# WALKING by A. D. McSweeney

K EN MATTHEWS had relief from a hard race over the Highgate course on Saturday and George Williams, his nearest competitor, was well over two minutes in arrears at the finish. Nearly 200 started the ascent of winding West Hill and Matthews breasted the top to pass at "Ye Olde Gate House" sixty yards up on Williams, Bob Clark and John Northcott. On the descent of North Hill Matthews went further away and from the two miles point he clearly walked well within himself and made no attempt to better his own course record of 49m. 09s., made last year in an all-out fight with Stan Vickers.

Along the fast busy section through Hampstead Garden Suburb, Williams pulled away from his two closest rivals and when the climbs started again at half distance Clark dropped Northcott a few yards. Bob Goodall was fifth and in a good position to pass all except Matthews if he found his customary finish. The long "caterpillar" wound its way round Hampstead Heath extension to take the stiff climb past the "Bull and Bush" at 5 miles and there were no changes up to this point in the forward positions. A little further back it was interesting to note the effort being made by Stuart Percy, walking very well indeed, to beat his Junior rival of the week before, Chris Manning—although he didn't succeed.

With a mile and a half to go the ensuing three-quarter mile drop down East Heath Road needed care if disqualification was to be avoided, but in the main the field successfully negotiated this and there were few upsets with the race finishing along the footpath to the Tea Pavilion. Matthews arrived comfortably in 50m. 36s.; Williams in 52.55, followed by Clark 53.09 and Northcott 53.25. Surprisingly Goodall had made no progress and was passed by Godbeer moving up fast in 53.31.

Highgate easily won the team race from Woodford and Metropolitan, but Belgrave, fourth, were sadly under strength.

No Italian 100 km. This big Italian International distance race, won in the past by Don Thompson and by Tom Misson (twice), has been cancelled this year at very short notice, so our possibles who no doubt have been keeping in training, must feel

somewhat disappointed. The race was to have been held on 1st November.

R.I.P. We are sorry to hear of the death of Mr. A. W. Levings, one of the Lancashire Walking Club stalwarts for a very long period.

# Police Win "Dunkley" Cup

The Metropolitan Police, who had beaten the Stock Exchange A.C. in their Annual Match on every occasion during the past 30 years until a narrow defeat last year, regained the "H. A. Dunkley" Trophy at Imber Court on Oct. 17th, scoring 280 to 315 for seventeen men a-side; but the Stock Exchange had first four home. The S.E. plan to finish four men in a row did not quite succeed, for their drill was not up to Guards' pattern and the line was bent to the degree that Ray Hall was deemed to protrude twelve inches in front of Stan Vickers nursing the pack along—and therefore the winner. Although all given the same time the order of finish was decided as shown in the results column.

After the race presentations were made to Mr. Ernest Neville, for his services as an official to the M.P.A.A. over a very long period, and to Mr. John Bidgood, now retired from the Force.

HE way Coventry Godiva Harriers slammed London-Brighton winners Portsmouth, and Thames Valley H., in the Bristol-Weston & Back Road Relay last Saturday shows that they must be brought well into the reckoning when the National Relay is held next April.

Admitted, Portsmouth had Bruce Tulloh absent and the Valley made a bad start, but the manner of Godiva's victory proved that the Midlands now have another team with a winning chance in the National race to join Derby, the holders.

Perhaps Godiva's success will inspire them to greater things over the country, where the Midlands have been struggling for many years to recover some of the pre-War glory which attended Birchfield Harriers in their heyday. If Godiva could emulate some of the Stagbearers' successes, which were characterised by great determination and solidity, it would be good for the sport, for the Midlands have had a rather lean time of it since the last War.

# CRITICISM—AND A REPLY

Dear Mr. Editor.

Olympic year is almost present, athletes all over the country are preparing for next season's Games. Facilities are limited, but enthusiasm and encouragement are in abundance. Everyone is lending a helping hand . . . at least one would think so!

This unfortunately is not the case. A very good example of English absurdity is the case of Mr. George Pallett, Hon. Women's A.A.A. coach, who possesses a most unsportsmanlike attitude towards some of our

Internationals.

It has come to be, that two of our prospective women Olympic sprint hopes have been refused weight training facilities during this rather important winter season, organised by Mr. Pallett, as on the grounds of a first come, first served basis. This appears understandable; what appears incomprehensible is that these two young sprinters had approached Mr. Pallett months before sessions commenced and received his approval. Yet this Women's A.A.A. coach could find no noom whatsoever for two probable Olympic women sprinters!

This is not only a mysterious attitude towards British Internationals, but a rather unsportsmanlike, seemingly selfish, typically arrogant and certainly a most unfriendly

side of Mr. Pallett's character.

