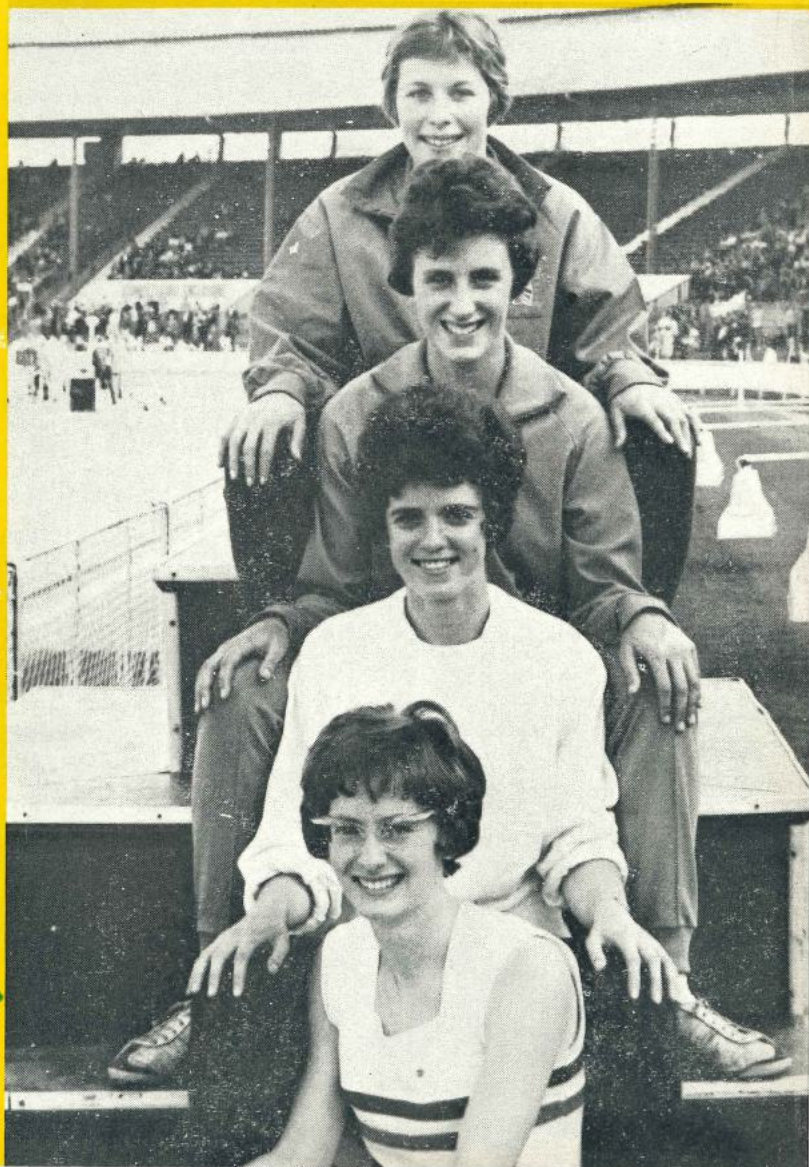

# WOODFORD BEAT RECORD IN ST. ALBANS C.C. RELAY

**F**ORTY-FOUR teams from 20 clubs contested the opening of the 1963/64 cross-country season at St. Albans on Saturday, Sept. 21st. The afternoon was damp and close—not ideal cross-country weather. Leader on the first stage was Watford's Mike Dixon (12.16) followed by Peggs of Enfield in 12.29, the two Woodford teams and Welwyn. St. Albans (Thorpe 13.11) were 17th.

Mike Tribe took Woodford into the lead on the second leg with a 12.41, Macey (12.18) bringing St. Albans into the picture with a fifth placing. Mike Palmer took the host club into the lead for the only time in the race with 12.17 on the third lap, followed by Eddie Major (12.37) keeping Woodford handy.

St. Albans (Smith) dropped to third on stage 4, David Stearns having taken Woodford into a lead they were not to lose. Welwyn were now second and these three clubs were now out on their own.

Denis O'Gorman brought St. Albans back into second place on the penultimate stage and handed over to Bill Wilkinson 51 secs. behind Roy Garrett. It was an impossible task to catch him, but most onlookers thought Wilkinson had closed the gap a little; the watches thought differently and revealed that Garret had clocked 11:49 for the fastest time of the day.

Woodford thus won the Reg Corley Trophy at the first time of asking in a new course record of 74.15, knocking 16 seconds off St. Albans' three year old record.

## A GREAT CHANCE

HAVING seen the Russian athletes in action against France last weekend, I feel sure that our men, at least, have a great chance of beating Russia in the match at Volgograd which commences today. We should score heavily in the track events until we come up against Tiurine, who will want a lot of beating in both the 1,500 and 5,000 metres events, assuming that he doubles up as he did against France. A tall, powerful runner, he did all the leading and, with a fast last lap, still seemed to have plenty in hand at the end.

If all our athletes rise to the occasion it should be a very close match with an excellent chance of a surprise win by Britain. Our girls will probably find the handicap of the Russian's superiority in the heavy events a bit too much to make up, but we should do well on the track.

