KUZNYETSOV and BALAS STAR IN TURIN

Eye witness account of Universiade by Melvyn Watman

D espite a number of unfortunate and over publicised political incidents, the Universiade (previously known as the World Student Games) at Turin from September 3rd to 6th proved to be a successful, enjoyable and sporting event. The Communal Stadium with its 446 metre track was magnificently equipped to hold such an important meeting, although it was regrettable that the stadium was never even a quarter full. The crowd, however, made up in noise what it lacked in number!

The two outstanding athletes of the Games were both world record holders and European champions. Vasiliy Kuznyetsov (USSR), who set a world's best pentathlon score of 4,006 points, and Iolanda Balas (Rumania), who high jumped 5'10\frac{1}{8}", a height achieved by no other woman.

The British (or rather Oxford) team did quite well. Medals were won in the 5,000 metres by Kevin Gilligan (gold), 800 metres by John Holt (silver), 1500 metres by John Winch (silver), and by the 4 x 400 metres relay team (bronze).

Thursday, September 3rd

100 metres (first round): The Italian Berruti, Europe's leading sprinter this season, impressed with a smooth 10.7 clocking, fastest of the series. A minor surprise was the victory of Railton over the Greek 10.5 man Georgopolous, but the time was only 11.0. Taylor was only a shadow of his early-season self and came last in 11.4 in his heat.

400 metres (first round): An uneventful round, with Klappert (W. Germany) fastest up with 48.7. The Scotsman Hay (49.5) qualified for the semi-final behind the Czech Traisil (49.0), as did Futter (49.6) in third place behind the Yugoslav Snajder (48.8) and the Italian Fossati (48.8).

800 metres (first round): With three to go forward and only three or four runners competing in most heats this round was some

peting in most heats this round was somewhat farcical. Lanes were used for the first 200 metres. The holder, Lawrenz (W. Germany) posted the fastest time of 1:53.2. Harder, of Switzerland, had the heartbreak-

ing experience of clocking 1:54.2 for fourth in Lawrenz's heat, thus failing to qualify for the semi-final, while no fewer than nine athletes went through in slower than 2:05. Holt won his heat in 1:55.3, and Blythe came second in his in 2:06.1.

800 metres (semi-finals): Holt and Blythe did well to reach the six-man final. Holt, the 1957 A.A.A. junior 400 yards champion, clocked his best ever time of 1:52.1. to edge 1:49.4 man Fraschini (Italy) for a place in the final behind Lawrenz (1:51.8). Blythe made all the running in another heat and after being passed by Heydecke (W. Germany) 100 yards from the finish held on well to return 1:51.9 behind the German's 1:51.6. The other semi-final was won by the Austrian Klaban in 1:50.8, just ahead of the neat little Japanese runner Watanabe (1:51.0).

Pole Vault (qualifying): Fourteen athletes cleared 12ft. 1\(\frac{3}{4}\)in. to reach the final, among them, the Soviet champion Pyetrenko.

Shot (qualifying): West Germany's Lingnau, the man who defeated Rowe at the White City recently, demoralised all his rivals with a heave of 56ft. 10\frac{1}{4}in. Next best was 54ft. 6\frac{1}{4}in. by Hungary's 59-footer Nagy. Lucking, who achieved 57ft. 10\frac{1}{2}in. in an exhibition shortly before leaving England reached 54ft. 2\frac{3}{4}in. and Harrison 47ft. 10\frac{1}{2}in.

Shot (final): Lingnau held off Nagy's challenge to win with a performance inferior to his qualifying mark. Lucking, despite achieving one of his best ever distances in competition, was a little disappointing. Harrison surpassed himself by beating the Yugoslav record holder Radosevic with a mark only 3½in. below his personal best.

Hammer (qualifying): The "big boys" were competing under wraps and only Zsivotzky (Hungary) bothered to beat 200 feet (200ft. 0½in.). Fayne, a Rhodesian studying at Birmingham University, qualified in sixth place with 175ft. 0in.

