wondered where their fourth man had got to —he eventually came in 76th to ensure a nar-row victory by 3 points. Worcester packed in well for second place and Godiva added a third to their two firsts.

The first nine in the Senior race, Farrington and from 3rd to 6th in the Junior (Adcocks will be over age) were selected to represent England in San Sebastian on March 17th.

TIMOTHY Frederick Kemball Johnston, of Portsmouth A.C. and Cambridge University, was born in Oxford on March 11th, 1941. A law student at Trinity College, he is 5'8½"/1.74 tall and weighs 132lb/59kg.

He made the British rankings for the first time in 1959 when, as a first-year junior, he ran a 4:20.3 mile and 4:27.6 for 1,500m steeplechase. Next year he ran a 4:23.0 mile, 9:29.0 2 miles and

4:26.2 steeplechase.

In 1961 he won the South junior crosscountry title and placed 12th in the National. He retained his Southern crown last year and finished 3rd in the National junior. He won an indoor 2 miles race at Wembley in 9:20.6, ran 14:14.6 for 4th place in the Oxford v. Cambridge 3 miles, won the Cambridge shire title in 14:33.6 and clocked 9:23.4 for the 3,000m steeplechase.

His successes this winter have included the inter-county, U.A.U. and Southern senior championships and victory in the

classic Hannut race.

This is difficult to answer. I think Pirie is the greatest distance runner Britain has produced and I think I admire him because of the way he put running before anything else. He was determined to get to the top, and stayed there. Herb Elliott has had great influence on my training. He used to take half a dozen of us in his car at Cambridge for "burn-ups". Elliott taught us how to rush past a person going up a hill, demoralising him competely. What type of training do you like best?

I like fartlek over the country, but the training that does me most good are interval halves

and quarters.

Do you train in a group or on your own?

In a group it always becomes competitive.

In a group it is all right if you know you are the best there, but it can blunt your competitive edge if you have to fight too hard. It is often better to train with runners slightly less good than you, but it is very hard for them.

PAAVO NURMI warns: "Don't let comfort make you lazy"

THE man behind the legend is still going strong. Paavo Nurmi is now a 65-year-old successful businessman, a big building contractor. The last time he ran in competition was 1933, but he has kept up a close interest in athletics and, of course, especially in his own events. Nurmi is still the same sinewy man as before. He skis and leads an outdoor life. A typical Finn, he has a summer cottage on the sea and there he swims and fishes.

"But in the winter I always want to go south to the sun", he says. "I am different in that respect from those who go to the fells to ski. Last spring I went to the Mediterranean coast and enjoyed my holiday greatly. I think that I shall get myself a villa there later on."

If Nurmi buys a villa there, it will be a real villa. His business associates in the Finnish capital know him as an energetic, realistic and above all an orderly businessman. He has, however, reached the age at which he intends to give himself more liberty and leisure. He intends to travel extensively in different countries. And he will also be seen in the stands following athletics meets. The spark has not died out.

"Wish I was there running"

"It is true that I do not visit the stadium as often as I used to", says Nurmi (who at the Helsinki Olympics in 1952 carried the Olympic torch on the last lap) "but I keep up with the world of sports a good deal through T.V. When I see a good race I sometimes wish I was there running myself... with my present experience. It would be really interesting to compete with the present-day top class runners with the knowledge about coaching I now possess."

Asked which of today's runners he would

Asked which of today's runners he would place at the top, Nurmi answered without hesitation: "Herb Elliott, Murray Halberg and

Peter Snell".

The ex-world champion reminisces smilingly about how he had to be primarily his own coach in the years he was a competing athlete. "Hardly anything was known about coaching at that time. Now it is almost overemphasised, in my opinion. Even in Finland a coach has been engaged all the way from the other end of the world. It is the runner's own contribution that is decisive. If this is remembered Finnish runners will again be able to achieve top-class results. One must be tenacious, methodical and intensive."

These are all genuine Paavo Nurmi characteristics. What is the secret of his good con-



dition? Diet?

"I eat almost anything except animal fats. I am sure that their excessive use is not a good thing. I do not smoke and I use alcohol very moderately. But I know the difference

between good and bad cognac".

"Ski-ing? Yes, it is good, especially for a retired runner. But I do not recommend ski-ing for a competing runner as it develops and stiffens the wrong muscles. Otherwise ski-ing, like all outdoor activity, is good as has been realised once more in Finland even at the

highest level."