The "A.W." Party of 50 who went to Paris for the France v. Russia match had a great time. It was amazing just how much could be crowded into such a short period and we seemed to have been away much longer than two or three days. More about this later. Melvyn Watman's report of the match, which ended in a tie, will appear next week.

I don't know what some of the critics of meetings at the White City would have thought of the Paris match. Certainly there was no more than half the athletics one would see at one of the London meetings, a two-day affair with no women's match and no extra events, starting at 4 p.m. with the last event at 5.45 p.m. Other points of interest I noted were: the large crowd and great enthusiasm throughout; competitors presented to the public *before*, as well as after each event; no finishing tape used; no visual results; announcing and starting in particular not up to White City standards.

Today's events include the London to Brighton 52½ miles race, Eastern Counties "15", Chris Vose "7", Recorder House "4½", Hereford Road Relay and Youths' Race; Swansea Road Relay; Maidenhead Road Relay and Surrey A.C. Cross-Country Relays.

Reports and results of the Fulham Meeting and Blackheath Relay only came in as we were going to press and will be included next week, as will the Poly Relay of which we have insufficient details to publish in this issue.

Sam Ferris tells me that he should be out of hospital, after a hernia operation, about the end of this week. Get better quickly Sam, the boys "on the road" look forward to your race reports.

Edinburgh Southern Harriers point out that it was their club which took second place in the Blackpool Inter-Club competition on September 7th. The results sent to us stated "Edinburgh", which would be taken as Edinburgh A.C.

It is also my opinion that for all the initial enthusiasm shown by the stalwarts who have sweated so hard, their labour could have been in vain if skilled men are not brought in immediately to finish the job quickly and efficiently. If this were done the Centre could be operational by next spring. The cost of such labour is not as frightening as some sceptics would think, but if the project is to bear fruit we must urge the public at large to help.

## BRITISH MILING

Dear Mr. Editor,

The miling controversy goes on, there is much opinion offered and little fact to support it. There are many who do not, or will not face the facts and the conclusions to be drawn from these facts.

FACT 1. There are no British runners in the World Top Ten milers. There are five Americans FROM ONE CLUB, and two New Zealanders FROM ONE CLUB. Can we learn anything from their training methods, particularly as it seems that the coaching system locally is responsible for their success? It is reported that Igloi makes his charges train twice a day, an hour in the morning and one and a half hours at night. It is said that they go to the track not knowing what they are going to do, and when they have done it, they are not told how they fared! Lydiard pours 100 miles a week for 10 weeks into his two world-beaters; he scoffs at interval training. Have we fully experimented with these coaches' ideas?

FACT 2. Nearer home, there are no British milers in the European Top Ten. There are four East Germans and three Frenchmen. The training of the Germans is a mystery, but rumour has it that they train four hours a day. The French, are embarking on an athletic spree, it is no secret that De Gaulle was displeased with their team in the last Olympics and that the French Academy of Medicine has been giving assistance to athletes in finding out the best training techniques from a physiological point of view. Let us hope that the newly formed Institute of Sports Medicine receives the support of the A.A.A. in this country.

FACT 3. A contributor has said "put Simpson and Co. into a world-class mile race and you'll get your 4 min. mile." Has he forgotten the U.S.A. v. Great Britain match, and the Emsley Carr Mile of this year?

FACT 4. The same contributor has said in defence of slow times, "Snell was quite content to win his Empire title in 4:4.6". But, if he HAD to run his race in 3 mins. 58 secs. he knew that he was capable of it. Do our runners have such confidence borne of PREVIOUS FRONT RUNNING?

FACT 5. How sad that a junior cannot run a 4 min. 09s. mile without being told "You won't last," has anyone thought of saying, "You will last, just like Elliott did after he became world junior mile record holder at 18 with 4 mins. 4 secs." Suggestions that Bar-

row won't last seem to be somewhat insulting towards his coach.

What are the conclusions to be drawn from these facts? Are our coaches on the right lines? Are we experimenting enough with new techniques? Why do we stick to interval running when Lydiard and Cerutti condemn it? I do not know the answers, but there is no harm trying to find out NOW.

Coventry's success is more than deserved, and has earned nothing but praise from other Midland clubs. It is recognised for what it really represents—a fine club achievement.

Dear Sir,

In reply to Mr. G. West's letter in the 21/9/63 issue of *Athletics Weekly* on the dominance by a few large clubs in road racing events to the detriment of this branch of athletics, the following facts concerning the Portsmouth Athletic Club may help to allay his fears about the future of the sport.

- (1) Our mythical "mass" of all conquering road runners from novice status to international standard, number about three dozen, and if half of this number are available on any one day we consider ourselves lucky.
- (2) Team selection is based on current form and not on the reputations of the athletes concerned. On occasions when a "name athlete" states a preference to run in a minor team his wishes are usually met. To an outsider not conversant with the Club's policy, the fact that a "name" runner is in a 'B' team could give the impression that the Club's forces were deliberately being split up to win team prizes, especially if the "name" runner had been relegated to the 'B' team through loss of form and made an effort to strengthen his claim to a place in the following week's 'A' team by finishing in front of some of the current 'A' team. In a club where the time gap between the first eighteen in the Club rankings over 3 miles is just over one minute, it is not surprising that in races against weak opposition, our 'A' & 'B' teams find themselves in the prize list.
- (3) The first duty of any club towards its members is to provide the right type of competition to enable them to enjoy their sport, improve their standard of performance, and for the ambitious individual, help him to attain representative honours. The winning of prizes is of secondary consideration and to say that road race team prizes are easy pickings is sheer nonsense. In any case, in the Club-sponsored road races where the entry fees never cover the cost of the awards and the running expenses, the prizes are of nominal value, usually medals or plaques worth a few shillings and it says a lot for any group of athletes, no matter what club they belong to, that they travel considerable distances at their own expense to support these events. No, Mr. West, it is not the prizes that we are after, it is the competition, and the stiffer the better.
- (4) Regarding the "Big Club—Small Club" point of view. There are many excellent well organised small clubs doing a useful job for the sport in their respective areas and we like to think that the Portsmouth

