IT was a pity the weather was so unhelpful, for some excellent performances were recorded which would have been even better on a fine day.

Dave Jones suffered an unusual double defeat, by Alf Meakin in the short sprint and by an impressive looking Robbie Brightwell in the furlong. Basil Clifford came through very late to snatch victory from Simpson in the mile, while Derek Ibbotson recorded a popular victory in the 3 miles over the Surrey pair, Gibson and Presland.

Too much notice should not be paid to Dorothy Hyman's defeat in the women's 100. Expecting a recall when Daphne Arden got away a little too smartly, it did not come and she found the handicap of being several yards down, after virtually stopping, a little too much, but she made amends in the 220 with a comfortable win.

WARM-UP FOR TOUR

THE matches this weekend at the White City against Sweden (men) and Netherlands (women), sponsored by the *News of the World*, should prove an excellent warm-up for the rather more exacting matches against Russia and Hungary in a few weeks time. Our girls may well find their match a tough one, but the men should have little difficulty in winning their contest, though in some events the Swedes will have the edge.

The successes in Brazil of Adrian Metcalfe, John Whetton—who has shown rather in and out of form at home—and Mike Hogan in particular augur well for Tokyo. All three could improve considerably by then.

Hogan's excellent form at the longer distance makes one wonder whether he may be considered for the tour matches. It also seems a pity that places could not have been found in the last three matches of the season for such as Ron Gomez, who looked so good when second Englishman to finish in the A.A.A. 6 miles, Wendy Thomas, knocking on the door of international representation in the women's discus, and Maxine Botley, except for Mary Rand the only girl to really press Pat Nutting in the hurdles this year. These three fast improving athletes have had little encouragement this season. There is also another fine young prospect in the women's discus in Gail Smith, who is in fine form at the moment at an event in which we are woefully weak by world standards.

The form of our athletes in the last few matches of the season will be watched with interest, for this will be the last opportunity they will have before Olympic year of showing their paces and with world standards now so high, they need all the top class competition they can get.

Other events this weekend include the Ken Wilcock Trophy Meeting at St. Helens, Surrey A.C. Women's Meeting at Norbiton, Dartford Road Relay, Red Rose "20" at Morecambe, Port Sunlight "15", Tipton "12", Woodford to Southend Race (11 a.m.), and the Salisbury "Round the Houses" Road Races with 380 runners from 23 clubs in the senior event, coming from as far afield as Torquay, Gloucester and Norfolk, and 240 runners from 18 clubs in the Young Athletes race.

Finally, a letter from Arthur Winter this week states that "Another check on the Poly Marathon distance shows that there was a maximum possible error of 32 yards short. However, I am told that under International Laws you are allowed an error of 1 yard per 1,000, which gives us about 46 yards and puts us in credit again . . . I propose to put this evidence before the A.A.A. and ask for Edelen's performance to be known as a world's best."

FAIR PLAY FOR OUR MILERS

Dear Sir,

I am getting very tired of these so-called miling experts who seem to know exactly what British miling is lacking and how to remedy it, and who persistently criticise Simpson, Keeling and Co. when they win their races in 4 mins. plus. Simpson, this year, has won the Welsh Games mile, the A.A.A. mile and the World Games 1,500m amongst others. Supposing he'd decided during these races that the pace was unbecoming for top-class miling and tried to run from the front—would he, in fact, have won any of them? Let's start giving our praises to the man who *WINS* races, not the one who trips blithely to the front (*à la* Roseman) and fades over the last lap.

Snell was quite content to win his Empire title in 4:4.6 because, as many great runners often admit, it's the men they beat, not the stopwatch, that's important.

Surely these miling moaners remember last year's Emsley Carr Mile when Taylor and Berisford found the Americans willing pace-makers and got dragged through to 3:58 and 3:59.2 respectively. No-one can truthfully say that these two were in a higher class than Keeling and Co., they simply found themselves in a race where everything was right for a 4 min. mile. Put Simpson and one or two others in a race of similar class and you'll get your 4 min. mile—though it is an interesting fact that, since Bannister first broke the barrier, out of the remaining seven British 4 min. milers only Derek Ibbotson has actually *WON* a sub-4-min. race.