"Athletics has won considerable ground in the world," said Paavo Nurmi. "When I was young, competitive sport was pursued on a small scale only, and in few countries. Nowadays track and field has spread everywhere in the world and there is any number of international competitions. The lively participation of teams from the East Bloc countries in these competitions has helped to increase the interest in competitive sport everywhere. The state gives strong support to athletics in these countries. This has increased the number of active sports enthusiasts immensely. It is because of this



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that the Finns simply have no chance any longer of keeping the old domination that they enjoyed in the good old days. But I am sure that Finnish athletes will still give many good proofs of their prowess to the world."

One of the reasons why the Finnish youth no longer take such an interest in the old Finnish events—middle and long distance—is that there are so many new athletic events nowadays of which nothing was known before. Nurmi says that ball games, for instance attract the young of today enormously. Many youths are also "afraid" of the present top-level results which they feel are so high that it is not worth trying any longer. Modern comforts are another reason.

"The higher the standard of living in a country, the weaker the results often are in the events which call for work and trouble. I would like to warn this new generation: Do not let the comfortable life make you lazy. Do not let the new means of transport kill your instinct for physical exercise! Too many young people get used to loafing and driving in a car for small distances even. I believe that I must thank sports for the fact that I am an independent, self-supporting man."

Paavo Nurmi greets all sports enthusiasts and his friends throughout the world: "Good luck and good competitions. Let us keep the flag of athletics flying high."

Olympic Standards for Women Also

The girls, too, are going to have to attain qualifying standards in order to be eligible for the Tokyo Olympics. The following standards were fixed by the I.A.A.F. Women's Commission, subject to the I.A.A.F. Council's approval: 100m—11.7, 200m—24.1, 400m—56.5, 800m—2:10.0, 80mH—11.0, HJ—5'5½"/1.67, LJ—19'8½"/6.00, SP—50'10½"/15.50, DT—164' 0½"/50.00, JT—164'0½"/50.00, Pen—4,400.

On last season's form, these girls (excluding Joy Jordan and Betty Moore, who have retired) would have been eligible for the British team—100m/200m: Dorothy Hyman, Daphne Arden; 400m: three from Joy Grieveson, Jean Sorrell, Pam Piercy, Jean Hall; 800m: Phyllis Perkins, Madeline Ibbotson, Joy Catling; 80mH: Pat Nutting; HJ: three from Linda Knowles, Thelma Hopkins, Frances Slaap, Dorothy Shirley; LJ: Mary Rand, Sheila Parkin; JT: Susan Platt; Pen: Mary Peters. Nobody reached the shot and discus standards (both are beyond the U.K. record!), though Suzanne Allday could have been selected, as each country is able to nominate one person per event by right.

Part 2: 100 yards-100 metres

"I have always regarded it as quite unimportant whether people are convinced or not by argument and discussion. The important thing is to start them thinking on some new and unaccustomed line—any new line rather than none—and then let them work out their own conclusions." ("The Yoga of Health, Youth and Life" by Sir Paul Dukes)

THIS, I suspect, may prove the most contentious of all my series of ratings—the event being the one in which more than any other almost everyone holds firm opinions. Some favour unduly a local athlete, others a champion they know personally, many are swayed by the headlines of the recent past and more have little knowledge or recollection of what happened even as recently as a decade ago.

Before, however, you hasten to make shredded meat of me in the celebrated/ notorious (?) Reader's Column I add the obvious and say these lists were not compiled off the cuff nor without long thought and considerable revision.

An allowance of 0.3 is made for marks of the 1930's and 0.5 for the 1920's as a reasonable compensatory factor for changed con-

ditions.

1. Heather Armitage-Young. A champion by any yardstick you care to choose. Those who were privileged to see Hyman's surge of power in relays last season saw something of the Longwood Thunderbolt's top gear. Seven times a National finalist (only Hiscock had more) with top-ranking times in both distances. Her over-all international record was not the best but she won the 1958 European handily and in the same season outblasted the great Cuthbert at Cardiff and White City. It took the world's greatest-ever 100 yarder, Marlene Mathews-Willard, to nose her out of the gold -in the same time. Heather's win-loss ratio is positive against every British girl and abroad she was universally respected by fields of higher calibre than faced Hyman last year. As captain, sportswoman, personality and durable athlete, Heather need take second place to none. Best times: 10.6, 11.6.

2. June Foulds-Paul. Six finals and three National titles, with a 3 year break between for motherhood. Sport was always something to be indulged in for fun and pleasure to June. Never an assiduous trainer, I would say she was probably the greatest natural sprinter we

have had. If she had trained seriously and eliminated her somewhat awkward and ungainly arm action her times would no doubt have improved; but even so, as they stand, they qualify her easily for our big three. I rate June highly for her friendliness and infectious gay spirits which did much over a decade to popularise women's athletics in the press and encourage young girls to take to the track. These things are seen in retrospect to be as important as records. Best times: 10.7, 11.6.