## Race Walking

**"LUGANO CUP":** Gt. Britain & Northern Ireland, as expected, have qualified for the Final of the I.A.A.F. "Lugano Cup" International Team Walking Competition by beating France at Challes les Eaux. Result: **20 kms:** 1, Matthews (GB) 1:33.07; 2, Delerue (F) 1:34.00; 3, Nihill (GB) 1:35.04; 4, Thomas (GB) 1:41.04; 5, Bouillon (F) 1:53.51; 6, Bailly (F) 1:54.19. Points: GB 14, France 8. **50 kms:** 1, Middleton (GB) 4:27.06; 2, Arnoux (F) 4:36.47; 3, Belin (F) 4:39.18; 4, Fogg (GB) 4:45.07; 5, Dely (F) 4:47.03; 6, Wallwork (GB) 4:48.14. In another Zone Match Italy qualified for the Final by beating Switzerland. Result: **20 kms:** 1, Pamich (I) 1:35.49; 2, Pretti (S) 1:36.08; 3, Serchinic (I) 1:41.29; 4, Corsaro (I) 1:41.46; 5, Stihl (S) 1:42.18; 6, Muller (S) 1:47.42. **50 kms:** 1, Massi (I) 4:50.25; 2, Poli (I) 4:51.04; 3, De Gaetano (I) 4:55.40; 4, Calderari (S) 4:56.48; 5, Stutz (S) 5:03.01; 6, Grob (S) 5:04.04. Overall result: Italy 30 points, Switzerland 14 points.

It is possible that the Final may become a six Nations affair. In the triangular Balkin Zone Match Hungary were unable to compete against Czechoslovakia and Roumania because of an outbreak of smallpox in Budapest which caused their team to be banned from travelling. Hungary has now asked the IAAF Walking Commission for authority to compete in the Final next month and this request is being considered by the Organising Committee.

Championships Secretary: J. W. Goswell. Hon. Auditors: N. W. Easlea, R. E. Davies.

The resolution tabled by General Committee that the number of Vice Presidents be increased from Eight to Nine so as to include a representative from the Welsh Area was approved. The 1963 award of the "Edgar Horton Cup" went to Ken Matthews (Royal Sutton Coldfield WC) for his fine win in the European 20 kms Championship at Belgrade. The 1964 Championship rota will be: 10 Miles—Wales, 20 Miles—North, 50 kms—South. A new standard was announced for the National 10 Miles and all other RWA Standards have been revised as follows:—3 Miles Youth: 25.00, 5 Miles Junior: 40.00, 10 Miles Senior: 80.00, 20 Miles Senior: 3:00.00 and Certificates to 3:20.00, Senior 50 kms: 5:00.00 with Certifi-

cates to 5:20.00. Standard medal awards are now discontinued and are replaced with vest badge awards.

**Highgate Harriers' "One Hour" Meeting:** This popular meeting at Parliament Hill Track again provided some excellent racing. Paul Nihill (Surrey WC) won the 'A' Section with the third best performance of the series which began in 1943 by covering 8 miles 462 yards. Only Ken Matthews (8m. 1,018 yds) and Stan Vickers (8m. 702 yds) have done better. Second was John Edgington (Coventry Godiva H) who also exceeded the eight miles target with 8m. 169 yds. and third was R. Hart (Roath Labour Club and RAF) with 7m. 1,707 yds. Hart's performance is believed to be a new Welsh Record. Nihill, during the course of the race, recorded 36.01 for 5 miles, 50.46 for 7 miles (a personal best) and 58.10 for eight miles. The 'B' Section was won by Peter Fullager (Surrey WC) with 7m. 756 yds. and it is interesting to record this young walker's progress as he was the winner of the 'D' Section in 1961 with 6m. 1,543 yds. B. Hyland (London Vidarians WC) took the 'C' Section and D. Johnson (Lancs. WC) the 'D' Section. The Boys' One Mile was well supported and was won after a close race by the young Trowbridge A.C. member, G. Saxty from J. Smith (Essex Beagles). The St. Dunstan's One Mile Handicap for blinded walkers went to M. Burns off 2.50.

# GODIVA WIN LEICESTER - NORTHAMPTON RELAY

September 7th

**A**FTER an interesting tussle between Leicester C.A.T., who led for most of the first half of the race, Coventry Godiva, Small Heath and Tipton, Godiva eventually ran out winners by some 2½ mins.