How in wonder can a team be sent to Rome, if co-operation all round is to be shattered by such incorrigible acts as Mr. Pallett's! I am not only disgusted that one of our coaches has taken a sour turn, but dismayed that such characters are in such a strong position to do just as they please; at a most crucial time resulting in chaos among our Internationals, who, after all, are only out to do their best for the country.

Editors' Note:

We have published this letter because we feel that it is far better that such comments

should be brought out into the open and quashed, than be said either behind the back of the person criticised, not always intentionally, or be the subject of club and dressing room gossip. In such cases the person concerned has little chance of replying to the criticisms made against him. Mr. Pallett's reply is printed below:—

Dear Mr. Editor,

My conditioning class, as I prefer to call it, comprises weight training or circuit training (depending on the event in which the athlete competes), physical training, apparatus work and indoor games. It's aim, as a whole, is to establish a condition in an athlete which will enable the most strenuous training to be undertaken without harm, and ensure ability to absorb techniques with the maximum benefit. Some of the class have been in it since its inception, eight or nine years ago, and I doubt if those attending would subscribe to the criticisms made.

The two athletes concerned are not, of course, prospective internationals—they are internationals already. Both attended the class in a previous session at the request of their coach, and they had their best season

ever the following summer.

I make a condition of joining the class, and think it reasonable, that all members undertake to attend regularly throughout the winter, and take part in all activities, solely because only thus will the maximum benefit be obtained. These two athletes were inclined to be aloof, did not take part in activities they didn't want to, were inclined to leave when they had done all they thought they should do, and stopped attending before the end of the session. Their response to my request to do as the others did, was that their coach had forbidden them certain of the activities. On the other hand, their coach said they didn't want to take part in certain activities either because they didn't like them, or didn't want to hurt themselves. Who to believe?

In any event, their attitude caused resentment among other members of the group,

not a happy situation nor conducive to the best results. There are always more applicants than I can take owing to restricted accommodation and when these two athletes approached me this year I explained that I could only take those who were prepared to undertake the whole range of activities and remain with the group throughout the whole term. This undertaking was not forthcoming and I continued to recruit others from he waiting list. When eventually I was asked when the class would start (still no undertaking) I had to explain that the class was full.

I should mention that others from the same club have been accepted—perhaps it is a case of sour grapes. I am not concerned whether applicants are internationals, only that they are keen and willing to co-operate, whatever their prospects. The group now contains internationals, near internationals and just good old plodders, and there is a much better atmosphere of team work and mutual help this year.

These two athletes have their own coach. Surely I am not under an *obligation* to assist them at the expense of upsetting the rest of the group? Has a coach no right to refuse to assist for good and sufficient reasons?

It will be interesting to see how many of the imported Internationals represent

Hermes next season.

May I hope that this correspondence improves 3 things:—

(a) the choosing of area teams;

(b) my handwriting so that Brann is not construed as Braun; and

(c) Mr. Mackenzie's power of observation so that Braun is not construed as Brown, because I am now,

I was interested to read Mr. Davidson's letter in Athletics Weekly of the 17th October, suggesting that Scotland be invited to make a third side in the present England matches and that the present Great Britain "B" matches should become English fixtures to enable more Great Britain competitors to take part. Strangely enough the Committee of this club at its last meeting talked on this particular subject. This club was formed to help Scottish athletics and Scots athletes in England, and we feel the suggestion made is an excellent one in every way.

Let us hope that the present sponsors of these meetings can see their way to extend their present generous work to include a further team. I have had the opportunity within the last fortnight of speaking of this matter, quite unofficially, to Mr. Clynes, Honorary Secretary of the A.A.A. and Mr. Walker, Honorary Secretary of the Scottish A.A.A., and I did not gather that either of them, personally, were against it.

Mr. Davidson has asked for other opinions (incidentally, I am sorry that he did not include A. R. Houston, who was third in the Scottish championships in his list of high jumpers). May I say my club is whole-heartedly behind the suggestion and like Mr. Davidson, I will also be interested to read other comments on this subject and to hear of any progress that is made towards the inclusion of Scotland in these matches. Let us hope that the day is not far off when four, instead of two, British athletes will be able to gain match experience at an international level.

### BOOK REVIEW

How They Train by Fred Wilt. before has anyone attempted such a task as has Fred Wilt in this book. This well known American Olympic runner as always been a devoted track fan with a burning thirst for knowledge on training matters. He spent years finding out just what famous runners the world over, from 800 metres to 10,000 metres and more, did their workouts, the work and ideas which made them what they are. In his research he has quizzed more than 200 great runners and in this book he gives their training in detail, their philosophies, their theories, strategies, etc., etc. Interval running, weight training, over-training, pulse rates are other points of interest which the runner and coach will find of absorbing interest. 128 closely packed pages, with many illustrations.