In conclusion, I agree with Mr. Horwill when he compliments Hugh Barrow on his courageous front-running, though he tends to get over-excited with this example. To get things in perspective, Barrow is outstanding *FOR HIS AGE* but how many outstanding juniors have we had who either never improve as seniors or simply fade away. To front-run a 4:09 mile is superb for a junior, but what will happen when Barrow races against the top seniors and finds, as John Boulter is finding, that he's doing all the work but leaving himself exposed in the final run-in. Will he still persist in trying to lead all the way or will he join the Simpsons and Keelings in the bunch and try and win races for himself instead of making them for others.

100y—100m COMPARISONS

Dear Sir,

Regarding the letter concerning 100 yards and 100 metres comparison in your magazine of 7th September, Mr. Randolph will possibly find an answer to this problem by reading Ross McWhirter's article on this subject in Vol. 11 No. 10 of this magazine. Ross went to extreme pains to equate for an average closing speed over the last 9.36 yards, giving figures to one hundredth of a second.

My inference from McWhirter's figures, taking into consideration of timing to one tenth of a second, is to add 0.8 sec. for 100 yards time of 9.0—9.6, 0.9 sec. for 9.7—10.5 and 1.0 sec. for 10.6—11.5.

SELECTIONS

Dear Sir,

There has been little criticism of selections of British teams since Derek Johnson's celebrated letter to the BAAB at the end of 1958. This is perhaps surprising, since I do not think it can be said that greater competence has been shown since then.

Three main points were made by Johnson:

1. For team events athletes should be chosen so that maximum points may be anticipated from the team as a whole.
2. When easy victories are expected, however, this principle may be modified in the interests of building for the future.
3. For individual championships, athletes should be chosen for events which they themselves designate, provided they are the best in such events and regardless of the distribution of talent throughout the team as a whole.

One of the most disgraceful omissions occurred in 1960 when only two women high jumpers were sent to Rome, although Janet Gaunt had achieved the Olympic qualifying standard and was clearly deserving of a place.

This year Pat Kippax has been consistently passed over despite the following record: 1st Kent champs 24.5, 3rd Southern champs. 24.7; 6th WAAA champs. 25.3; 1st Cologne 24.4m. Other times of 24.3, 24.7, 24.8 (3 occasions) and 24.3 (doubtful timing, one watch only). Wins *vis à vis*: Rand 1, Arden 1, Packer 1; Losses *vis à vis*: Rand 4, Arden 1, Packer 1, Hyman 2.

VIC SEALY REPLIES

Dear Mr. Editor,

I hope you will give me the opportunity of replying briefly to Mr. Watman's remarks following my letter of last week.

Mr. Watman "fails to see why I used the words biased, inaccurate and sensation-seeking".

He has provided the answer to the first two. The article as a whole dealt with one side only, so it must be biased. He further admits that the statement of which I complained, viz. that one of the high jump officials swore at a coloured competitor, was inaccurate and misleading. As far as sensationalism goes, what could be more sensational than the heading, "Worse than Alabama"? One would have thought that the words of a man who makes such a manifestly absurd statement would have been treated with some scepticism by the reporter in question. It was because of this and by reason of the fact that no attempt was made to verify the statement that an official swore at the coloured girl, or even to find out the identity of the girl, that I made the charge of irresponsibility.

Mr. Watman did tell me at the White City that he got in touch with a top athletics administrator, but his version on that occasion, made in the presence of two people, was that he was seeking advice as to whether the article should be published. Now he infers that he was doing this so that enquiries might be made regarding the allegation. Really, Mr. Watman must be more consistent. When I asked for the name of the official he refused to disclose it. This is nothing new in journalism but such refusals are normally made when the person (if any) has given information and this was certainly not the case in this instance.

I am sorry Mr. Watman was not "big enough" to apologise to those concerned for reporting a statement which he has now admitted as being untrue.

I hope in Mr. Watman's own interests that he will, in future, seek to verify statements made against the individual and would remind him that British law takes little account of assumptions and unverified statements, particularly when the character and good name of an individual is at stake.