O'Reilly (Small Heath) led the field home by 40 yards on the first stage in 18.48, and was followed in by Lancaster (LCAT) 18.55, R. Taylor (Godiva) 19.15, Whittle (Tipton) 19.19, Toseland (Kettering) 19.23 and Smith (Halesowen) 19.25.

On Stage 2 Lem took Leicester into an 11 sec. lead from Simpson (S. Heath), with Lloyd (Godiva) another 43 sec. behind. Fastest times: Lem (LCAT) 17.38, Wood (Worcs) 17.52, Simpson (S. Heath) 17.56.

Stage 3 saw Leake take Leicester away into a lead of 1 min. 12 sec. over Hammond (Godiva) who had moved into second place, 36 sec. ahead of Rowe (S. Heath), who was followed by Tipton, Rugby and Worcester. Fastest times: Leake (LCAT) 25.18, Hammond (Cov) 25.36, Wright (Tipton) 26.20.

Turney, with fastest stage time, pulled Godiva up to within 35 sec. of the leader, Richards (LCAT). Tipton had now moved into third place, Small Heath (Flynn) dropping to 4th. Fastest times: Turney (Cov) 16.12, Wood (Tip) 16.44, Richards (LCAT) 16.49.

McDermott ran a grand leg for Godiva on Stage 5 to give them the lead which they held to the end. He handed over 26 sec. ahead of Baker (LCAT), with Denton of Tipton just over 2 mins. further back in third place. Fastest times: McDermott (Cov) 18.24, Denton (Tip) 19.11, Baker (LCAT) 19.25, Smith (Kett) 19.35, Riley (Bromsgrove) 19.35.

On Stage 6 Dowall took Godiva right away to a 1 min. 45s. lead over Edwards (LCAT). The first six were now well split up. Behind them Notts, Nuneaton and Rugby were having a great tussle. Fastest times: Dowall (Cov) 19.40, Rickhuss (Tip) 20.13, Gray (S. Heath) 20.13.

Stage 7. Harbach moved Tipton up closer to LCAT but positions did not change amongst the leaders, though Notts came through to 6th. Fastest times: Harbach (Tip) 14.19, Fletcher (Cov) 14.45, Govan (LCAT) 15.05.

# LES DEUX MICHEL — JAZY

**J**AZY trained harder than ever during the winter of 1958/59 but a persistent foot injury ruined his early season racing and he lost several races, including the French 1,500m championship. Bernard scored his first victory over his arch-rival at 1,500m for almost three years, running 3:44.6 against 3:45.2. Bernard was a very happy man, doubly so since the previous day he had beaten Robert Bogey for the 5,000m title.

Bernard was truly in form. In Sweden a week later he seized the French 1,500m record for the first time (3:42.2) and six days afterwards picked up the national 1,000m mark with a time of 2:20.1, Jazy having clocked 2:20.6 at the previous meet. His joy was somewhat short-lived, though, for Jazy reasserted his superiority in the late season races, beating him to the finish in three 1,500m events and one mile race.

## **Jazy regains 1,500 record**

The 1,500m at Gothenburg on September 8th was particularly notable as Jazy regained possession of the national 1,500m record with 3:42.1 while Bernard clocked 3:42.3. Actually the race was won by Dan Waern in 3:40.7, followed by Stefan Lewandowski in 3:41.0. Next day Jazy broke Hansenne's 800m mark with 1:48.0 behind Roger Moens and Waern, while Bernard turned in a personal best of 1:49.2. Jazy ended his season with two more records: a 1:47.9 800m and, in London, a 4:01.8 mile two places ahead of Bernard's 4:03.0. That race was won in 3:59.7 (55.1 last lap) by Waern, followed by Siegfried Herrmann, Lewandowski, Jazy, Olavi Salonen and Bernard, with Ibbotson 9th and Ray Roseman, pacesetter for the first half, 11th. Another significant happening during 1959 was Jazy's 5,000m debut; in scorching weather he clocked 15:12.

Both men kicked off the Olympic season in fine style. In May, Jazy ran an 8:46.4 2 miles followed in June by a 3:42.6 1,500m and a record equalling 1:47.9 800m. Bernard fared even better, with new record times of 8:00.0 for 3,000m, 8:37.0 for 2M and 3:42.0 for 1,500m by the 3rd week of June. The pressure was really on now! Jazy came to London for the A.A.A. mile on July 16th but placed only 3rd behind Laszlo Tabori and Mike Wiggs. His time of 4:01.3 was a record, though. He won the French title the following week without trouble as Bernard went for the 5,000m, which he took in 13:55.6 after passing 3M in 13:29.2—two more national records for the book.

They resumed their personal rivalry where they had left off the previous autumn: the White City—scene of the Britain v. France match. In a close and exciting race, in which Jazy led the second lap and Bernard most of the rest, Jazy sprinted home in 3:42.8 from Wiggs (3:42.9), Bernard (3:43.2) and Stan Taylor (3:44.2). Next day Bernard ran a characteristically aggressive race in the 5,000m ("I am never so much at ease as when I am in front," he says) but was outkicked by Gordon Pirie and Frank Salvat, while Jazy was also 3rd in the 800m. On August 14th Bernard lowered his 3,000m record to 7:57.8.

