WALKING

Northern 20 Miles Championship

N unfortunate occurrence, due to a dread-A ful lapse on the part of the pilot, says Frank Clay, resulted in the leader, Jim Stancer of Sheffield, going off course at the $12\frac{1}{2}$ miles point. He came back dispirited, of course, in fifth place and retired soon afterwards. This naturally marred the race and took some of shine off the performances of Ray Ibbotson who won in 2h.52m.10s., and Ron Wallwork second in 2:52.45.

The course at Wakefield was a hard one but the conditions good for walking, reports Clay. After Stancer left the prescribed route Ibbotson was in front and looked set for a good win but Wallwork, who walked beautifully over the second ten miles, fought hard to get up to the leader, but Ibbotson just hung on to his lead. Albert Johnson turned out again and was third in 2:56.38 which looks like a come-back by the time of the Bradford Whitsun 50km. Sheffield easily retained the team title.

Middlesex County 20 Miles. Don Thompson won in 2h.38m.57s., just over a minute outside Tom Misson's 1959 record and only 9 seconds slower than his own best for this course made in 1960. Don reckoned the weather was ideal although officials ranked it as "perishing cold." Don and Arthur Thomson shared the lead for 17 miles then Don made the break and built up a 4m.25s. margin in only the last three miles. Charlie Fogg held third throughout and well pounded the last of the four laps to gain somewhat on Arthur Thomson. Ken Easlea was fourth after George Meadows, short of training for the distance, dropped back and later retired. Nigel Thomson passed John Elston to take fifth. Ray Pearce, 7th, first for Poly. did not count in the Middx. race but Poly. nevertheless packed in strongly to go up from fourth to second in the last five miles. Met., holders, won easily.

Hawkins was just ahead approaching Dale Hill, but then Read went by and opened a big lead up the climb. He continued to go away and finished in 3h.1m.33s., while Frank Turner also passed a tiring Hawkins to take second place in 3:6.36, with four minutes to spare.

ON THE ROAD

ROAD running takes pride of place again this weekend, with the Midland Marathon the main event. This will be the first race of the day, started by the Mayor of Leamington, Cllr. Miss C. J. Ledger, at the feast of athletics put on by Leamington C. & A.C. to mark the opening of the long awaited cinder track at Edmonscote Drive provided by the local council.

Holder Tom Buckingham will have stout opposition in the marathon from such as Colin Kemball, Peter Dyer, Peter Leake and Eric Austin, while in the match between Warwickshire and Staffordshire (6 p.m.) Peter Radford, David England, Basil Heatley, Mike Rawson, Neil Duggan, Roy Fowler, Ken Matthews and Maurice Harriott are all down to compete.

Other events this week-end include the Hull and Yorkshire Marathon, Essex "20", Surrey "20", Roath "16\frac{3}", Brechin "12", Salford Road Relay, A.A.A. v. Cambridge University and London University v. Oxford University.

Mr. Urban Taylor has written this week to say that after 42 years the Crompton 8 Miles Road Race had to be cancelled this year "owing to the mean and ridiculous action of the Manchester District Committee, whose secretary threatened to suspend any runners taking part in our race because it clashed with the Manchester & Dist. Lads' Club H. Road Relay." This is a new one to me and if it is correct—and one cannot imagine a secretary cancelling a long established event without good reason—I am sure more will be heard of the matter. What is required here is a little more co-operation from all concerned, not intimidation. In any case there could be no question of the suspension of any athletes taking part in an event put on by a properly affiliated club or association. But whether there has been some misunderstanding or not, this whole matter should be looked into and care taken to ensure that it cannot happen again. After all, the athletes should be the main concern and there is no time in our sport for petty squabbles amongst officials.

After Pat Mackenzie had pointed out that the dates for the Stanmore Indoor Meetings, which we published recently, were those for 1961-2, I referred the matter to Arthur Kendall and he now tells me that the correct dates are: Nov. 2/3, Dec. 7/8, Jan. 11/12 and Feb. 8/9. Please note that those given in the Information Summary were incorrect and those for the December meeting are wrong in the Southern annual.

Sheffield Utd. Harriers have started the ball rolling for the 1962 "Ten Mile, Two-Man" Relay. On April 14th P. Keeling and J. Britland (Hallamshire) clocked 43.46, and I. Evans and M. Hague (Rotherham) 44.30, at Hillsborough. A useful start to the competition which will no doubt be improved on considerably before the end of the year. Athletics Weekly will once more offer excellent prizes to the three best teams — rules and application forms will be re-published shortly.