3. Dorothy Hyman. I was long doubtful whether it was wise to include present-day athletes since, in mid-stream so to speak, it is impossible to allot them any final place in all-time lists. However, on times alone and achievements to date, Dorothy has already qualified as one of the big three. Good as she indubitably is, I feel more is required than a victory in the most mediocre European and Empire sprint fields for more than a decade to warrant any higher place yet. Young retired at 28, Paul at 24. Dorothy is 22 this year and should be still active until 1966 or thereabouts, by which time her deeds could well have boosted her upwards. If, however, she should retire sooner I would not be inclined to upgrade her, as length of topflight career is also one of the hallmarks of an all-time great. Best times: 10.6, 11.5.

4. Anne Pashley. This gritty and exuberant little runner was a regular spitfire over the "century" and can incidentally boast the best international career record over the distance since the pioneer days. On times and Nationals she rates high and had her moments of glory when she even downed Young. Paul, however, seemed to have the Indian sign over the Lowestoft lass regularly. Frail of build, she blazed as a comet over our athletic horizon for a short period and then the track saw her no more. Modest and unassuming, she typified all a sportswoman should be and in the Eastern counties young girls today still dream of becoming a Pashley. Best times 10.8, 11.6.

5. Eileen Hiscock. Alone to claim eight appearances in the National finals, and four wins which only Winifred Jordan has equalled. Her best times rate equivalent to 10.8 and 11.6 today. Contemporaries speak volumes in her praise but her international record was not an outstanding one. I saw her from 1934 onwards and personally was not as impressed as I was with Barbara Burke and Winifred Jordan. It would not be fair, however, to allow teenage memories to outweigh the facts and on these Eileen more than earned her high place. Best times: 11.1, 11.9.

6. Rose Thompson. One of the most beautiful ladies who ever represented Great Britain

(the journalists of the day did not refer to her as "The Rose of England" for nothing!), her first international appearance in 1923 brought a world record (11.4, which I rate the equiva-lent of a 10.9 today). Her next vest was earned in the 1924 Women's International Games in London with a gold medal to pin upon it. The third vest was another winner, in 1925 in the triangular v. Canada and Czechoslovakia. As you can see, opportunities of earning one's colours in those days were few and far between. Only the real elite could make it then, and Rose continued to appear for Britain until 1929 which is sufficient to bespeak her calibre and long reign. Her demeanour and sporting qualities did much to break down the antagonism which existed then in Britain against women's athletics. Best times: 11.4, 12.3.

7. Madeleine Weston-Cobb. Another of the "little" sprinters. Once over the hill the public quickly forgets, yet Madeleine's international record was only marginally inferior to Pashley's and her best times were as good as any bar our top three. Her National record was above average and her service to the sport long and dedicated. Best times: 10.7, 11.7.

8. Winifred Jeffrey-Jordan. National titleholder at 17, she returned to take a further three titles and equal Hiscock's record. Her achievement, spread over 11 years, I rate the more meritorious one. Twin silver medallist at the 1946 European, she climaxed her long and outstanding career with a semi-final at the Wembley Games at what many girls today consider the "old" age of 28. Her times were not sensational but Winifred ran to win and usually did. Apart from her track record, she was always a model athlete-counsellor and friend to all. The development of Birmingham as a hot-bed of women's athletics owes much to her personal example and unstinting work. Best times: 11.3, 12.0.

9. Daisy Ridgley. A splendid international record, and consistently high National placings. Indubitably our best between Thompson and Hiscock. Critics who mattered at the time rated her the most stylish of our sprinters. In the 1932 Scharbeeck International Meeting she returned 10.0 for 80m, which was announced as a world record. Such was the state of things in those days it was not yet known in Europe that Stanislawa Walaciewiczowna (Stella Walsh) had already clocked 9.9 in Cleveland the previous year! Best times: 11.4, 12.2.