The Olympic 1,500m final was the occasion of their next encounter. Bernard was by then a tired man. He had already run a heat and final of the 5,000m (placing 7th in 14:04.2; 6th place went in 13:52.8) and, unwisely, he had poured it on all the way to win his 1,500m heat in 3:42.2, very close to his best ever

whereas 3:46.0 would have seen him through. Jazy qualified comfortably in 3:44.9. The final, on September 6th, was a marvellous race—one that will live on for ever in the memory of anyone lucky enough to have been present. Here are some excerpts from my report of that race . . .

**"Start:** From the inside: Elliott (22), Rozsavolgyi (31), Waern (27), Jazy (24), Grelle (23), Vamos (24), Burleson (20), Bernard (28), and Hamarsland (27). As is his custom, Bernard shot into the lead, followed by Waern.

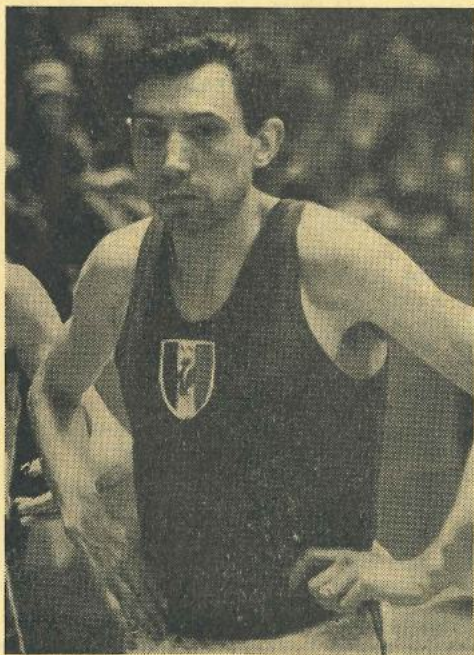
**"1st lap:** Bernard led through 200m in 28.6 and 400m in 58.2, with Waern 2y behind. Elliott lay 5th, 6y behind Bernard.

**"2nd lap:** Bernard continued his swift pace and took the field through 600m in 1:27.9. Waern, Vamos and Elliott were his closest pursuers. At 800m the smooth striding Frenchman led in 1:57.7, a yard ahead of Sweden's hope, with Elliott well poised to strike at

Waern's shoulder.

**"3rd lap:** Elliott made his long awaited move soon after 800m. He challenged Bernard for the lead, was repelled momentarily and then broke away for good at 950m. Rozsavolgyi followed in the Australian's wake. Elliott covered the half-lap between 800m and 1,000m (2:25.4) in a remarkable 27.6 This homicidal upsurge in pace liquidated Waern and Burleson among others but Jazy came into the picture for the first time by attempting to hold on. At 1,200m, reached in 2:54.0, Elliott led by a yard from the Hungarian, with Jazy and Vamos following. The rest had long since lost contact.

**"4th lap:** Any doubts as to Elliott's condition were dispelled when the world record holder ran his 13th 100m in an inhuman 13.4 to open up a yawning 10y gap. His lead had grown to 20y entering the final turn—and that was his winning margin. Elliott's last lap was 55.4, his last 800m 1:52.8 (!) and his final time 3:35.6—0.4 sec. inside his own world record.

## Third on all-time list

"Far more unexpected was the second place of Michel Jazy, who it will be recalled finished third in the A.A.A. mile championship. The Paris printer chopped a cool 3.7 sec. off his year-old personal best to move into third place on the all-time list. He covered his last lap in 57.4—a grand achievement after passing through 1,200m in a personal best of 2:55.2. The indefatigable Bernard (whom one must thank for the fantastic times) broke new ground with his 3:41.5 clocking."

The final result was: 1, Elliott 3:35.6; 2, Jazy 3:38.4; 3, Rozsavolgyi 3:39.2; 4, Waern 3:40.0; 5, Vamos 3:40.8; 6, Burleson 3:40.9; 7, Bernard 3:41.5; 8, Grelle 3:45.0; 9, Hamarsland 3:45.0. Yes, what a race!

Jazy's performance in finishing second to Elliott—becoming European "champion" in effect—was one of the major shocks of the Games, for only one of the nine finalists went to the starting line with a slower personal best than himself. No one was more surprised than Jazy, who had hoped for 3rd at the best and 5th at the worst. France had indeed found a successor to Ladoumegue.

Bernard's run was hardly less amazing in view of his previous three hard races and the way he fought Elliott. Strictly an all-or-nothing runner (like Gordon Pirie in the Melbourne 10,000m), Bernard admitted he lost his chance of breaking 3:40 and perhaps collecting a medal by battling it out with Elliott on the third lap. "But," he said defiantly, "a race is

never lost in advance, and I started with the intention of taking my chances. After all, Herb Elliott is only human and one day he will know defeat. Besides, I had the right to nourish such ambitions; hadn't I eliminated Valentin, the 1,000m record holder, in the heats?"

Bernard was in the greatest form of his career—the result of taking three months off (unpaid) from his job—and five days after that epic race he again broke the French 3,000m record with a scintillating 7:57.0. But his happiest moment was reserved for September 25th when in the France v. Finland match he snatched the verdict in a desperately close finish with Jazy, both clocking 3:42.8. Bernard closed his season with a 4:01.6 mile in London behind Hustling Herb's 3:59.8 and a 30:02.8 10,000m. Jazy ended up with a 2:20.5 kilometre.