Pentathlon: Vasiliy Kuznyetsov (USSR) confirmed his standing as the world's number one all-round athlete by setting a world's best total of 4,006 points for this rarely contested event. Within the space of four hours actual competition (spread over nine hours) he long jumped 23ft. 6½in., threw the javelin 238ft. 9½", ran 200 metres in 22.2, hurled the discus 162ft. 4¾in. and finally plodded around 1500 metres in a weary 4:59.5. A remarkable display. The previous "record" of 3,901 points was held by Kuznyetsov (23ft. 0in., 211ft. 8½in, 21.9, 165ft. 2¼in., 4:46.2).

Women's 100 metres (heats): Like her male compatriot. Leone (Italy) impressed with her controlled sprinting. Her time of 11.8 was the fastest of the round, The British girls, Mason (12.4) and Follows (12.9) were eliminated.

Friday, September 4th

100 metres (semi-finals): Berruti was even more impressive as he eased his way to a 10.5 clocking, best of the round. Railton was a good and rather unexpected second behind the Italian in 10.8 and thus reached the final. The Frenchman Penez (10.7) was the only other runner to beat Railton's time.

100 metres (final): The final, held an hour later, was a strictly one-man show, with Berruti striding away to win by at least two yards in 10.5. Railton could not quite reproduce his earlier form, but his fifth place

was highly commendable.

400 metres (semi-finals): Three men beat 48 secs.: Snajder (Yugoslavia) with 47.7, the German Klappert (47.8) and the Rumanian Sudrigean (47.8). Futter qualified for the final behind Germany's Oberste (48.4), but his time of 48.7 was in fact only eighth fastest of the series. Hay (49.6) finished fifth in his heat.

800 metres (final): After two years of virtual stagnation since his brilliant 1957 season as a junior, John Holt at last showed his true worth. His daring bid for victory failed only by inches. Watanabe (Japan) led for the first 200 metres run in lanes and at the bell (54.5) Lawrenz, the 1957 winner, was just ahead of Watanabe, with Blythe third and Holt fifth and last. Less than five yards covered the field. Holt moved up swiftly at the start of the last turn and dashed into the lead 150 yards from home. He was three yards ahead at the beginning of the long final straight but slowly but surely Heydecke (Germany) made up the deficit and in the last couple of strides pushed ahead. Both men were given 1:50.5, easily a personal best for Holt whose fastest half is only 1:53.6. Only two yards behind, Watanabe gained a similarly narrow decision over Blythe, both returning 1:50.9-a personal best for both: and an Asian record for the Japanese. The pre-race favourite, Klaban (Austria), was ordered to withdraw by his national association.

Nigerian Okuwobi.

Pole Vault (final): The formbook went astray in this long drawn-out contest. Yasuda (Japan) cleared 14ft. 3¼in. first time to score a popular and unexpected win. The Yugoslav Kusmanovic beat several better known rivals to place second at 14ft. 1¼in. Pyetrenko, the Soviet champion, had an off-day, clearing 13ft. 5¼in, third time and missing out at 13ft. 9¼in. He displayed great ability but time and again he knocked the bar with his arm on the way down.

110 metres hurdles (first round.) The Yugoslav Lorger, at 14.4, was the fastest. Both Parker and Price clocked 14.9 to enter the semi-finals, while Nigeria's Duncan returned 14.8.

4 x 100 metres relay (heats). Italy fastest

with 41.2; Britain qualified in 42.8.

4 x 400 metres relay (heats): A farcical second heat saw Italy win from Britain in 3:53.5. Yes, it was a men's relay.

High Jump (final). The young Rumanian prospect Porumb won his first major com-

petition by a two-inch margin.

RULES FOR TWO-MAN, TEN MILE RELAY COMPETITION

- 1. Both competitors must be first claim members of a Club, University, College, Service Unit, etc. (In Britain the first claim rule shall apply).
- 2. Applications for performances to be considered must be made on the proper entry form which will be printed in "Athletics Weekly," from time to time. Each form must be signed by a responsible official who has witnessed the performance and must certify that time and distance are correct. The performance need not be made in actual competition.
- 3. Runners may change-over whenever they please, but they must cover the full 10 miles between them. For this purpose a baton not exceeding 12 inches in length must be used. If the baton is dropped, it must be recovered (i.e. the baton must be carried the full 10 miles).
- 4. The decision of the following Committee shall be final Mr. J. C. G. Crump, O.B.E., the British Amateur Athletic Board Hon. Secretary; Mr. Roy Moor, Athletics Correspondent of the "News Chronicle," and former international quarter-miler, and the Editor of "Athletics Weekly."