10. Jennifer Smart. Consistent international performer, fast and sweet mover; another couple

of high placings in the Nationals would boost her higher up the list. Best times: 10.7, 11.5. 11. Eileen Edwards. Two national titles and world records at 100y in 1924 (11.3) and 100m in 1927 (12.3). If you call them 10.8 and 11.8 today you won't be far out and you'll appreciate her potential. British vests in those times were as scarce as blue moons. A star like Eileen only had a chance to earn two. One was a world record (1927)—the other a silver medal in the 1924 Games. Best times: 11.3, 12.3. 12. Barbara Burke. Residing in South Africa,

she came home for the 1936 Olympics and experienced little difficulty in beating the longstanding champion, Hiscock, in the Nationals and returned a considerably better time in the Berlin Games. Her best of 11.0 in 1935 I consider the equal of 10.7 today. "Bobby" was a big, strong athlete who always seemed, I thought, to over-awe most of her British rivals. Most of her active career was spent in South Africa so from the U.K. angle no higher rating is possible. Best times: 11.0, 12.2.


Twice Olympic Champ —but he never trained seriously!

A)HEMAR never trained seriously," reveals Tomaz Ribeiro, of Brazil, in a letter about the great Adhemar Ferreira da Silva—twice Olympic triple jump champion. Writing to John Le Masurier, he continues: "He would practise one or two months before an important meeting and not very much at that.

"Professor Gongalues (Brazil's chief coach) thinks that he was very gifted and owes his great marks not to his training efforts but to his inborn qualities. Just to give an example, Adhemar could high jump 6ft. (1.83m) off

either of his legs.

"Nevertheless, he had one or two training methods of his own. He used a short sprint to gather momentum and start alternate hopping (giant strides) for about 80-100y. In this exercise he strove for height in the hops without losing speed. He never triple jumped in practice, he only practised the approach and the hop. Professor Gongalues concluded that if Adhemar would have practised methodically he probably would still be the world record holder."

Dixie Near World Record

NOT quite a world record in Perth on February 23rd, but a good female "quarter" ruary 23rd, but a good female "quarter" just the same. Dixie Willis, running in lane 2 had Margaret Burvill (5) and Joyce Bennett (6) covered all the way and finished an easy first in 54.0, a tenth outside her own Commonwealth record and 0.3 slower than Maria Itkina's world mark. Burvill, running her first ever 440, did not run the first 220 as hard as she should and had plenty left in the run-in for 55.3. I am convinced that she could clip some two seconds off this time in the next 18 months. Bennett was 3rd and Mayda Hooper 4th, both well behind Burvill.

Dixie was most pleased about her performance. Once she learned that Margaret would be in the race she started to have "butterflies" and in such a mood Dixie is always ready for

fast times.

Burvill had put up a magnificent 220y display in Perth on February 9th, running 23.7 into a gusty headwind—a performance which compares well with her world record equalling time of 23.2 in January. Bennett was 2nd in 24.2, Willis 3rd in 24.8. Willis, who also won the 880y in 2:12.6, left Perth on March 7th to live for a year with Betty Cuthbert's parents in Sydney.

A night meet in Perth on February 18th saw some sharp doings in the 330y handicap. While Burvill and Willis ran from scratch, Bennett started off 2y and won the race by this margin in 39.1 from Burvill (39.3) and Willis (39.6). These fine times were made on a soggy track

under constant rain.

Mike Lindsay beat his Empire Games conqueror Martyn Lucking for the West Australian shot title in Perth on February 23rd: 57'21 17.44 to 55'11"/17.04. Lindsay had reached 56' 2"/17.12 on February 18th.

ARY HOLDSWORTH sensationally beat Commonwealth Games sprints champion Seraphino Antao (Kenya) in the 220y at the Victorian State championships in Melbourne on February 23rd. The times were 21.5 and 21.7 against the 2.6m/sec. wind. Antao earlier won his heat in 21.5.

The tall, graceful Kenyan was first off the blocks in the final, but Holdsworth was right behind him. Antao appeared to gain a little on the turn, then he "died" and Holdsworth was going away at the finish. Clearly Antao was short of a racing "gallop" and lacked the strength to fight back once Holdsworth got to the front. Shortly before leaving Nairobi, Antao was credited with times of 9.5 and 21.1.

Tony Cook won two Victorian titles: the 6 miles on February 16th in 28:20.0 and the 3 miles on February 23rd in 13:34.2. He seems destined to become Australia's No. 1 long distance track runner.

Unexpectedly sweeping back to top form, Betty Cuthbert thrashed national champion Glenys Beasley in a heat of the N.S.W. 100y championship on a grass track in Sydney on February 23rd. Betty clocked 10.6 against a 3m/sec. wind to beat Beasley by 3y! Betty has been training for the 440y (she ran 54.7 the previous week), which undoubtedly is helping her sprinting.