### Relay world record

The 1961 campaign was relatively subdued, the season being less an end in itself than a means to an end (i.e. the 1962 European Championships). The highlight for both men must have been the 4x1,500m world record which they, together with Jean Clause and Robert Bogey, brought into France's possession. Honours were about evenly divided: Jazy won their only 1,500m encounter, 3:44.7 against 3:45.0, but this was only for 2nd place far behind the all-conquering Waern (3:42.7). Jazy got the better of Bernard in a slow early-season 3,000m but later on Bernard clocked 7:57.6 behind Pirie (7:54.8) and Bogey (7:56.1) in a race that Jazy failed to finish.

Bogey proved to be a thorn in Bernard's flesh all season, depriving him not only of his national records at 3,000m, 2M and 5,000m but nosing him out also for the French 5,000m title. Bernard led at 3M in a record 13:28.9 (against 13:29.2) but Bogey outkicked him easily—13:53.7 to 13:56.0. Bernard's finest performance of the season was over 2,000m, for which he clocked 5:04.0 to shatter Jazy's three-month old best by 5.4 sec. and rise to 3rd on the world all-time list. Other marks of his included 3:42.5 for 1,500m, 8:37.3 for 2M and 30:03.8 for 10,000m (winning the French title in Bogey's absence). He won another national title that year, literally playing with Britain's milers at the A.A.A. Championships. Jazy's best 1,500m was likewise 3:42.5; he also ran 1,000m in a record-tying 2:20.1 and—significantly—took over a minute off his best 5,000m with a 14:10.4 performance some way behind Bogey and Gaston Roelants.

We had caught a glimpse of greatness in Jazy at Rome; throughout 1962 he had the athletics world gasping in admiration as for months on end he rattled off one exceptional performance after another. It wasn't just Bernard who looked small beer in comparison

—every runner in Europe was totally outclassed from 800m to 3,000m inclusive. Bernard had as good a season as ever from the stop watch point of view (1:49.5 800m, 3:42.6 1,500m, 4:00.3 mile, 7:56.0 3,000m, 13:54.6 5,000m, 29:59.4 10,000m) but by the end of the year his inferiority complex *vis-à-vis* Jazy must have grown to quite unmanageable proportions. Of course he lost all three of his clashes with Jazy the unbeatable. The one bright spark in Bernard's rather gloomy season was his victory over Bogey in the French 5,000m title race: 13:54.6 against 13:57.6. He placed 5th in the Belgrade 5,000m (14:03.8).

Jazy's magnificent season practically defies description; there just are not that many superlatives in the dictionary. In July of 1962 I summed up Jazy's performances up to that time like this:

"His performances this year have been breathtaking—and there will be more to come. In the first indoor race of his career he ran Jim Beatty to inches over a mile, he set a world indoor best for 1,000m (2:21.6), won his first French cross country title, ran a mile in four minutes flat, produced a world 2,000m record of 5:01.5, slammed one of the greatest 3,000m fields ever assembled, and later hacked the world 3,000m record to a remarkable 7:49.2. All this, plus many other notable victories and times, in the space of five months!"

### Ran away with European title

Indeed there was more to come. For instance, a 3:39.9 1,500m that was remarkable for a final 200m of 24.8; French records at 800m (1:47.1), 880y (1:48.0), 1,500m (3:38.3) and mile (3:59.8)—earlier he had set new figures of 2:19.3 for 1,000m; inevitably it seems he ran away with the European 1,500m title (3:40.9). His one defeat all season should not be taken too seriously. . . Jocelyn Delecour beat him in a long jump competition! When the best performer lists for the year came to be compiled Jazy was found to lead the world at 1,000m, 1,500m, 2,000m and 3,000m and first in Europe at 800m.

It would have been no great surprise had Bernard shown signs of decline this year; at the age of 31 he might have found further improvement, at 1,500m anyway, beyond him. Not so, for in fact Bernard is currently enjoying his finest season to date. He is still being overshadowed by Jazy but the gap has closed quite dramatically even though Jazy was running even better than last year prior to his injury in Sweden.

Their major races so far this season have gone like this:—

**Feb. 15th:** European indoor 2M record of 8:41.4 by Bernard.

**Feb. 23rd:** American indoor 3M title in

European record of 13:38.4 by Bernard.