RTHUR NEWTON

Arthur Newton, who passed away on September 7th, was in his 77th year. Arthur Newton was a very remakable man. Like many pioneers he was a generation in advance of his time, he explored and preached new methods of training in athletics which

are now universal practice.

He was one of the first to train every day all the year round. No detail was too insignificant for his study and attention. His "Magic Drink," the most important ingredient of which is common salt, is now used in fields outside athletics when men work in tropical conditions. His adventurous life and amazing athletic career make fascinating reading.

He was born in Somerset and emigrated at the turn of the century to South Africa, where he became a farmer. Sixteen years of pioneering work produced a flourishing farm

but then he was struck by a cruel blow. The Department of Native Affairs declared the area "Black" and Newton was forced to quit without compensation. He thought he would have a better chance of obtaining justice if he was better known, and as amateur athletics was as healthy as anything on earth, he decided to put his whole heart and soul into it, since sportsmen were amongst those people best known to the public.

Newton was now approaching forty and had never taken part in athletics previously. Nevertheless, between 1922 and 1934, he pioneered a new branch of athletics. His achievements included a succession of victories in the Comrades' marathon, the annual 54 mile race in Natal. He substantially reduced all amateur running records from 30 to 100 miles, including the London-Brighton, and ran 100 miles on the Bath road at the age of 51, in 14 hours 6 mins. He competed in the U.S.A. and in Canada, where he made a 24 hour record.

Newton always said this was simply due to his being better trained than anyone else, and that younger men would lower his records. Indeed, he himself was the man who inspired and trained them to do so. He devoted the latter part of his life to encouraging long distance runners, he was the author of four books, and maintained a prodigious correspondence with his many athletic friends all over the world. Arthur Newton was a great athlete and sportsman, a man of retiring disposition, he never sought the limelight; yet never has any athlete been more universally admired and liked. J.C.J.

"BRIGHTON" WIN

ECHNICALLY Don Thompson failed to break his own 1957 course record for London to Brighton 53 miles trek by the hairbreadth margin of 16 seconds, but in the opinion surely of all qualified to judge this was the finest walking performance by far ever made over this course. Two years ago 19 men beat 1st class standard and 48—over half the field, beat 2nd class. On Saturday last, one of the hottest days ever for the race, only 9 beat 1st-class and 19 — less than a quarter of the starters, beat 2nd-class. This is really the guide for comparison. Unless Thompson is completely impervious to climatic conditions then I would say his 7h. 35m.28s. of 1959 was worth 15 minutes better than his 7h.25m.12s. of 1957. To bear this out the middle of the field men were about 30 minutes down on expected times and the slower men even more out of schedule.

So 26-year-old Don now wears a crown which has adorned no other walker's head five consecutive Brighton wins and four times inside eight hours. Tom Misson, who had to be content with second place for the third year, fought with grim determination to prevent his clubmate scoring his fifth win-for record, and kept the issue open for over 30 miles—they were still level at Crawley, then on the switch-back in the next few miles Thompson began to show ascendancy and after Handcross, 34 miles, really opened out to lead at Bolney, 39 miles, by four minutes. This was a decisive margin but Thompson crammed on all sail to widen the gap at the finish to 17m.58s, and to cover this stretch one minute faster than when setting his 1957 record.

80 started and the Met. "twins" shot off to be nearly ten minutes up at South Croydon, 10½ miles, where Hugh McGreechan was third. At Redhill, 20 miles, the leaders passed in 2h.45m.39s., with Ray Hall third in 3h.3m. He was closely followed by Hughie Neilson, his Stock Exchange rival, "Dicky" Green, Nigel Thompson and Colin Young. At Crawley (Thompson and Misson 4.19.36) Hall had moved away from the rest to pass in 4.44.13, Thompson N. 4.46.36, Young 4.47.35; Neilson 4.48.49 and Beecham 4.49.30.