Manchester, Easter Monday

WILL Derek Ibbotson break the four minute barrier for the mile this season? The answer must surely be "yes", based upon the form shown by the Longwood International at Fallowfield, Manchester on Easter Monday.

Running in his first mile race of the season at the *Daily Herald* sponsored cycling and athletic meeting, Ibbotson clocked 4 mins. 5.0 secs. (his fastest since his Emsley Carr Mile win, August 1959). Bill Roberts (Salford) set the pace in the early stages and led at the half mile in 2 mins. 1.8 secs.

Peter Keeling (Hallamshire) went into the lead on the third lap but at the bell (3 mins. 6 secs), Brian Hall (Man. & D.L.C.), Kevin Mather (Wallasey) and Derek Ibbotson (Long-

wood) were the leading trio.

With 220 yds. to go, Ibbotson found himself "boxed-in", and delayed his effort until the final bend, when he surged away to win by five yards from Hall, with Mather a close third.

Less than two hours after his impressive mile victory Ibbotson turned out for his club in the two mile team race, which again produced a grandstand finish for the large Bank

Holiday crowd.

Ken Wood (Sheffield Utd.) shot into a 10 yd. lead at the bell and Ibbotson took up the challenge, catching his rival half a lap from the tape. It was neck and neck as the two Yorkshiremen battled for the lead but once in the home straight Wood "kicked" again and Ibbotson, no doubt feeling the effects of his earlier efforts, could fight no more. The last lap was covered in well under a minute.

BOB ROATH FIRST HOME IN REDHILL CHARITY '10'

FIFTY-TWO road runners started in the second Redhill 103 miles Road Race on Easter Monday. Bob Roath (Walton) went straight into the lead and quickly opened up a 20 yards gap. By the time Church Hill had been surmounted, Len Williams (V.P.H.) had taken the initiative but was followed closely by Roath, Baker (Horsham), Goode

(Epsom) and Awcock (Horsham).

By 3 miles Roath was again in front and by halfway he had a 7 sec. lead (27.40) over Baker (27.47), followed by Williams 27.52, Goode 27.54, Awcock 28.04, and Harvey (SLH) 28.37. Coming to the top of Church Hill again (7 miles) Williams had dropped to fourth. But Baker and Goode were holding Roath, 70 yards covering the three of them. A pulverising burst at 73 miles from Roath put him well clear and he went on to win by more than 200 yards.

The much improved Goode caught Baker with two miles to go and then went right away to finish a comfortable second. Bodley of S.L.H. ran strongly in the later stages to move up from 8th to 4th, but Williams went back to 5th, just ahead of Awcock.

Horsham had no worries about winning the splendid team trophy but a great tussle developed for second place which eventually went to Epsom, Belgrave just beating S.L.H. for third on the position of their last scorer after a tie.

GERRY NORTH BEATS O'GORMAN'S RECORD

in Feltham Athletic Club's 5 Miles Road Race

FELTHAM A.C. held their annual road races on Easter Monday in what was probably the best weather ever experienced for the event.

A total of 86 starters toed the line and it was not long before Gerry North (Blackpool) established a 20 yards lead. By the mile mark North was 30 yards in front of a bunch headed by Porteus, Bryant, Stevens (all Reading), Ellis (TVH), Forey (Feltham) and Harrison (Highgate).

By 2 miles, North had increased his lead to 80 yards over a bunch headed by the above runners plus Macey (St. Albans) and Harrison (Highgate). After the first lap of $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles the order was North, 150 yards ahead of Harrison, who had moved through suddenly and was 20 yards ahead of Stevens, Macey, Porteus and Strange (Walton) — who in turn were 20 yards ahead of Brennan (Ruislip) and Ellis.

North was 39 sec. ahead at $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles, followed by Harrison, 16 sec. in front of Bryant. who had moved through strongly and was just ahead of Ellis, Strange and Macey.

North went on to win in 24:13.6, well inside the record of 24:37 held by Denis O'Gorman (St. Albans).

The race record was beaten also in the youths' $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles, which was won by John Simmons (Derby), the National Youths cross country champion in 13:03.2. The old record was 13:12 by Ken Smith (Deptford Pk). Simmons led from practically the start and steadily increased his lead to about 150 yards.



FISHER BEATS RECORD IN WALTHAMSTOW RELAY

N INETEEN teams faced the starter for the first of six laps of 2½ miles in the Walthamstow Invitation Road Relay on April 21st. The runners were soon spread out, with Southgate (Sheil) in the lead, and the same runner handed over with four yards to spare from Barnes of Grafton.

At the end of the second lap Howe of the promoting club had taken his team up five places into the lead, with 100 yards to spare over Hornsey, and Grafton were in third

place.