**May 12th:** Jazy beat Bernard in 3,000m—8:05.9 to 8:12.9.

**May 18th:** French 1,000m record of 2:19.1 by Jazy.

**May 19th:** 4:01.4 mile by Jazy.

**May 29th:** 2:19.6 1,000m by Jazy.

**June 1st:** 1:49.4 800m by Jazy; Bernard beaten by Bogey in 3,000m—8:06.0 to 8:02.8.

**June 3rd:** 8:47.5 2M by Bernard.

**June 6th:** World record 2M by Jazy of 8:29.6.

**June 9th:** Jazy beat Zimny (Pol) in 8:50.6 2M; 3:44.4 1,500m by Bernard.

**June 12th:** 3:39.5 1,500m by Jazy.

**June 19th:** Jazy beat Bernard over 5,000m—14:02.4 (personal best) to 14:03.6; Jazy led from 1,000m.

**June 23rd:** Bernard beaten by new French star Jean Wadoux at 1,500m—3:43.0 to 3:42.9.

**June 27th:** Jazy beat Norpoth (WG) at 3,000m in 8:06.4

**July 2nd:** French 5,000m record of 13:50.2 by Jazy defeating all-star field in Moscow.

**July 5th:** Bernard (14:01.2) beaten by Tulloh (13:59.4) at 5,000m.

**July 8th:** French 1M record of 3:58.2 by Bernard (3:42.8 at 1,500m).

**July 20th:** Jazy (3:42.2) beat Salinger (CSR); Bernard (13:58.6) defeated Bogey.

**July 28th:** Jazy beat Bernard for the French title in 3:37.8, a European record. Bernard clocked 3:38.7—2.8 sec. faster than ever before! They shared pacemaking duties with Wadoux.

**Aug. 1st:** Personal best 2,000m of 5:03.8 by Bernard.

**Aug. 4th:** Jazy spiked during training run in Sweden; out of action most of month.

**Aug. 11th:** 3:43.4 1,500m by Bernard.

**Aug. 31st:** Personal best 2M of 8:34.8 by Bernard; 2:21.7 "comeback" 1,000m by Jazy.

**Sept. 3rd:** 4:00.8 mile by Jazy.

**Sept. 5th:** Jazy beat Bernard over 1M—4:03.7 for both.

**Sept. 9th:** Bernard tied Jazy's French 5,000m record of 13:50.2—actually clocking 13:50.1 behind Roelants (13:45.6).

This year, for the first time since diplomatic relations were broken off in 1956, les deux Michel have co-operated to some extent . . . to their mutual benefit. The pay-off came in the French 1,500m championship where each man played his part in maintaining a fast tempo. The result was that Jazy finally claimed the European record and Bernard surpassed his wildest dreams in clocking 3:38.7 (he had considered 3:39 his ultimate). Jazy expressed his delight at Bernard's exploit, Bernard had some nice things to say about Jazy—rapprochement at last.

Bernard is a changed personality this year. A drastic switch in his training methods—he now trains away from the track and stop watch—has brought about a fresh approach to

racing. Consequently, he is stronger, fitter and more dangerous this year. At Luxemburg on September 5th he came within an ace of beating Jazy in a mile race. Bernard led by 2m entering the final straight, Jazy caught him 50m out but was held for 20m before finally inching ahead to victory. Both clocked 4:03.7, Jazy covering the final 120y in 14.0 Had the early pace been rather faster than 2:03.0 at 800m Bernard might have drawn Jazy's finishing sting. As it was Bernard was hardly panting at the finish and he declared he felt capable of a 3:56 mile.

This is Bernard's penultimate season of athletics. He will definitely retire after Tokyo: "Fifteen years of racing is quite enough in a man's life." He has three targets to fulfil before he hangs up his spikes in little over a year from now—to set an individual world record (the 2M mark is certainly within range), to win an Olympic medal . . . and to beat Jazy again.

Jazy also is likely to run his last top-class race at the Olympics. He wants to devote his time to his family and career (he is now a sales agent for a wine firm) and to pass on his knowledge to the youngsters in his club. Whereas Bernard is still undecided whether to go for 1,500m or 5,000m in Tokyo, Jazy has made up his mind that 5,000m is the event for him. He has stated that he believes he can run 1:46 for 800m, 2:15 for 1,000m, 3:36 for 1,500m, 4:58 for 2,000m and 7:45 for 3,000m but refuses to estimate his worth over 5,000m. He is keen to reduce his time to 13:40 this season (13:50.2 is his best), the sort of time that will be necessary for any chance at all in the Olympic final.

One expert on the subject—Gordon Pirie—has predicted 13:30 for Jazy. Another—Dr. Ladislav Fiser. Jungwirth's coach—says that because Jazy is fast enough to run about 48 for 400m it is mathematically impossible for him to beat 13:40 and he would be better off concentrating on 1,500m. Arthur Lydiard thinks Jazy could beat Snell in the Tokyo 1,500m. But Jazy has made his choice, and time alone will prove whether he was right.

When new track is opened at Bracknell on September 21st

**I**F the various aspects of this match had been rated on the basis A—excellent, B—good, C—fair, D—poor, the result would undeniably be: general level of performance B, track/weather C, announcing/organisation D. To cite only two examples of the last named: indicator boards were prominent, but except on rare occasions were not operated; although field events exclusively occupied the opening half-hour or so, very little information was given on the competitors and nothing on the progress of the competitions.

David Stevenson cleared 13'0", 13'6", 14'0", and 14'5½" (somehow contrived to be measured at 14'5⅝", which would probably have been 4.41m) first time, before failing five times at 14'8". He thus raised his week-old record by ¼". Not 22 until 28th November, he has shown the following annual progress: 1958—10'6", 1959—12'0", 1960—13'0", 1961—13'2", 1962—14'0½".