Mrs. June Ferguson, her coach, said she expected Betty to get close to Marlene Mathews-Willard's world record of 10.3 the following week. Said Betty: "I feel I am running as well as ever I have. I think whoever wins the national title in Brisbane will have to break Marlene's world record." She will decide after the national championships whether to continue until the Tokyo Olympics.

BEATTY STARS AGAIN

JIM BEATTY won the best performer award at the 75th American A.A.U. indoor championships (New York City, February 23rd) for his 3:59.0 mile, his tenth under four minutes. He led all the way through quarters of 58.2, 60.6, 61.2 and 59.0. Jim Grelle, so often his runner-up, came second yet again—in four minutes flat. Cary Weisiger, one of the stars at Wembley last winter, wound up only 7th in 4:15.5.

Two titles went to the Russian visitors. Valeriy Brumel cleared 7'3½"/2.22 for an easy victory over John Thomas, and nearly got over 7'5½"/2.28; while in the long jump Igor Ter-Ovanesyan confirmed his new-found mastery over Ralph Boston.

The pole vault result—four men at 15'6"/4.72 and one (a below par Pentti Nikula) at 15'0"/4.57—had a metallic glint about it. The 600y runners displayed more fibre, Jack Yerman catapulting to a near-record 1:09.4 just ahead of Jim Johnson. Barry Jackson didn't make the final, but neither did Eddie Southern or Willie Atterberry.

A roaring last mile in 4:22.2 provided France with her first ever U.S. title as Michel Bernard (in Bruce Kidd's absence) took the 3 miles in 13:38.4. Stan Taylor was nowhere in the field of 24. A capacity crowd of over 16,000 watched the meet.





Bob Roath Wins Welsh Senior C.C.

A WEEK before this year's Welsh Senior 7 miles was due to be run at Gilwern on February 23rd it was reported that the course was still under a foot of snow, so the W.C.C.A. made representations to Bridgend Y.M.C.A. to stage this 1963 event at Newbridge Fields, where the Junior Championship was held the previous week.

Ken Griffiths, the Y.M.C.A. Secretary, moved smartly and planned a course in these excellent surroundings, one which proved ideal from all points of view. Spectators, officials, T.V. cameramen, and runners alike praised it, and

the sun shone too!

Seventy-one lined up for the start and Brian Griffiths (Roath) led the field around the first lap of half a mile before Bob Roath took command. From this point Roath dictated the race and though he shared the lead in the early stages with David Davies of Birchfield and Brian Jeffs of the R.A.F., he was never again headed.

The four big laps of $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles each were big enough to prevent "lapping" and spectators had an excellent view of large sections of the

race.

Norman Horrell hadn't been seen since last season but he was bang on form, and never more than a few places in arrears. The local crowd shouted their encouragement to him as he passed in fourth place at 2 miles, and then to Ken Flowers lying sixth, and Brian Griffiths 8th. But surprise of the day was the appearance of George Matthiudis of Newport, looking very comfortable among the first 10.

Four "resident" Welshmen in the first 10 was most encouraging to local clubs and to see George Matthiudis and Brian Griffiths run-

ning so well was a tonic.

Roy Profitt (Poly) looked menacing in 7th place at halfway, and with David Richards (Poly) and Ray Billington (Birchfield) close up, many thought Matthiudis and Griffiths might be "killed" in the later stages.

But at 5 miles the pattern was unchanged and Newport Harriers seemed all set to keep their team title, with 4 in the first 20, and their other scoring men in the early thirties.

Lyn Bevan (Newport) and John Collins (Hereford LI) were below their best and could not get into the first dozen, but there were more surprises when Tom Wood (Newport) appeared, grinning as usual, in the first 20, with young Paul Darney just behind in his first ever Senior.

The performances of our youngsters gave much to enthuse over, and there are high hopes for such as Fred Bell (Carmarthen), Mike Rowlands (Newport), Tom Edmunds and Winstone Bradley (Gilwern), and Dilwyn Robbins (Port Talbot), who all finished in the first 25.

Horrell moved quietly forward in the later stages until he shared the lead with Roath, with Jeffs a contented third. Flowers had overtaken Davies, and Profitt, Matthiudis, Griffiths, Richards, Billington, Franklin and Rowlands were now firmly entrenched in this order.

With half-mile to go Roath gained a useful 10 yards as Horrell made a mountain out of a fence, and it seemed to be sufficient. But as they entered the field for the last time Horrell made a desperate attempt to make it a hat-trick of victories for himself when he sprinted for the line from five yards down. But Roath wasn't finished either, and as Horrell came within striking distance, so Roath responded. At the line he was still one stride in front.