On the third lap O'Mahoney took Wigmore up five places to hand over close behind Hornsey in second position, Walthamstow having dropped right back. Grafton (Cowen) were still third. EDWARDS BEATS HARRISON IN CLOSE RACE

SAM FERRIS reports on the Finchley 20 Miles Road Race

FINCHLEY HARRIERS cram so much into their "Finchley 20" that it would take more space than "A.W." can afford to do justice to a popular event. What I saw on 28th April, when the scroll of the 30th "Finchley" was unrolled by the enthusiastic Reg Butler, crowds me with superlatives. Let me condense my appreciation by a mere utterance "Good show, Reg."

When the record entry of 192 competitors were set in motion the weather was cool and blustery; conditions which allowed large batches of runners to form packs in the early stages of the race. Apart from a couple who had drawn away temporarily-a couple who should have known better-the main pack

passed 3 miles in 15.20.

There were signs of a "breaking contact" at on the "hounds", five of whom were given the same time (25.25) with two others just knocking on. The 12th man passed at 26.13, Here are the twelve: Towl, Edwards, Edmonds, Keily, Howard, Plewes, Harrison, Franklin, Linstead, Keough, Wray and Terry Edwards. There was little change until 8 miles when John Edwards made a break and took Ivor Edmonds with him; the 10 miles recording gives a menwith him; the 10 miles recording gives a mental picture of how effective was the Bristol carving knife. John and Ivor (51.25), George Howard (51.28), David Plewes (51.29), Joe Keily (51.50), George Harrison (51.55), Tony Towl (52.10), Ron Franklin (52.22), Terry Wray (52.56), M. Keough (53.20), Hamish Alexander (53.21) and Terry Edwards (53.22). Round the third lap of 5 miles aches and rains seem to be picked up on the roadside.

pains seem to be picked up on the roadside, Something "got at" young Howard, whilst Tony Towl and Joe Keily had switched over to training pace. The story now spreads to 15 miles where, at 1:17.56, the two Bristol boys were only a short way ahead of George Harrison (1:18.02). The proximity of the followers was significant and briefly explained follows:- Plewes (1:18.26), Franklin (1:19.46), Wray (1:20.11), Alexander (1:20.26), Keough (1:20.55), Keily (1:21.12), K. Smith (1:21.23), Linstead (1:21.33), and Lusty (1:21.36) to make up the dozen. A tribute to the fitness of the first 20 is evident by the maintenance of the fast pace and the fact that there was little change in the positions. It was unfortunate that Ivor Edmonds was reduced to a "sitting duck" through a bad attack of cramp. No normal team could stand the loss of an "Ivor Edmonds" but these Bristolian "hordes" merely push in one more from the "kitty"

and this time the responsibility of replacing Edmonds was delegated to young Ken Smith running his first "20". Seeing Edmonds with his feet up inspired George Harrison to give "more Harrison" and in no time he was in the company of John Edwards; John had no time for this sort of companion and gave conclusive proof of his terrific form by opening up over the last mile to record the third fastest time in the history of this race - only Merriman (1:42.30) and O'Gorman (1:43.26) have faster times to their credit. Another interesting feature: among the 136 who finished the course we saw Tom Richards and Stan Jones-of 1948 Olympic Marathon fame — finishing together in 115th position. Tom has won this race 8 times, and still enjoys his running.

An impression is left by young David Plewes, who took 3rd place in his second "20" — a fortnight ago he was 3rd in the

N Easter Monday, 23rd April, the weather was sunny and warm when Maidenhead A.C. celebrated their tenth annual 10 miles open road race, which attracted 18 teams and 82 individuals; the former to settle the destination of the Coronation Team Challenge Trophy held by Reading A.C. — and the latter to compete for the "Aspro" Individual Cup — in the keeping of Stan Eldon. In the past four years Stan has suffered many "headaches" in his effort to keep this trophy. I recall many great races between Stan and Tony Redrup, who holds the course record of 50 mins. 47 secs. Tony, suffering from diabetes, has retired from competition; Stan, now chasing folk who prefer 6 miles, was elsewhere in a relay. Here endeth the Eldon/Redrup era.