Nigel Thompson lost a bit of ground soon after for Young to take fourth place at Bolney where he was within striking distance of Hall: Thompson 5.35.0; Misson 5.39.0; Hall 6.11.0; Young 6.12.12; Thompson N. 6.15.0; Beecham 6.17.23. At Dale Hill with $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles to go Hall had opened up again from Young while Beecham had moved up to 5th. On the fast "run-in" to Brighton, Neilson also passed the younger Thompson otherwise there was no change in the first dozen placings.

The team race was a two-club affair with almost dramatic happenings in that last 15 miles. Earlier the Met., with Arthur Thompson and Bryan Hawkins alternating for fourth

man, had set up an impregnable lead over Belgrave, the holders, and at Crawley it was 16 to 34 in favour of Met. In turn Thompson and Hawkins "died" but outsider Tom Lawrence, making his first bid in the race, raced up the field to pass both and give the Met. four in eight at Bolney where Belgrave, although improving, were still 14 points away. Then Lawrence sold out suddenly and completely with ten miles to go and with Harry Shields, the Belgrave warrior and fourth man, making inroads, the race was wide open in the matter of a few minutes. Fortunately for the Met. Hawkins rallied and doggedly forced himself back into the picture to hold the fort for his club. Belgrave closed up to two points but could get no nearer and Hawkins gained a place near the end to make victory certain by three points, and to give the Met, their first team success ever in this race, Highgate beat Surrey W.C. for third place.

The Trinidad team of four, competing in their last event before leaving for home, all finished very creditably but even they found the day rather warm. An interested spectator, also from overseas, was Mr. Haas, of the Luxembourg Athletic Federation, who found

the race quite a spectacle.

Jack Goswell who 12 months ago took on the Secretaryship "for one year" must be as surprised as the rest of us that, without the use of firearms, he has been able to hand back the job to Les Griffiths, the retiring Chairman. In these days it is nearly impossible to get rid of books and papers once you have them thrust into your hands, and the "one year, Old Man!" business generally means that you are saddled with the job for at least five years. year's Chairman is George West of the Veterans A.C. and Highgate. A proposal for the reconstitution of the Official set-up has been referred to a special committee

AUSTRALIAN NEWS by J. H. Galli

DICK LEFFLER moved into third place on the British Commonwealth hammer throw list with a new Australian record of 199ft. 2½in., at Melbourne University on

August 29th.

The 27-year-old, 6ft. 3in. tall Leffler added 6ft. $5\frac{1}{2}$ in. to his own National record, made here on November 29th, 1958. Leffler also broke the old record with three other throws—193ft. 9in., 193ft. $5\frac{1}{2}$ in. and 198ft. 3in.

Leffler's big worry has been getting to 200ft., and it has somewhat affected his throwing—he has shown too much tenseness in his fanatical desire to "get there."

At ease now, Dick might improve to 210 or 212ft. by March next. He has the power, but did not make full use of it in his record tries. However, it was Leffler's first com-

petition since March.

"I owe my success to Franz Stampfl," said Leffler later. "Considering I first handled a hammer after the 1956 Olympics, he has done a wonderful job. Lately he has been devoting as many as 12 hours a week to me."

Veteran (32) walker Ted Allsopp broke the official world 50,000 metres track record with a time of 4:20:23.8, at Melbourne University on August 22nd. Allsopp held the previous Australian record of 4:22:41.8. Holder of the world two-hour record also, he broke his own Australian 30 miles record with 4:11:10.6 during the race.

Noel Freeman, 20, who set a hot pace early, set new Australian records of 2:30:54.4 for 30,000 metres and 2:42:23.2 for 20 miles.

Allsopp, who set himself a schedule aimed at bettering the record of Moc (Czech), was content to let Freeman have his head in the early stages, and went to the front after 20 miles (when the pressure began to tell on Freeman). Freeman's time for the full distance was 4:28:29.3.

Running brilliantly all the way, 19-yearold Bobb Vagg (NSW) easily won the Australian cross-country championship (over 10,000 metres near Melbourne), also on August 22nd.