Melvyn Watman replies: Mr. Sealy says I admit the statement he complains of—that one of the top high jump officials swore at a coloured competitor—was inaccurate and misleading. As I mentioned last week, I appear to have been wrong in assuming the athlete concerned in the alleged incident was Miss Montgomery, but I must remind Mr. Sealy that the words in question were in fact as follows (August 17th issue of "A.W."): "Did you know that one of the high jump officials swore

at one of our girls because she took rather a long time preparing to jump?" The allegation could have applied equally to Miss Montgomery or Miss Daniels and I admit I slipped up in failing to make sure which was the athlete involved. But surely the identity of the athlete, and the colour of her skin, is irrelevant to the central issue: did an official swear at an athlete?

I don't profess to know what did happen during the competition and I cannot retract a statement made *to* me, not *by* me. However, I would like to take this opportunity to apologise to Mr. Sealy and his colleagues for any embarrassment caused by that paragraph of the article. As I stated last week the words under dispute were reported in good faith, but on reflection I agree it would have been more satisfactory to have contacted Mr. Sealy and his colleagues for their comments prior to publication in the first instance.

SEND TEAM TO A.A.U.

Dear Sir,

I noticed among the results of the American A.A.U. Champs., at St. Louis in June, the names of a number of leading German performers. Although they don't appear to have performed exceptionally I do think that this could be a lead to British Athletic Administrators.

A team of say the Joneses, Metcalfe, Brightwell, Boulter, Cooper and Simpson would benefit no end from competition offered in the world's toughest domestic athletics. I suggest therefore that the A.A.A. seriously consider sending a small select team to the 1964 A.A.U. Champs.

This could mean the difference between a good place and a "GOLD" at Tokyo.

MUNICH BEAT HERCULES TEAM, Munich, Aug. 28th

THE match against ESV Munchen at the wonderful Dante Stadium took place in drenching rain, but there was no depression about the standard of competition. The Munich club had called on outstanding athletes from other local clubs to test the "Hercules" team which was made up of members of Hercules and other Surrey clubs. Munich won 83-70.

Ernie Earl was right on form and, leading most of the way, won the 5,000m in his personal best time of 14:47.2. Next best Hercules man was Robin Walsh (SLH), running as an extra, 14:52.6. Tony Harris (Mitcham) had to fight hard to win the 800m in 1:51.4, good time under appalling conditions. Pete Pepe (Bels) won the 400m Hurdles handsomely in 56.7.

The relays finished the meeting on an exciting note. Pete Cornell pulled a groin muscle on the last leg of the 4x100m at a point when he appeared to have the race in hand. In the 4x400m Keen gave the touring side a substantial lead which was gradually whittled away by the Munich runners. Harris had a slight lead on the final leg and was caught on the last bend; he ran magnificently to get the verdict by a narrower margin than the times suggest.

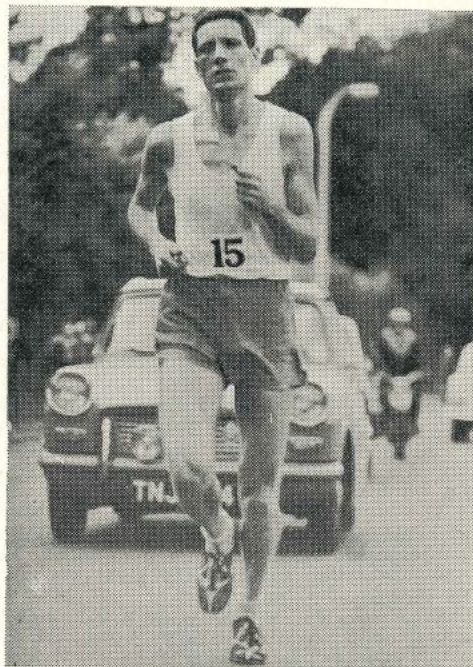

On a cold, wet, breezy evening Jim Hogan declined to make his promised attempt on the world 10 miles record because of the conditions, and Mick Neville turned in the finest example of strong and courageous running that it has ever been the privilege of this observer to witness. After finishing second in the mile to Basil Clifford (4:05.8) in a personal best of 4:06.8 he volunteered to run in the 10 mile event. Allowed only ten minutes (!) rest between the two events he ran a personal best of 50:00.0 and for no less than five miles he was ahead of Bertie Messitt's recent record of 48:44.4!! After the five mile mark the conditions and fatigue really began to take their toll, but despite this and the additional agony of a stitch, Neville ran on, registering a very creditable 29:25.0 for six miles, his sole clocking this year for the distance, and not very far off his personal best of 28:55.6.