Nevertheless, the high standard of competition still remains, thanks to the debut of young Benny O'Sullivan - Oxford City's Irish star. Within two minutes of the start O'Sullivan was away on his own to pass the two miles mark in 9.15. Edwards and Gale were in hot pursuit but were soon joined by a closely packed quintette who were split up by the undulating terrain which comprised the first lap of 41 miles. Peter Mellor survived the "bumps" to better purpose than the others so that when O'Sullivan passed 5 miles in 25.15 Peter was only 20 seconds away. John Edwards, suffering a bad day, was 15 seconds further back and hoping that he would hold position for his team's sake. Portsmouth however were "boxing cleverly" when Dave Cooke, John Lindsell and Tom Hayden came along together in 26,30. Bristol's Terry Wray and young Mike Gale were aiming to split up this strong Pompey combination but Portsmouth had planted another Cooke to worry the life out of the Bristolians. The far travelled Carmichael from Morpeth filled the tenth position in 27.20.

The "long drag" which was a nasty feature of the 64 mile lap was not everyone's "cupper" and partnerships were severed in good faith. Benny O'Sullivan travelled alone and simply coasted down the slopes to finish as he started cool and calm. FAST TIMES AT CHELMSFORD

MATCH between a team raised by Jack Crump and a combined Essex and Eastern Counties side was held at Chelmsford on April 28th to inaugurate the excellent £20,000 Melbourne Park Athletic Stadium. Though it has been in use since last year, the red seven-lane cinder track was officially declared open by the Marquess of Exeter.

The cold, blustery afternoon was hardly conducive to top class performances, yet several marks of high merit were recorded. Alistair McIlroy, fit and fast after his indoor season, ran 9.7 for the 100 to equal his personal best. A substantial crosswind was blowing, but this fine performance, like all the other sprint and hurdle times, may be taken as valid. Incidentally, third in 10.2 was an American speedster by the name of Anderson. Just arrived in this country, this former Houston University student has times of 9.6 and 20.9 (straight 220) to his credit.

Adrian Metcalfe looked marvellous in the 220. Very slowly away, he was magnificent in full stride and his time of 21.4 was quite remarkable in the unfavourable conditions. His winning margin over Ken Wilcock was greater than the times would suggest. Clearly Metcalfe, who plans to run only a few quarters until the major events roll around, will be challenging David Jones, Peter Radford and Co. for the title of Britain's top furlong runner. Metcalfe's Oxford colleague John Hogan, the indoor hurdles champion, ran a highly promising 14.8 in the 120 hurdles (he's still a junior) though beaten three yards by the impeccable Laurie Taitt.

Most popular win of the day came in the mile. Local boy Brian Hill-Cottingham unleashed a 59.0 last lap to win in 4:11.0 by a yard from another Chelmsford runner, Roger Bell. Later, Hill-Cottingham won an inter-club mile in 4:22.0. Buddy Edelen, also of the home club, was not so successful in the 3 miles, in which he finished 70 yards behind Gerry North who thus speedily avenged his defeat in the AAA 10 miles. Edelen, however, had put in over 120 training miles during the week in preparation for his 1-hour race in Dublin this weekend.

Two women's invitation events — 100 yards and 80m. hurdles - were held. Coaches tell us that the really proficient hurdler should be able to duplicate her 100y, time in the hurdles event, and sure enough Pat Nutting won both events in 11.1. This year could see a big break through by Pat, who has been on the fringe of international class for some time. Her runners-up were Mary Chapman (11.2 100) and Jennifer Farley (11.7 hurdles).

During an inter-club match held in conjunction, Brian Morris (22.0) beat Archie Mc-Donald (22.1) over 220 and Chris Goudge, who ran a rather useful stage in the London-Brighton relay, beat Ron Poole in the 440 hurdles: 54.7 to 56.4. Melvyn Watman

Overseas News

WHO, one might ask with some justification, is Dave Tork? He is the man who, at Walnut (California) on April 28th, cleared the breathtaking height of 16'2" to deprive John Uelses of the pole vault world record.

Tork, though virtually unknown until the last few weeks, is no youngster. He was born at Fairmont, West Virginia, as long ago as August 25th, 1934, and has been vaulting for 10 years. In his first year of competition (1952) he cleared 11'9" — which even by British standards is hardly sensational for a 17-year-old.

Progress was slow but steady. By 1956 he was up to 13'10" and in 1958, as a student at West Virginia University, he cleared 14'1\frac{1}{4}". He joined the Marines in September 1958—about the same time as one John Uelses. He improved to 14'5" in 1959 and in the AAU championship of that year he tied for equal 11th place at 14'3" with, among others, Uelses. He slipped to equal 12th in the 1960 AAU (14'4") though he raised his personal best that season to 14'9".

Last year, his fibre-glass pole carried him over 15'0" for the first time in the AAU meet. Yet such was the standard that he placed only equal 6th. Don Bragg also cleared 15'0" and he finished 13th! This year he jumped 15'0" on March 3rd, slipped to 14'6" on March 10th, set a personal best of 15'4½" on March 17th, cleared 15'1" on March 23rd and 15'1½" the next day, an unexpected best of 15'8¼" (not 15'9¼") behind Uelses' world record 16'0¾" on March 31st, 15'6" (and a close try at 16'1") on April 7th, and 15'8" on April 14th.