Vagg came from behind to pass Dave Power with 400 yards to go, and won by about 80 yds. in 32:22.4. Power was second in 32:35.0, from Albert Thomas (32:52.0) and Graham Thomas (32:53.0)—all NSW.

Vagg, 5ft. 8in. tall and weighing 145 lbs., last January set a world junior six miles

"record" of 29:03.6.

Now Vagg appears certain to represent Australia in the 10,000 metres at the Rome Olympics, and he could give a good account of himself.

I feel that Vagg is the boy to eventually break Dave Stephens' local six-mile record

of 27:54.0.

ST. ALBANS WIN HIGHGATE RELAY

I T was not surprising that no records were broken in the 5th Highgate Harriers' "75th Anniversary Road Relay" run on Sept. 12th, around the hilly roads of Hampstead and Highgate, for it was hot and

humid with only a slight breeze.

28 teams started and it was apparent early in the first leg that the record of 23.15 for the 4 mile 1045 yards course was in danger when little 31-year-old Irish aircraft fitter, Denis O'Gorman (St. Albans) showed in the lead. Up West Hill and around the edge of the Heath he sped to hand over 52 secs. in the lead, in what was to prove the day's fastest time (23.31), well clear of Highgate (Harrison 24.23) and Blackheath (Jackson 24.51). Woodford Green had their three teams in 5th, 6th and 7th positions.

St. Albans increased their lead to 1 min. 26 secs. on the second circuit (Macey 24.54 with Ealing (Case 24.55) 2nd, Highgate 3rd (R. Shilling 25.36) and Woodford Green "A", now in front of their "C" team, 4th

(Crump 25.24).

The 26-year-old recent winner of the Shaftesbury "10", Highgate's George Brown, set off on lap 3 over 1\frac{1}{2} mins, behind St. Albans' junior Smith, and running the day's second fastest time of 23.43, gave the promoting club their chance at the front, handing over 16 secs. in the lead. Major (24.21) brought the leading Essex representatives into third spot, followed 40 secs, later the Kentishmen from Blackheath (Fletcher 24.51). Victoria Park had moved up three places to 5th (Curtiss 25.00) and Shaftesbury were now 6th. Down the field Hawkes (25.05) was moving City of Rochester up from 12th to 8th, while Ealing fell to 7th.

After Peter Palmer took over at the front early on stage 4, St. Albans were never again headed. It was asking too much of Marlow to make up 1 min. 27 secs. on stalwart John Thorpe and the 27 year-old Insurance clerk from Hertfordshire scampered home in 1st place (24.20). Highgate held on to 2nd (Marlow 24.26) and Woodford Green to 3rd (Lewis 24.37). Just behind, cries of "Up the 'Heath!" did not refer to Hampstead Heath, but were directed at recent L.C.C. 3 mile

winner, John Herring, who stormed through to 3rd fastest time of the day (24.04) in 4m place for Blackheath.

At Helsinki, September 12th and 13th

BRITAIN beat Finland in the two-day match at Helsinki on Sept. 12th and 13th by a larger margin than even the most optimistic could have anticipated. That we did so, was largely due to the grand fighting spirit of our athletes, though it must be admitted that some of the Finnish stars did not perform as well as expected. This was the first time in four meetings that we had beaten the Finns.

High Jump (final): To this writer, at least, the duel between the incredibly long-legged Balas, the only woman ever to have high jumped six feet, and the more normally proportioned Ballod, was the high spot of the Universiade. Balas achieved moral supremacy right from the start, for she did not enter the competition until $5'2\frac{5}{8}''$ (with only two rivals still left in), whereas the Russian began at $5'0\frac{1}{4}''$. Both cleared $5'5\frac{3}{4}''$ and $5'6\frac{7}{8}''$ first time. At $5'8\frac{1}{8}''$, the blonde Rumanian succeeded at her second try, Ballod at her third. Balas won the contest by jumping $5'9\frac{1}{4}''$ first time. Ballod, who looks no more than about 5'4" tall, failed. Although distracted by inopportune announcing and a rowdy crowd, Balas cleared $5'10\frac{7}{8}''$ on her third attempt and went reasonably close with the bar at a world record $6'0\frac{3}{8}''$, a height beaten only by 19 male Britons last season!