This was the first time we had seen Mick at home since he went to Coventry and the improvement in his form is tremendous. He now looks like fulfilling the great potential he showed as a junior.

HAYES . . KING OF THE HIGHS

THE first time I set eyes on Hayes Jones was way back in February 1958 in New York's Madison Square Garden. He had already made something of a name for himself by clocking 9.4 for 100y and 13.7 for 120y hurdles the previous summer while still only 18, but it was at this A.A.U. indoor meet that he first showed the world his top-class competitive ability.

I described that 60y hurdles championship for *Athletics Weekly* in these terms: "Hayes Jones (19) emerged as a potential world beater with a scintillating yard upset of the seemingly invincible Elias Gilbert in the brilliant time of 7.1. Jones, running at the 'Garden' for the first time, was off to a fast start and despite rapping the last hurdle was always clearly in front."

Five and a half years have drifted by since that freezing night and today Hayes Wendell Jones is without doubt the number one high hurdler in the world. The very highest honours, however, have so far eluded him. He has dominated the indoor hurdling scene since 1958 but you will search in vain for his name in the list of outdoor world record holders (except for a share in a sprint relay record) or on the roll of Olympic champions.

Jones has been at or near the top for seven seasons; he was Pan-American champion in 1959, he has won four outdoor A.A.U. titles (and five more indoors), he has made more international match appearances than any other American, he has accumulated the greatest number of sub-13.8 marks in history (28), he has won 44 indoor hurdle races on the trot . . . yet for all his dazzling achievements Jones is an unfulfilled athlete. His own best time is 13.4, a fifth slower than the world record, but he believes he can run 13 seconds flat. But what he yearns for most is an Olympic gold medal.

"I really want that gold medal next year," he told me last month. "I missed my chance in Rome (he placed 3rd) and Tokyo will be my last opportunity. Win or lose, I shall retire from outdoor competition after the Games." He plans to continue racing on the boards until 1968 or such time as he is defeated. Harrison Dillard won a total of 85 indoor races during his long career; Jones hopes to top that figure in one unbeaten string.

Jones shares two Dillard characteristics: his phenomenal speed off the blocks (Jones claims that only once in his career has he been beaten to the first hurdle and that was in the Olympic final of all races) and his relative lack of inches. Jones is 5'10 $\frac{1}{2}$ "/1.79 and says he is still

growing at the age of 25. His legs are long in proportion to his trunk and he weighs 163lb/74kg.

He attributes his success to his fast start and leg speed. He admits he usually fades over the last three hurdles but hopes to develop extra power next season by introducing weight training into his schedule. At present he trains mainly over 3-4 flights with repetition runs on the flat over 150y (6), 220y (10) and 330y (10). He works out all the year round, often twice a day—at 5 a.m. (!) and 4 p.m.

Mind a complete blank

For a man who relies so much on his get-away the start of a race is not the nerve-racking experience one might expect. "My mind is a complete blank when I'm on my blocks," reveals Jones, "and in most of my top races I haven't even realised I've been running until about the 8th hurdle."

An intelligent and fluent speaker, Jones told me that athletics has helped him to develop his personality. "At junior high school I used to stutter and was unable to carry on a conversation. Track has played a large part in my life—I began when I was 11—but it's been well worth it. Now if only I can win that gold medal . . ."

Great Comeback By Long

DALLAS LONG made a convincing comeback by putting the shot 62'9 $\frac{1}{2}$ "/19.14 on August 30th—an astonishing performance when one remembers that the colossal American had not touched a shot for a year! As a matter of fact, his last competition was in Honolulu on September 3rd, 1962, when he recorded 62'0 $\frac{1}{4}$ "/18.91.