At Walnut he opened at 15'0" (!), went on to 15'7" and then 16'2". He cleared the record height at his second attempt — only his 4th jump of the day. He tried, unsuccessfully, for the dream height of 5 metres (16'5"). Tork, who unbelievably grips the pole at 15'0", has his sights set firmly on 17 feet!

Behind Tork, George Davies and Gerald Pratt (a Negro) cleared 15'7"—a 7" improvement for Pratt.

There were several other great performances at this Mount San Antonio Relays meet. Olympic champion Al Oerter threw the discus 198'6", a distance bettered only by Jay Silvester, who on this occasion placed second at 195'7". Ulis Williams equalled his recent best 440y. time of 46.0, Jack Yerman edged Holland's Ray Van Asten in the 880y. with both clocking 1:48.6, Jim Grelle ducked under four minutes with 3:59.9, Joe Faust (7'1½" on April 19th) high jumped 6'11" and Hal Connolly hammered 226'0".

THE 1962 L.A.C. SCHOOLS' MEETING by Bob Sparks

THE 1962 L.A.C. Schools Challenge Cups meeting was held in dry but surprisingly cold weather, and with few outstanding athletes competing, only three of the 16 senior events produced records. An interesting feature was the youthfulness of some of the winners John Sherwood (440 yards) will be 17 on June 4th, and John Archer (1 Mile) is only a month older, while Barry King achieved the shot-discus double less than a month after he turned 17. By contrast, more mature competitors came through in other events, notably Roger Dollimore (succeeding where Bob Izon beat him last year), James Berry (who recently cleared 6ft.), Martin Higden, Nigel Green and

Shaun Lightman.

Outstanding on the track was John Sherwood's quarter-mile triumph; last year he appeared for the junior event with a personal best of about 55 secs., and created a minor sensation with a first-round 51.1 and final 50.8. He then professed himself more interested in cricket, like a true Yorkshireman (he comes from the village of Drax, near Selby), and in fact had only two other important races during the year. Nevertheless, he shows a surprising maturity in pace-judgment, and never seemed unduly hurried by the threat of Tony McCaffrey on the inside lane. Unfortunate seeding in the semi-finals caused the elimination of Peter Davis of Oundle (18 in March), despite his 50.7, second to Allan Skirving (St. Julian's H.S., Newport) 50.6. McCaffrey just squeezed into the final as fastest loser with 50.6 behind Sherwood's 50.1. Skirving was spiked and therefore unable to run in the final.

Another noteworthy track performance came from Rodney Morrod, of York, who produced a crisp series of hurdling for a decisive win over Clive Webb in 14.8 (wind-assisted); only Stuart Tarrant has previously beaten 15 seconds at this meeting. Chiswick C.G.S., with a team consisting of Edward Martin, Martin Higdon (of pole vault aspirations!), Andrew Ronay and 100 yards winner Robert Frith, clipped 0.4 off the relay record, while A.A.A. junior walk champion Shaun Lightman made the first excursion under 7 minutes in the meeting's his-

tory for the second track record.

Martin Higdon, with a share in one record, achieved the only field-events best on the Friday, with an easy clearance of 12'8" for a personal best. As already mentioned, Barry King recorded a double, a really fine achievement, since on the first leg he had to down the renowned Alan Carter. This first meeting between the current multiple youth record-holder (1961 — $61'11\frac{1}{2}''/57'4\frac{3}{4}''/46'0''$) and his heirapparent 1962 — $61'8''/52'8\frac{1}{2}''/45'7''$) was rather inconclusive, because Carter was favouring a wrenched putting arm, sequel of a climbing holiday in Snowdonia, and was unable to better his opening putt of 52'94". In common with several other stars, Barry King was feeling the effects of a week at Lilleshall, but he still managed the following series: $53'4\frac{1}{4}''$, 52'11'', $53'7\frac{1}{4}''$, 51'3'', $54'0\frac{3}{4}''$, $53'5\frac{1}{2}''$, thus beating his previous best on all but one trial. Huddersfield's Allen Ross, adding two feet to his 1961 best, came within an ace of relegating Carter to third place.

Of the 14 individual winners, only one could be described as competely unknown, namely Ian Chapman (javelin); Ian had never previously thrown the 800 gramme spear, but produced two throws over 185ft. As Ken Brookman said, once he learns to throw, he should

do well!