Ann Packer returned her best over 440y with an excellent 54.8; her previous two efforts of 55.9 and 55.1 were also in her native Berkshire. Pat Kippax ran brilliantly to return 55.9 in second place. One has to go back to 1960 to discover her previous best of 58.6! She later won the 220y from a fast finishing Packer and Madeleine Cobb, who revealed hitherto unknown potential at this distance. Mary Rand had her usual consistent long jump series: into a slight wind she cleared: 19'2", 20'0", F, 20'0½", 19'11½", F.

Don Taylor exposed the present weakness in British miling by defeating Ray Roseman decisively. After an opening lap of 59.0 Taylor took command (2:00.3, 3:03.7) and went away quite easily from Roseman on the last lap.

## Welsh Notes

THE Wattstown Road Races, in my opinion, eclipsed anything that has gone before in R.R.C. (Glam) events. The enthusiasm and excitement had to be seen to be appreciated. In glorious sunshine the whole locality turned out to watch as 16 sprinters lined up in three heats in Hillside Terrace.

Due to the thoughtlessness of those runners who persist in turning up late and then wanting to discuss details of entry, etc., the 100 yards was 12 minutes late starting. But the police were marvellous; they good-humouredly ushered everyone back onto the pavements when the runners and officials eventually did arrive, and after a few false starts the heats were eventually run.

David Jones's time of 9.6 was the fastest heat and he went into the final with David England, Peter Radford, Berwyn Jones, Roy Austin and Tony Pelopida.

99 lined up for the 4 miles' start in Bailey Street, and Mike Rowland of Newport led the field after a mile. Tom Edmunds, who has been bang in form recently, then took over, and he ran further and further away from the field, eventually finishing 35 seconds ahead of the next man. Ken Flowers of Hereford L.I. and John Page of Croydon A.C. moved up to take second and third places—after lying back in the early stages.

Like last year, one runner very unsportingly ran down to the finish knowing he had been lapped and had another lap of the mountain-top to do, but, fortunately this was detected.

This is an extremely difficult course, with no easy running at any point—it is either severe uphill or downhill, and the boys obviously have to slog hard. But there are never any complaints, and the race is a fitting climax to the R.R.C. (Glam.) Autumn Series each year.

Fred Bell of Carmarthen, ran extremely well (5th) as did M. Hewer of Cheltenham (6th) and John Godding of Aberystwyth (8th). Others ran much to form.

Back in Hillside Terrace for the final of the 100 yds., it was announced that Alf Meakin had arrived late, after a round-tour of the valleys in his car. A disconsolate Alf was given a great reception though, and he ran in a special 100 yards following the final.

I thought that there was nothing between Berwyn, David and Peter with 20 yards to go, when suddenly Berwyn faltered and rather than risk falling headlong, he wisely drew up. He impeded Tony Pelopida in so doing, though Tony was probably sixth anyway, and Peter beat David to the tape by inches in 9.5. Roy Austin, who won the event in 1961, was third, and David England fourth. Ron Jones stood

and watched all this from the pavement, but his record of 9.4 remains intact.

The presentation ceremony afterwards was a shambles, but created much good humour. Although two officials were appointed to "collar" the first three in each race, five of the six "got away", and only after some delay did four of them return, so the television filming of the 4 miles presentation ceremony will be something of a scream, with the winner absent from the rostrum.

A distinguished team of contributors—Geoff Dyson, Peter Radford, John Wrighton, Peter Hildreth, Derek Johnson, John Disley, Gordon Pirie, Geoff Elliott, Mike Ellis, Vic Matthews and John Savidge—has produced one of the most useful and readable instructional books on the market.

# BUDDY EDELEN DOES IT AGAIN

## In Bernie Hames Half-Marathon, at Chigwell on September 21st

THAT fantastic runner from across the "pond" has done it again. Buddy Edelen annihilated the opposition to win the Bernie Hames' Half-Marathon for the third consecutive year. In doing so he slashed 2m.20.7s. off the course record which he set up last year. Before the race he remarked that he hadn't tapered his training down for the race but was hoping for a new best.

His pre-race plans, however, came really unstuck. His target was to cover the 13 miles 96 yards averaging 5.10 per mile. This would have brought him inside the record. At 3.20 p.m. on Saturday Sept. 21st, Mr. E. G. Pearson set the eighty runners on their way, and 65 mins. 13.8 secs. later Buddy crossed the finishing line, which in my reckoning is nearer 5m. 02s. per mile.

Soon after the start Buddy was leading the field accompanied by Collins and Foxley, a little way ahead of a big bunch of runners. The 5 miles point was reached by Buddy in 24.43 who had managed to speed 57 secs. ahead of Collins, who in turn was being chased very hard by Hicks, Franklin (25.54) and a not too happy looking D. Foxley (25.45).

By 10 miles "flying feet" Buddy was really moving but still managed a "thank you" to the timekeeper for calling out 50.07—68 seconds faster than on his record race last year. Some 2m.16s. later came Hicks and Collins who had at last managed to shake off Franklin (52.28). Foxley came through all "on his tod" in 53.29. Then came Offley (55.14) and Swords (55.19). This order didn't change hereafter.

Way, way out in front and going away from his rivals with every stride as if he hated the sight of them, the indomitable American, who has found a place in all our hearts, stormed home to a most popular win.

After the official presentation was over Buddy was called up to receive from the Essex Beagles Secretary—Mr. E. C. Branch, a birthday cake for his 26th birthday on Sunday from members of the club.