Long—a future dental surgeon—devoted all his time last winter to studying so that he only began his "winter" preparation in June. "I am very surprised and certainly very satisfied with my performance," he declared. "I want to finish, for the third consecutive year, top of the world rankings. If I don't make it, this will be the first time since 1938—the era of the great German throwers—that top place has not been occupied by an American!" Vilmos Varju (Hungary) currently heads the list with 63'8 $\frac{1}{2}$ "/19.42.

Dallas is very confident for 1964 and the Olympics, for he has never been as strong as he is at the moment: he has bettered all his weightlifting records. He is more muscular than ever and the Long of 1962 would seem like a little boy beside the Long of this year.

His projects for 1964 include competing in four indoor meets. After this short season he will continue to lift weights and will not make his outdoor debut until the end of April—relatively late for an American, particularly in California where the season starts in mid-March.

"I shall be very disappointed if I don't improve on my world record (65'10 $\frac{1}{2}$ "/20.08). In fact, my goals for next season are a gold medal at Tokyo, of course, and also 67 feet (20.42)".

Britain Should Win Both

BRITAIN can be expected to win both matches at the White City this weekend: the men take on Sweden, the girls face the Netherlands. Britain and Sweden have met only once before. Ten years ago in Stockholm the Swedes won 109-103 after taking the final decisive event, the 4x400m relay. Since those days Sweden has declined sadly as an athletics power, and a very easy victory is in prospect for Britain. The British girls will have to fight harder, for the improving Dutch team should be closer than last year when the score was 72-46.

Possible highlights of the men's match: Robbie Brightwell's come-back to international 400m racing against Bengt-Goran Fernstrom, who has a win over Ullis Williams to his credit; the appearance of Sweden's number one track hero, "Esso" Larsson, against Ray Roseman and Stan Taylor (1,500m) and John Anderson and Bruce Tulloh (5,000); Maurice Herriott's duel with 8:39.8 man Bengt Persson; the three-way battle waged by Mike Parker, Laurie Taitt and Bo Forssander, all 14.1 performers this season; Stig Pettersson and Kjell-Ake Nilsson attempting 7 ft. in the high jump all being well.

Possible highlights of the women's match: Another fast double by Dorothy Hyman; a classic 400m matching Joy Grieveson (best ever of 53.9) and Ann Packer (54.4) against Tilly van der Zwaard and Gerda Kraan (53.7 each), with the winner perhaps beating Itkina's European record of 53.2; Miss Kraan showing why she is European 800m champion; the clash between Pat Nutting and Mary Rand to decide who is our top 80m hurdler; a high-class long jump contest involving Mrs. Rand, Sheila Parkin, Cor Bakker and Ellen Ort.

E. GERMANY: BUHL WINS TITLE— OF YEAR'S UNLUCKIEST ATHLETE

How unlucky can one get? Early last month in Sweden, steeplechaser Hermann Buhl lost a possible world record and victory over Gaston Roelants when he fell at the last hurdle (he still finished in 8:37.6), but he was even more unfortunate in the East German championships. While way ahead of the field and seemingly headed for 8:30 or better he injured himself 200m from the finish and was forced to drop out, the title going to Rainer Dörner in 8:41.4.

Shock of the meet (Jena, August 30th—September 1st) was Siegfried Valentin's defeat in the 1,500m at the hands (or perhaps elbows) of Karl-Heinz Kruse. Valentin protested that he was fouled as Kruse went by on the inside 100m from the finish, but the result stood.

Amazing Finish to Baillie's Record Run

NEW ZEALANDER Bill Baillie finished his world record one hour run at a fantastic speed. He covered the final 3 miles in about 14 minutes . . . the last 220y in 30 seconds dead!

Eleven runners lined up on the hard bitumen Lovelock Track in Auckland on August 24th: Baillie, Barry Magee, Jeff Julian, Neville Scott, Ray Puckett and six Japanese. The 6 miles point was passed by the leading bunch in 28:52 and shortly afterwards Puckett (who was born in Kent) took over followed by Baillie, Kokiichi Tsuburaya and Kazumi Watanabe. Puckett stayed ahead until just before 10 miles when Tsuburaya moved in front, with Baillie and Watanabe also passing Puckett.

Baillie made his break at 10 miles, which he passed in 48:09 to shatter his own N.Z. record of 49:57. He turned in a scorching lap of 68 sec. and averaged 4:40 per mile for the rest of the race. Both he (59:28.6) and Tsuburaya (59:51.4) beat Emil Zatopek's 20km record of 59:51.8. The distances covered in the hour (Zatopek's record was 12M 810y/20,052m) were: Baillie 12M 960y 7in/20,188m; Tsuburaya (aged 23) 12M 843y; Puckett 12M 630y; Watanabe 12M 513y; Magee 12M 318y.

William David Baillie, who was born at Nelson on 28.5.34, has had a chequered career since he started racing ten years ago. He has suffered many a breakdown through injury and his tremendous range, 880y to marathon, has perhaps prevented his reaching the very top in any one event.

He made his international debut at Vancouver in the 1954 Empire Games, setting personal bests in both the 880y (4th in 1:52.5, after 1:52.3 heat) and the famous Bannister-Landy mile (7th in 4:11.0). He moved up to 3 and 6 miles the following year but had to wait until 1958 for his next big international race. He placed 9th in the Cardiff 3M in 13:44.4, his fastest at that time. Last year he enjoyed his most successful track season, posting personal bests at the mile (4:02.2), 3M (13:29.0), 5,000m (14:05.4) and 10,000m (29:22.0), but injury forced him to drop out of the Perth 6M.

He continued to mix distances last winter, and in February he ran a 28:07.0 6M only five days after a 4:03.0 mile. Other personal bests of his include 8:45.4 for 2M, 2:20:13 marathon and 3:46:00 for 40M. Standing 5'6½"/1.69 and weighing 144lb/6 kg, Baillie is a disciple of Arthur Lydiard. He spent 1957 at Portsea with Percy Cerutti but found he did not fit in with the Australian coach's methods. Baillie is aiming for the 10,000m at Tokyo next year.

MIKE HOGAN IS REVELATION OF WORLD UNIVERSITY GAMES

ADRIAN METCALFE (400m) and John Whetton (1,500m) won their events at the World University Games held at Porto Alegre, Brazil, from September 5th to 8th. Metcalfe's time of 46.6 was his best this season. The surprise packet was Mike Hogan, who made himself Britain's fastest ever all-round hurdler with times of 14.1 and 51.4.

The “Brighton”: It is not often that an athlete wins a major event with his first effort,

but this happened last Saturday when Dennis Read (Steyning), brother of the 1956 Olympic 50kms. Champion, won the annual Open London to Brighton Walk in the good time of 8 hrs. 06m. 58s. Read thus completes a remarkable six weeks of long-distance walking. On 27th July he finished a close second in the Dover-Canterbury & Return (28 miles), on the 17th August he won the Hastings to Brighton (38 miles) and now the London-Brighton (53 miles). As he is only 22 years old, he follows in the footsteps of the illustrious holder, Don Thompson, who also recorded the first of his eight successive wins in this event at the same age, and there was only 34 seconds difference in their times.

This year's event was a most interesting one to follow. At Streatham Hill (5 miles), Colin Young (Essex Beagles) was leading by one minute and was followed by a group of six. In the circumstances the result achieved by Gwenda Matthews, guesting at the request of Mrs. Tyler, was very good indeed—her 5'3½" was worth every bit of 5'7" this afternoon.

The half mile saw the return of Phyl. Perkins, who looked her old self, to a welcome and unforced 2:15.3 win. Other highlights of a very interesting afternoon's sport were Madeleine Cobb's fastest 220 yd. for four years, and a very finely judged 440 by Marianne Dew whose victory over the "statistically" faster Jean Welch was thoroughly deserved. Rather surprisingly both girls proved insufficient to prevent a very rare Selsonia relay de-

feat this year, Ilford rising above themselves and making it by the skin of their teeth.

Whilst no startling performances were achieved by either, I think a word of credit is due to two field event ladies.
